SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good

News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, in the gathering area of the church or you can register online. Call C.C. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. (day and time can be adjusted to personal schedules). For additional information and to register, contact C. C. Teachers & Students recently celebrated Dr. Seuss' 120th Birthday on March 2nd and embraced "Read Across OLPH Week".









































SCHOOL FUNDRAISER

Order of St. Louis IX Medallion

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri

Sin: All in Your Mind?

What would the season of Lent be without a dose of sin-talk? For many it would be more appealing, easy to digest and more in line with a rush to Easter glory. However, such would <u>not</u> be the mission given to Jesus by the Father (Jn 12: 27-32). This would be a Jesus of <u>our</u> making. It would be a Christ without a cross. It would be a discipleship without a disfiguration, and one without a transfiguration (Mk 9: 2-10). It would be a resurrection without a crucifixion.

The result for us is a redemption that is an illusion <u>without</u> a future. There can be no Easter Sunday, no forgiveness of sin, if Jesus had not <u>first</u> endured Good Friday. St. Paul teaches: "if Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty too, your faith...you are still in your sins.... If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are the most pitiable people of all. (1 Cor 15: 12-19).

Several decades ago, the influential psychiatrist, Karl Menninger asked, "Whatever became of sin?" Such a question comes with urgency in a culture which is horizontal (secular) and closed to the vertical (transcendent). In our modern context, sin-talk has been replaced by therapy-talk.

While Sigmund Freud is long dead, his cultural influence lingers on. We have re-framed sin, "missing the mark", into a this-world malady with the goal being, "to get well adjusted". While not minimizing the contributions of modern psychiatry, it has come to hogging the road to mental health. What is questioned is the belief that psychiatry is the only credible way to advance mental health. Noted philosopher, Charles Taylor writes, "It [therapeutic resolution] is as a total metaphysic that it risks generating perverse results". (A Secular Age, p. 623). What is denigrated is the spiritual as either an illusion, or worse, an enemy to human well-being. There has been a resurgence in valuing the religious dimension for providing patients with a wholistic approach to health care: research "suggests that religious participation in general, and religious service attendance in particular, is a powerful health resource affecting outcomes ranging from longevity and depression, to cancer survival and suicide". (Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health).

The focus on sin and death is not a return to the "dark side" of Christianity. Pope Benedict wrote: "There is no contradiction between Jesus' proclamation of joy and his acceptance of death on the Cross for many. On the contrary: only through this acceptance and transformation of death does the message of grace acquire its full depth." (Jesus of Nazareth, Part Two, pp. 124-5).

Next Sunday is Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

Acts of the Apostles 10:34a, 37-43. We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Colossians 3:1-4. Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.



Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord



With Friends Like These...

This year, we hear the Passion from the gospel of Mark. One thing unique about this reading is the emphasis on Jesus being abandoned by his disciples. First, the WHY HAVE YOU ABANDONED ME? leaders of the disciples, Peter, James, and John, cannot even support Jesus in his

agony in the garden: They fall asleep, three times. Then there is Judas, who seeks out the chief priests to make a deal with them, Peter, who denies Jesus three times, and the disciples who flee when he is arrested. The crowds who cried, "Hosanna!" a few days before, now call for him to be crucified. Even Simon the Cyrenian had to be forced to help carry the cross.

What does this tell us? With friends like these, who needs enemies? No, the point is that Jesus died specifically for these people, not because they were once friends, but because they were sinners, who needed Jesus. All but one of them ended up as saints. And the one who didn't was Judas, who gave up on Jesus, instead of coming back to him for forgiveness. When we find ourselves in sin, when we think that everything we do is wrong, or when we think we can't possibly deserve to be loved by God—that is when God can help us, if we just stop hating ourselves and start loving and trusting the Lord. It is not the time to pretend we have avoided the big sins, or to brag about some of the good we may have done. Instead of trying to convince God that we deserve his mercy, simply agree that you need his help. God loves sinners who know they need his forgiveness and don't deserve it.

But maybe you have already been forgiven and wonder what's next. Remember the ones you would not expect to support Jesus: The centurion supervising his crucifixion proclaims him Son of God. A member of the Sanhedrin gives Jesus a burial place. The women who were there to the end. These were people who did not claim to be worthy, just did what they could to show their love. Ask Jesus each morning when you wake up, "What can I do for you today?" and do what you can. Tom Schmidt
