Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated after any weekend Mass. Currently we only schedule one family at a time. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The seminar is usually held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel in Church. More information and required forms can be found on our website.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good

News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. (day and time can be adjusted to personal schedules). For additional information and to register, contact C. C. 



A Good Day to Die


Do you remember your own baptism? I wish I could; I was baptized as an infant, just a few days old. I envy the adults I have seen baptized at the Easter Vigil. Hopefully, they

experience what St. Paul says in the epistle we hear at the Vigil. For Paul, Baptism is a sign of dying and rising to new life. Sounds like Easter to me. So when Jesus died, he rose from the dead. Is Paul telling us that we will rise from the dead, too?

Yes, but that is not his main point. If all we think about is our physical death, and hope we go to heaven afterwards, we're missing the point. The new life starts with our baptism, not just our physical death. That's why Paul says things like, "our old self was crucified" or "sinful body done away with...." (Rom 6:6) Baptism gives us a new life NOW. The water is both cleansing and a sign of dying (symbolic drowning) that help us see we are free from sin. We are dead to sin when we begin to live in Christ. The fictional Klingons have a saying "today is a good day to die" to express courage in battle. But real Christians might say that Easter is a good day to die: we have died to sin and begun a new life in Christ.

How do we experience this dying to sin? First, we identify the sinful areas of our life. Do I watch movies, video games, or TV shows that encourage promiscuity, lying, revenge, hatred or selfishness? What sins do I confess repeatedly and what can I do to avoid them? Next we look for ways to act differently: Can I spend more time with friends/relatives who are examples of love? Can I spend less time entertaining myself and more time in prayer? Instead of complaining about what is wrong with the world, can I find ways to make it better? (If not the world, then my community or family.) These are a few of the ways we begin our new life in Christ.

God's Divine Plan



"God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness, freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life. For this reason, at every time and in every place, God draws close to man. He calls man to seek him, to know him, to love him with all his strength. He calls together all men, scattered

and divided by sin, into the unity of his family, the Church. To accomplish this, when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son as Redeemer and Saviour. In his Son and through him, he invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children and thus heirs of his blessed life."-CCC 1

This is the first paragraph from the catechism and I think it perfectly sums up what we celebrate today on this beautiful Easter morning. In today's first reading we hear the entire Gospel story being preached by Peter. This is the same Peter who denied Jesus three times just a few days before, and who we read about in the Gospel as not fully understanding what Christ was doing until he saw the empty tomb. Peter then knew the plans of God and could easily and succinctly proclaim them to all people.

The goal of the Lenten season is to bring us to a point where we can realize that our destiny is to share in the divine life of God. This isn't just a vague sentimental idea or ambiguous theology, but it is the entire point of our lives. Jesus loved you enough to die on a tree in order that you might receive adoption as his beloved. It seems simple enough, but do we really grasp the depth of the meaning? Easter morning is the good news that not only were you bought back at a price, but that the death of God was not the end. Rather, it was just the beginning. Christ rising from the dead defeated sin and death once and for all and claims us back as adopted children.

This is why Easter is the most important feast in our liturgical calendar. And God wants us to feast. We might be a little rusty after 40 days of fasting, but God wants us to pull out all the stops. I recommend making the nicest dinner you can within your means and celebrate as a family what Christ has done in conquering sin and death. The

Easter egg hunts are fun and everybody likes baked ham, but let's not forget the reason for this season. That God desired for you to be saved and come to share in his divine life. This is enough to make even the worst of sinners or hardened criminals rejoice. As John Paul II said often, "We are an Easter people, and Hallelujah is our song." Now go feast! THE EASTER OCTAVE



Eastertime lasts fifty days: seven weeks of seven days (seven equals Biblical perfection) plus one day: perfection plus! Like an eight-day Jewish wedding, or a child who can't bear to let go of Christmas, birthdays, and school vacation, the Church celebrates the Easter Octave:

"the marriage of heaven and earth," as the Vigil calls Jesus' resurrection; our new members' baptismal rebirth; our renewal of baptismal vows; our hearts' "divine vacation" (Latin vacare, "to be empty"), newfound time and space for love of God and neighbor. Make home an Easter garden! Adorn the dining table with a pillar candle (your "paschal candle"), a bowl full of water (ideally, from the parish's baptismal font), a vase of flowers or bowl of sprouting grain with Easter eggs. Even non-singers can handle the three-fold Gospel Alleluia! Let that be your grace before meals, perhaps with a prayer recalling Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35): "Be known to us, Risen Lord Jesus, as you were to the first disciples, in your word, in the breaking of bread, and in everyone we meet."

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Resurrection: THE Parable of God

Human beings are drawn to stories. Some of our earliest and most lasting memories are connected with stories. For example, regardless of age, we are attracted to stories about our families. We want to know the early years of our parents - "Tell us about mom and dad when they were growing up." Grandparents with a family album are more interesting than the latest techno-gadget. And it is not only the pictures and mementos, but the authoritative storyteller (parents and grandparents are especially fascinating) who "brings to life"

the photo or object (baseball, doll, etc.). The power of stories is their engagement with our powers of imagination.

Jesus was a powerful storyteller, the Storyteller, who conveyed the mysteries of the Kingdom of heaven through parables (Mt 13:34). What is a parable? The standard answer: it is a story which teaches a lesson. Such an answer is true...as far as it goes. But the parables when told by Jesus, reveal the often overlooked, veiled presence of God within the marrow of our lives and everyday world. In effect, the parables of Jesus serve as a kind of "speed bump" in our well-ordered, taken for granted assumptions about God. When told by Jesus, parables are subversive. They are a "shaking of the foundation" of the image (idol) we have built about God! The parables serve as spiritual shock therapy to jolt us from slumber. Jesus is not only the storyteller of parables; He is the Parable of God. From the beginning with "the Word becoming flesh" (Jn: 1:14), God enters our hearts and world history in the most unexpected of ways. Throughout his public ministry, in word and deed, the "settled" conception of who are the good, bad, and unclean is challenged: sinners are called to be disciples (Lk 5: 27-32), touching of the unclean (Lk 5: 12-16), Samaritans are called good neighbors (Lk 10:29-37), a public sinner at the foot of the Cross (Jn 19:25), and the call of the disciples who were not wise, powerful, and of noble birth (1Cor 1:26), all of these and more confound "human standards". For "God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong." (1Cor 1:27).

The Supreme Parable unfolds with the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus the Christ. For it is Jesus the Suffering Servant (Isa. 53), the Innocent Lamb "who takes away the sin of the world "(Jn 1:29), the Spotless One, who bears all sin and guilt through his crucifixion (Mk 15:15), the Faithful Son whose last words from the Cross, "'It is finished.' And bowing his head, he handed over the spirit" (Jn 19:30), and the One who was laid in a borrowed tomb, with "a huge stone rolled across the entrance" (Mt 27:60), he is our hope of glory (Col 1:27)! Only Mary Magdalene and the other Mary remained in their grief (Mt 27:56).

It would seem that Jesus is just another of the martyrs who gave his last full measure. So, it would seem. However, the Supreme Parable and Parabler lift us beyond all natural obituaries: "...you are seeking Jesus the crucified. He is not here, for he has been raised just as he said." (Mt 28:5-6). But it is not just Jesus who has been raised, "...everyone who sees the Son and believes in him may have eternal life, and I shall raise him on the last day." (Jn 6:40). The Parable and the Risen Lord continues, "the last days" have already begun and are partially being realized: "...I say to you, whoever hears my word and believes in the one who sent me has eternal life (Jn 17:3) and will not come to condemnation, but has passed from death to life." (Jn 5:24). With Jesus, an entirely new, unimagined mode of existence has been brought to light. Granted there are no cameras, selfies, and video tapes. Such is the way of God, understated so as to respect our freedom and elicit from us an authentic love. Such a love, born of faith in the words from the Word, send us forth to testify, "we have seen the Lord" (Jn 20:18).

Can we believe and live the Easter Parable in a complex, secularized culture? The words of St. Paul are timely and timeless: "...be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." (1Cor 15:58).



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


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
