Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month following the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel in Church. More information and required forms can be found on our website. (Baptisms are not celebrated during Lent.)

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. A Sharing From the Heart Hebrews 3:15

Part 2 of 3

And yet looking back on that time of displacement/exile, I can honestly say that I've never felt more free and whole as a person than I did then. Yes, despite the aforementioned challenges of having to "deal with and accept the reality of life in southeast Louisiana never being the same again" or put another way, "...having to live in an environment in which there were no longer any "fixed-points" (figuratively and literally), I'd never felt more free and aware of life-relationships than at that time. Staying with one of my former Notre Dame Seminary classmates in Franklin, La. at St. Jules Catholic Church in the diocese of Lafayette I had the opportunity to serve as a priest in a real sanctuary again. And it was during that experience that the Lord gave me perspective. While preaching, on the Sunday following Katrina, instinctively looking back over my left shoulder while sharing in my homily about coming to terms with living in an environment without fixed-points, my eyes were drawn to the tabernacle as if for the first time. And pointing to it, I said, "And yet, there He is! Jesus, the same yesterday, today and forever, the Eternal fixed-point." At that moment in time everything came together for me.

Hurricane Katrina was such a life-changing event, that up until recently, people living in southeast Louisiana spoke in terms of "Before Katrina" and "After Katrina". However, now with no fore-seeable end in sight to the present World-wide COVID-19 pandemic and all that this deadly life-changing virus has brought about, Hurricane Katrina seems like an afterthought. And for those of us who—despite all of the foolishness that has been unfolding in our midst—have come to terms with the sobering and humbling realization that apart from God, we (humanity) in and of ourselves are absolutely incapable of bringing an end to this COVID-19 pandemic. I offer the following excerpt from the preface of Peter Kreeft's Book: "Christianity for Modern Pagans: Pascal's Pensées (Edited, Outlined & Explained) as an introduction to Pascal's Pensée no. 136 which I believe offers us a great deal to prayerfully ponder during this defining moment in history.

Of Blaise Pascal (June 19, 1623 - August 19, 1662) he writes: "The only biographical details that seem to me important for appreciating his thoughts are these: He was a seventeenth-century contemporary of Descartes, "the father of modern philosophy", and the only philosopher until the nineteenth century who did not climb onto Descartes' new methodological bandwagon, which the eighteenth century misnamed "the Enlightenment"—namely, trying to do philosophy and life by the scientific method. He was himself a great scientist. He did major work in physics and mathematics, especially probability theory, and invented the world's first working computer, vacuum cleaner and public transportation system. He knew the power of science but also its impotence to make us wise or happy or good. He was a child prodigy, well educated by a wise and loving father. He died in his thirties, after a long and painful illness. He had always been a nominal and worldly Catholic but had a "second conversion" (recorded in pensée no. 913, pp. 325-26), which gave direction and vocation to his life. The Pensées could never have been written without it.

Vocations Crucifix



Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick



Anointing of the Sick is something celebrated during Mass. This reminds the parish community of the presence of sick people. However, the sacrament is celebrated with the priest, the person who is ill, and the person's family. And also the whole community can support those who are suffering. The essential

elements of the sacrament (anointing of the sick) are part of the celebration. They include: (A) the Priest's laying his hands on the sick person. (B) The Priest's prayer for the sick person in the faith of the Church. (C) The anointing of the forehead and hands.

Thus, part of the celebration of the sacrament are an introductory rite and a scripture reading. The Priest greets and blesses the sick person and guest with holy water, saying: "Let this water call to mind your baptismal sharing in Christ's redeeming Passion and Resurrection." The Priest may hear the person's confession at this point. The priest or a guest shares a Scripture reading with the words of hope, healing, and restored dignity. The anointing follows as the priest, imitating the actions of Jesus, silently lays his hands on the sick person. At the time of the anointing, he prays: "Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit."

However, today, Jesus continues to bring healing through the prayers of the Church and through the sacraments, especially the Eucharist and the Anointing of the Sick. The foundation of the anointing of the Sick has roots in the Letter of James 5:14-15, which says, "Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the presbyters of the Church, and they should pray over him and anoint him with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven."

Only a priest or a bishop may administer the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. However, prayerful support of the entire Church is necessary as it shows the unity of the Church with the person who is sick and his or her family and friends. The sacrament of the Anointing of the sick encourages those who are sick to overcome the alienation caused by sickness, to grow to wholeness through the illness, to identify with the sufferings of Jesus Christ, and to enter more fully in the Paschal Mystery.



Saint of the Week: St. Rose of Lima



St. Rose was named Isabel when she was born in Lima, Peru in 1586, but she was such a beautiful baby that her impoverished family considered her their treasure and called her Rose. Throughout her childhood, her beauty made people admire her, but very early in childhood, Rose dedicated her life to God.

She was also devoted to her parents and obeyed them in everything they asked of her, except for one: she

refused to marry because she wanted to give herself to God. In fact, Rose became so concerned that everyone around her was only interested in her appearance that she rubbed pepper on her face until her skin was blistered, dressed in rough clothing, and cut off her hair so no one would be tempted by her and so she would not succumb to vanity.

Rose worked at embroidery and needlework to help support her family, even when she would rather have been praying. She sold her delicate creations and gave her family all of the money.

Rose's Devotion

Eventually, she moved from her parents' house to a hermitage, where she fasted and prayed. Although Rose spent hours in prayer each day, she was plagued by sinful thoughts and had a natural tendency to loneliness and sadness. But she cheerfully offered her suffering to the Lord and was rewarded with ecstasies of peace and joy. She often cared for the sick, even though she was frequently ill and weak herself, in part from the fasting she felt brought her closer to God. Even when she was in pain, she didn't let her anguish overcome her love for God. During her last agonizing illness she prayed, "Lord, increase my sufferings, and with them increase Your love in my heart."

We celebrate her feast day on August 23rd.

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
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
