The Easter Season



The great feast of Easter, which is fifty days in length, invites Catholics to practice in their daily lives the joy of the Resurrection. In the readings during the season, we hear stories of the Risen Lord appearing to disciples in the garden tomb and on the road to Emmaus, in the upper room and on the shore of the sea. Jesus appears to His disciples for forty days before His Ascension, to ensure that the newly formed Church is alive in her faith.

Although Jesus does not appear to us in bodily form, the Resurrection is just as real for us as it was on the first Easter morning. We are an Easter people. We pattern our lives on the Daschal Mystery and testify that no sin and suffering can destroy the gift of life God promises us in Christ Jesus. These fifty days are an opportunity for us and the whole Church to radiate the inexpressible joy of Easter to a world waiting for peace together with Easter hope that crowns the season at the celebration of Dentecost.



From the Desk of Monsignor Mathers

My Dear Paríshíoners,

Throughout the Bible, God is characterized by a deep abiding, and merciful love for humanity, especially for those who respond to God's invitation to live according to His commandments and His new covenant in Jesus. God's Divine Love is recognized in a special way on the Sunday after Easter, which since 2000, has been celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday. On this day, we celebrate God's unfathomable love and His constant yearning to forgive us for the ways in which we fail in our obligations to follow the new covenant in Jesus.

Recognition of God's loving mercy and forgiveness has been a constant in our Catholic tradition. However there was never a formal liturgical celebration until St. John Paul II established this feast day for the whole Church. He declared, "Divine Mercy is the Easter Gift that the Church receives from the Risen Christ and offers to humanity at the dawn of the Third Millennium."

In the past, many other Popes and faithful Catholics had advocated celebrating God's Mercy. Pope John Paul II was greatly influenced in this regard by the writings of a 20th Century Polish nun, the mystic St. Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938). St. Faustina was born on a farm in rural Poland and was the third of ten children born to her parents. When almost twenty, she entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, became Sr. Maria Faustina, and devoted her life to the message of God's mercy. She described her spiritual experiences with Christ in her diary, "Divine Mercy in My Soul."

For almost 40 years, Pope John Paul II championed Sr. Faustina's mission to promote God's mercy in the world. This finally culminated both in her canonization and the

establishment of the Feast of Dívíne Mercy. Thís feast fulfills what Christ Himself told St. Faustina:

"I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My Mercy. The soul that will go to confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened."

—Faustina's Diary, P. 699.
