

Around the Table

The Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Friends,

One of the common expressions that we often hear to describe a person who has been deteriorating in prison for a long time, perhaps even under a life sentence, is that he or she is "rotting away." This expression conveys, I think, the profound sense of frustration, of uselessness, for the person who is in such circumstances. He is in a kind of deadend situation in which he has no future, and there is no longer any point or purpose to his life.

We all know from various stories or newspaper articles we have read, or movies we have watched, how true this is. In a rare instance, we may hear of a person who makes the best of his situation in this confinement that seems so futile and useless. He or she may produce something worthwhile. Certainly, there have been prisoners who have written books that are of great value to the human race. Some years ago, there was a movie called **The Bird Man of Alcatraz** about a prisoner who did some very valuable and worthwhile research on birds which has since been of great benefit to all of us. But mostly this is an exception. The more common experience of prisoners seems to be one of languishing there or, as we say, "rotting" away. They experience a profound sense of lack of purpose and of despair, especially if they are there for life or there is very little hope of being released soon.

This vivid image of the wastefulness and futility in the life of the prisoner is something of the way St. Paul describes creation and the state of humankind before the coming of Jesus. He says that "creation was made subject to futility," and the definition of futility contains the idea of uselessness, of lack of purpose. In his Letter to the Romans, St. Paul also uses the word "decay" or "corruption," which catches the common image of a prisoner "rotting" away in a prison. Thus, before the coming of Jesus, humankind, was indeed much like a person in prison. But St. Paul reassures us, "Creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God."

One can only imagine the tremendous sense of joy on the part of the prisoner who unexpectedly receives word that he or she is soon going to be free. Perhaps, he or she has been given an official pardon by the Governor or even the President. What was once, then, a sense of uselessness and waste can now become a sense of profound joy and gratitude for his release. Unfortunately, we know that many prisoners, when they are released from prison often go back to their "old way of life." But sometimes they realize their freedom and can take joy in it and even have a sense of gratitude for it. This latter experience would describe our condition as followers of Jesus, as Christians.

We realize that without Jesus we would indeed be, as St. Paul said, "subjected to futility" and "in a sense of corruption or decay." But realizing that we are now free from that, we can truly be joyful and express our sense of gratitude and our recognition of the source of our true freedom. Just as the prisoner who is unexpectedly given a pardon by a government official, even though it isn't particularly due to any merit on his part, so we rejoice in our own sense of pardon by Jesus coming into the world. This was certainly not due to any merit on our part. But regardless of our merit, pardon has been granted to us, and St. Paul wants to be sure we know that. Paul wants to reassure us that we are no longer prisoners, that our lives are not futile and useless. We are truly free because we are "children of God" through Jesus who died for us. And through his death he gave new purpose and meaning to our lives.

Volunteer for Life Remodeled in Central Detroit



Faith Communities Coalition on Foster Care Monthly Spotlight

Every month, we will be introducing foster children looking for "Forever Families" to our community. Please check out the bulletin board in the Gathering Space and

remember to pray for these children who would love to be adopted. Is God nudging you to find out more about foster parenting, adopting, mentoring or giving respite care? The numbers are sobering. Seventy percent of teens who emancipate from foster care report that they want to attend college, but fewer than ten percent who graduate from high school enroll in college, and of those less than one percent graduate from college. Approximately 13,000 children are in the Michigan foster care system at any given time. A growing number of Michigan youth are reaching adult age while in foster care and have no resources to attend college when they age out of the system.

Statistics for Youth Leaving the Foster Care System are Tragic

- 1 in 5 or more will become homeless after age 18.
- 7 of 10 women will be pregnant by their 21st birthday.
- Just half will be employed at 24.
- Fewer than 3% will earn a college degree by 25.
- 1 in 4 will be incarcerated within two years of leaving foster care.


