

Paul's affection for the Christian community at Philippi is apparent from his opening words. At the heart of this letter is Paul's eloquent hymn of Christ's total gift of self, the model for Paul's life. In 6 sessions, Dr. Tim Gray (Augustine Institute) combines insight and practical guidance to make the Scriptures come alive in the wonderful study of the Letter of St. Paul to the Philippians.

Today's Gospel is the wonderful account of the two disciples who meet Jesus on the road to Emmaus. Initially they do not recognize Our Lord. Yet as He related the passages of Scripture, which referred to Himself, their hearts burned within them. They urged Him to "Stay with us." Afterwards they immediately recognized Him in "the breaking of the bread'.(Luke 24: 13-35)

Reflection: Where do we today find Jesus staying with us? He stays with us as the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. He stays with us after we receive Him in Holy Communion. Do our hearts burn within us, when we receive Him? Or like the disciples in today's gospel, do we not recognize Jesus. Oh! How foolish are we? Please take some time to reflect on your time spent in thanksgiving after Holy Communion. Recognize Whom you have just received. Recognize that you have the Savior of the World, the LIVING GOD within you.

### Dear Parishioners.



### "I Am Not Afraid — I Was Born to Do This."

Have you ever felt like you weren't doing the work you should be doing?

We have all had jobs that leave us feeling unfulfilled. Bored. Dreading the next day. We may even experience a sensation of unfamiliarity, of being unable to recognize ourselves.

Most of us have also been lucky enough to have a job that we love — a vocation, a calling that makes us look in the mirror and think, *This. This is who I'm supposed to be. I recognize this person.* 


For me, that work is the work of marriage and motherhood. The hours are terrible, the pay is even worse, and my coworkers are frequently disappointed in me — but it doesn't matter. When I look in the mirror every morning and see my tired, wrinkled face gazing back, choruses of "I said I don't want the BLUE SHIRT, MOMMY, ugh!" and "Honey, I've got an early meeting, I'm so sorry but I have to run," ringing in the background, I think to myself: I recognize this girl. She was born to do this.

Christ's own disciples did not recognize him on the road to Emmaus. It wasn't until he took the bread and broke it that their eyes were opened, and they realized they had known it all along — "Were not our hearts burning within us?"

In that moment, Christ was doing the very work he was born to do, making the sacrifice.

I don't know what kind of vocation you are called to. I don't know what kind of work reveals your true self. But I hope that whatever work you are doing, you can look in the mirror and feel your heart burning within you.

"He was made known to them in the breaking of bread." — Luke 24:35

### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I always feel a little sad when someone begins to speak to me with the words, "Father, I know you're so busy, but ..." It happens a lot. And I get it. He or she is trying to be respectful of my time. But it saddens me because a priest makes Jesus present to people in a special way, and Jesus *always* has time for us. Don't we all feel at times that God just doesn't have time for us?

Nonsense. Just look at the stunning "Road to Emmaus" story we hear this week. It's the day Jesus rose from the dead. And the Risen One appears in disguise to two disciples. He walks with them, chats with them, and eventually eats with them. It could have been hours he spends with them — two unnamed persons — in the middle of nowhere. On the day he rose from the dead!

My friends, please take this to heart: The Risen Jesus is not too busy to spend time with you! He doesn't have "better things to do." You and I are members of this crucified and risen Body. He therefore has all the time in the world to be with us. So, I challenge you this week to approach him confidently in prayer and conversation. After all, being with you and me is the reason he rose from the dead.
