Sacraments



SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated after any weekend Mass. Currently we only schedule one family at a time. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The seminar is usually held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel in Church. More information and required forms can be found on our website.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

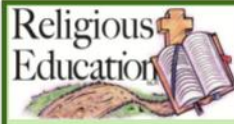
SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. (day and time can be adjusted to personal schedules). 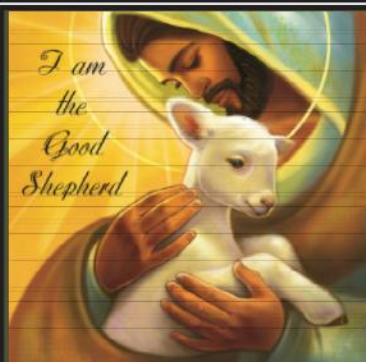

Shepherding Our Hearts to the Father's

The Holy Spirit is burning within Peter, the first of the Apostles, as he proclaims the truth about Jesus to the leaders of the Jews in today's First Reading: Jesus Christ is the stone they rejected and executed, the cornerstone of the Church, in Whom all salvation and healing

is found.

In Christ, the Son of God, we also become children of God. In Christ, who calls himself the Good Shepherd, we are known and healed and saved. This Good Shepherd has sacrificed everything for our sake, laying down His life willingly, and taking it back up again.

Jesus is always the one in control. No one forces him to do anything. The Father sent him into the world on a mission of salvation, and his whole life is dedicated to saving all of us. It is a struggle, but he is not struggling to protect or save himself; he is struggling to save all of us as he gives all of Himself. The enemy does not make him recoil or run away from his mission; the "wolf" will not make him anxious, because he cannot lose. Jesus is not worried. He does not need to recalculate his battle plan. The Plan is set from the beginning: He must take on all our fallenness and woundedness and sin and death itself, and carry it all the way to Golgotha in his own Perfect Heart – completely human and completely divine; he must sacrifice himself wholly by laying down his life, and then transform every darkness into light when he takes up his life again.

And His glorious promise to us is that ultimately, all will be drawn together so that there will be one flock without division, under the one Shepherd of love. The love of the Father has willed that we be called His children, as St. John tells us. God has created a world and a Heaven that would not be complete without us, because we are all members of one family in Christ, each of us beloved sons and daughters. Through Christ's rejection and death, we are redeemed, received, and given eternal life. In this freedom, we are called to accept this great gift and follow the commands of our Good Shepherd. Straight Talk

President Eisenhower:
Prophet and Sage (Part I)

With the Presidential election fast approaching, such is a good time to reflect on a little appreciated practice of the outgoing president - the Farewell Address. As to our current situation, there is much to ponder from former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's January 17, 1961 Address. His was a clarion call to a Nation, tested in war and facing a greater challenge in building a durable peace, to cherish the foundation of American exceptionalism: "...we yet realize that America's leadership and prestige depend, not merely upon our unmatched material progress, riches and military strength, but on how we use our power in the interests of world peace and human development."

Furthermore, the former President challenged the American people to view the blessings bestowed, "from sea to shining sea", as a holy responsibility, entrusted to each new generation by those who first pledged their "lives, fortunes, and sacred honor". Americans are not only the guardians of liberty's light, but America is that "City on a hill", an inspiration to the nations of what liberty under law makes possible: "Throughout America's adventure in free government, our basic purposes have been to keep the peace; to foster progress in human achievement, and to enhance liberty, dignity and integrity among people and among nations..."

President Eisenhower's Address was more than a trip down memory lane. His hope and vision looked beyond, into the future with its challenges and possibilities. He famously warned of the growing influence of our military-industrial complex. However, little noted at the time, and still little appreciated today, was his concern about the growing "technological revolution" rapidly unfolding in the second half of the 20th century. Over the decades, its growth, presence, and influence have achieved saturation status within our everyday global world. The former President expressed concern as to this techno-revolution.

The changing face of research opens the door to a second concern, namely, the increased presence of the Federal government for setting the agenda for research: "The prospect of domination of the nation's scholars by Federal employment, project allocations, and the power of money is ever present and is gravely to be regarded."

Modern research is both costly and subject to blood sport fierce competition: Research and development expenditures by academic institutions, totaled \$97.8 billion in FY 2022, an increase of \$8.0 billion from FY 2021. Of this \$8.0 billion increase, Federal spending accounted for \$4.9 billion. From a global perspective, a record high of almost (US) \$1.7 trillion, of which 10 countries accounted for 80% of spending. Part of the increased spending goes to attracting the new and next generation of the best and brightest. In addition, universities expend significant resources in securing a top-level faculty. (In Louisiana, the average annual salary for research professors is: \$88,304, which ranks 47th, while the national average is \$102,000).

Added to this complex mixture of money and competition are the ethical issues attached to modern research and development: the kinds of research undertaken and its effects for promoting human dignity and the common good; the means employed for conducting the research; and the ethical guidelines for applying the research. These are crucial issues too often viewed as "values questions", which are deemed "subjective" and outside the scope of scientific review. This great divide between values and scientific research would be unthinkable to such notables: St. Albert the Great, St. Thomas Aquinas, Nicholas of Cusa, William Turner, Robert Boyle, Lord Kelvin, Marconi, Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, George Washington Carver, Wernher von Braun, Albert Einstein, Louis Pasteur, Max Planck, Michael Faraday, Werner Heisenberg and numerous others.

A third area of concern voiced by the former President, was the concentration of power in the hands of a techno-scientific class which would control the public policy agenda. While affirming the contributions of those who have enhanced the quality of life, and human development worldwide, he cautioned, "...we must also be alert to...[the] danger that public policy could itself become the captive of a scientific-technological elite." Over the decades, we have witnessed the power of technology to influence behavior and values on the general citizenry. Of special concern, is the ways in which information and communication have become increasingly ideological. The dissemination of information has become less about education and more about indoctrination; less conversation and increased confrontation; less civility replaced by a general coarsening of the culture.

President Eisenhower issued a challenge to those entrusted in caring for the common good: "It is the task of statesmanship to mold, to balance, and to integrate these forces [research, university, government, and money] ...within the principles of our democratic system - ever aiming toward the supreme goals of our free society."

To find such statesmanship is akin to finding lips on a chicken.
