

Around the Table

Rev. Denis B. Theroux, Pastor The Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Friends,

Some of our more senior parishioners may still remember, personally, or from family conversations the "gangster era" of the prohibition days. Our young parishioners are probably familiar with it, too from the endless movies and television programs written about that colorful period of time in our U.S. history. One of the embarrassments of those days occurred when one or the other of these gangsters were killed in a gang war. They often had not only an extremely elaborate funeral with literally tons of flowers, but they were also buried by the Catholic Church! We saw images of priests taking part in the funeral rites, and the mourning family and friends going through the familiar ceremonies that we, as Catholic children, knew and understood. Some of our friends and neighbors from Protestant Communities often times were quite disturbed by all of this. We were often questioned as to what kind of hypocrisy this was, how could these gangsters live such corrupt lives of murder, and thievery and still be buried from the Church? This of course, was no easy question to answer.

Today's Gospel Reading suggests perhaps the only kind of answer there is to those strange circumstances. In life, as we experience it, some people seem to live very good lives and are never tempted to do gravely wrong things at all; they are always faithful. Others, though, live lives that are dishonest, cruel and even viciously destructive, yet through some mysterious divine process, they, like many of these gangsters, were visited by a priest at the end of their life, received the Anointing of the Sick, and seemed honestly contrite. So they were buried from the Church.

This is one of the awareness' the beautiful story of the prodigal son offers us. The older brother reminds us of some of the people who, during the gangster era felt perplexed and confused by the Church's involvement, with "those people." So too, this brother had served his father faithfully and now he just could not understand. "Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders; yet you never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns, who swallowed up your property with prostitutes, for him you slaughter the fattened calf."

We all know, almost by heart, the father's magnanimous response, "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found." Within this is the mystery of God's all-loving forgiveness. We, in our humanity, therefore, cannot try to prejudge or second guess God. God's mercy and compassion are infinitely beyond our comprehension and imagination!

So when the Church forgives, it is imitation of God's forgiveness. Those forgiven are therefore rightfully honored with devotion, and their families are reassured of God's greatness. For who of us can judge the great generosity of God's love? Certainly I cannot. So, humbly and with deep gratitude, together, we submit to God's inscrutable mercy and wisdom!

The opening lines in today's gospel from Luke set the stage for the parable that Jesus tells. The lines are drawn between the scribes and Pharisees, who were seen as the righteous religious leaders and the tax collectors and sinners, who were known to be social outcast. We need to remember that when a person shared a meal with someone in the 1st century it meant they shared life with them. Therefore, Jesus' action was not just an unacceptable gesture but was an act which made Him unclean and went against the Jewish law at that time. In contrast, Jesus saw his association with the outcast as a way of stating that He came to ALL people not just those that were acceptable or appeared and judge worthy.


The parable stories that Jesus tells of looking for one lost sheep and one lost coin are told to show the extravagant attentiveness that God would go to rescue any one person. The joy that both the man and the woman feel cannot be contained and they must share it with their neighbors.

There is a double focus in the parable about the lost son. (This weekend we are given two options for the gospel passage to be read at Mass. The second option does not include the parable of the Prodigal Son. If we do not hear it this weekend, we will hear it during Lent.) No doubt it is about the mercy that God shows to all who repent, it also contrasts God's openness with the closed-mindedness of those who consider themselves faithful and therefore worthy to be When we examine the three counted among God's chosen. characters in this parable, the picture of the youngest son and that of the father is straightforward. We come to see in the youngest son that he has reached a place of total disgrace but he also comes to a place of repentance in which he is willing to acknowledge his sin and even give up any claims that he would have as a son. The father is watching from a distance and we would get the impression that he has gone to wait on a number of occasions. He is willing to go against the conventions of that time and he runs to meet his son. He treats him not as someone who has hurt him by doing wrong but as if he has been raised back to life. The father is accepting of the decisions of both of his sons even when he disagrees with them. When it becomes clear that they have not made the right choices, he forgives them. This new picture of what it means to be a father becomes the metaphor for understanding who and how God acts with and to us.

It is when we look at the eldest son that the message of this parable, as it connects to the first two parables, becomes clearer. The eldest son resents what the father has done for his brother and he refuses to accept either his father's gift of the greatest portion of the estate or to acknowledge that the youngest son is even his brother. He has always obeyed orders and therefore sees himself as worthy and his brother as the unworthy outcast. The eldest son is contrasting his loyalty with his brother's infidelity, but Jesus is trying to show the difference between God's compassion with the mean-spiritedness of scribes and Pharisees. They resent that God is willing to extend mercy and compassion to ALL people including those who are the outcast and would not be considered as worthy.

We are not able to "box in" God's love and compassion for us. God's ways are not our ways. We find this unconditional love of God at times uncomfortable and difficult to believe both for ourselves and because we as disciples are called to how that same unconditional, nonjudgmental love to others. Do you really believe that God loves you and delights in you just as you are?



Why should your child attend Faith Formation?

Reason #1: We no longer live in a culture that allows children to pray, or speak of faith at school. ASFF provides an environment where children not only can speak of God and desire to build a deeper relationship with him, his Son and the

Holy Spirit, but can ask the big questions of life and get a faith filled answer! It is here that they can come in touch with the traditions of the Church and freely display the images and articles of faith.

Reason #2: Children need to be able to talk about faith at their own level with other children. As they do so they begin to understand more deeply the importance of being part of a faith community and learning about faith from each other.

In the Faith Formation Program at OLV, we offer after school sessions on Monday and Tuesday at 4:45-6:00 p.m. and Monday evenings at 6:30 -7:45 p.m. We also offer a preschool program at 9:30 a.m. during Mass on Sunday and on Monday at 4:45-6:00 p.m. This program is based on the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. We also offer a home study program for children in grades 1-7. We prefer that eighth graders are onsite for Confirmation Prep and are willing to help families with scheduling in order to do that. Forms for the fall's programs are posted on the parish website under the heading Faith Sharing and then After School Faith Formation.

The After School program begins this week September 12-13. Those registering this week will be included the following week. If you have not registered your children, please do so that we can be sure to have enough space and materials for them!
