SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated after any weekend Mass. Currently we only schedule one family at a time. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The seminar is usually held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel in Church. More information and required forms can be found on our website.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre -register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. (day and time can be adjusted to personal schedules). TEC Summer Retreats

What is TEC? TEC, a Ministry of the Archdiocese of New Orleans, offers youth (who have completed at least their sophomore year of high school) and young adults the opportunity to encounter and integrate the Paschal Mystery at a time of passage into young adulthood. What the Church celebrates annually through the seasons of Lent-Easter-Pentecost and through the sacraments of initiation, TEC condenses into a 3-day experience. Through evangelization and catechesis, this intergenerational movement facilitates spiritual growth of youth and young adults within a community of adult mentors.

Blameless Not Blamers

If you spend any amount of time around young children, you will quickly realize that they like to pass the blame. If you're lucky, they may even accompany it with an irritating whine. What are they trying to accomplish with this behavior?

They are trying to get out of trouble, to avoid punishment, often even twisting the truth to do so. Where do they learn this behavior?

The short answer is from our first parents, the founders of Original Sin. In today's first reading, we see Adam passing the blame to Eve, who then passes the blame to the serpent. While neither of them were untruthful, they were definitely trying to avoid punishment. They knew instantly that they had done wrong and disobeyed God. We all know what happens next. They are evicted from the Garden of Eden and begin to experience pain, hunger, illness and ultimately death. Although we might be tempted to let this first reading get us down, the second reading reminds us of God's promise of redemption: "the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also...Therefore, we are not discouraged... For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven."

That is why we can exclaim with joy, "Oh happy fault, Oh necessary sin of Adam, which gained for us so great a Redeemer!" Because of Adam's sin, Jesus came down from heaven to save us. But not only did he save us, he made us members of his own family: "For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother." Knowing we are members of God's family should motivate us to end the cycle of blaming and finger pointing that Adam and Eve started and that we and our children continue. It should encourage us to humbly accept our faults, confess our sins and seek to be blameless in God's sight. It should drive us to instead lift others up by sharing the good news of God's unconditional love. Let's take one small step toward making that happen today. Tamii Urcia



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri **Gulping the Gallop Poll**

The recent Gallup Poll (3/2024), on the state of religion in America, produced the following headline: "Church attendance declines in most U. S. Religious Groups". Intuitively the Gallup data comes as no surprise. Many Catholic churches have closed, been sold, and/or consolidated. The U. S. Census Bureau Records report that every year 4,000 churches close, while 1,000 new churches have opened. At present, there are more than 20,000 Catholic places of worship in the U.S.

The Gallup Poll also uncovered: 3 in 10 Americans attend weekly or almost weekly services, 11% once a month, and 56% seldom or never attend. Among the major U. S. Religious groups, the highest weekly observance is by Mormons (54%), followed by Protestant/Christian denominations (30%), those of the Islamic faith reported (28%) weekly observance, Catholics report weekly attendance at (23%), Judaism (16%), Orthodox (15%), Buddhist (12%), Hindu (7%), None/Atheist/Agnostic (2%), and the Collective Other (16%).

Two decades ago, the average weekly attendance was 42%, a decade ago it fell to 38%, and in the most recent poll, the figure dropped to 30%. Those who claim NO religious affiliation (2000-2003) was 9%. Recently (2021-2023), the percentage of non-affiliated INCREASED to 21%. While most religious groups have seen a decline, the LARGEST DECREASE appeared within the CATHOLIC CHURCH. Between 2000-2003, 45% of U.S. population identified as Catholic, between 2021-2023, that number fell to 33%. An IN-CREASE of 4% was experienced within the Muslim and Jewish communities. Within the demographic aged 18-29 years old, 35% expressed NO RELIGIOUS AFFILIA-TION. Young adults, with or without affiliation, are LESS LIKELY to regularly attend religious services. For this age category - 22% attend regularly which is 8% BELOW the

The above can give the impression that today's Catholic is left to choose between an institutional Church (dogmas, rules, structures), or to tailor one's religion from the smorgasbord of multiple options. Such either/or thinking is as simplistic as it is false. What is dismissed is the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit who guides the Church "in all truth" (Jn 16:13). The Church founded by Jesus and entrusted to Peter and his successors (Mt 16:18), is a historical reality which has changed in many ways throughout the millennia (Jn 14:26). It is also a Church with a global mission: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations...behold I am with you always, until the end of the age". (Mt 28: 18-20). Such a Church, a living communio, MUST change in order to facilitate the ENCOUNTER with Jesus and the Gospel. In order to be faithful to the Great Commission of the historical, global Church, those entrusted with authority must not be illiterate in reading the signs of the times nor blind or fearful of the doors opened and paths cleared by the Holy Spirit (Mt 16:1-4).

The Church, "ever old and ever new" (St. Augustine), is gifted with the living Tradition handed down by the Apostles (Catholic Catechism No. 84), while also discerning the ways in which the Tradition is given form: "...do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world." (1 Jn 4: 1). Jesus is more blunt in the need for discernment: "Beware false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits." (Mt 7: 15-20). And what are these fruits of the Spirit? St. Paul lists the following: "...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law.... If we live in the Spirit, let us follow the Spirit... Let us not be conceited, provoking one another, envious of one another." (Gal 5: 22-26).

Pope Francis has sought to expand the Church's arms of mercy, love, and reconciliation to those who have felt excluded and marginalized by the Church and society. He has called the universal Church to engage in a multi-year process - The Synodal Way. Pope Francis was moved to engage in this Church pilgrimage in response to the declining number of Catholics actively involved in living the Gospel as Catholics. On a deeper level, the level of the Spirit, the Church is to be the Forgiving Father who rushes to embrace those who have left, but touched by grace with the desire to return home. The Church is to welcome them with the kiss of peace, a loving embrace, and a celebration of new life (Lk 15: 11-32).

The Pope in his opening remarks, told the participants, "It [Synodal Way] is not easy, but it is beautiful.... the Holy Spirit is the protagonist of Church life...[who] leads the Church forth.... The Holy Spirit guides us by the hand and consoles us." While the general reaction to the Synodal Way has been received with controversy, especially with the inclusion of various groups and the review of established teachings, the Pope stressed the "priority of listening". Such a "listening" requires prayer, openness to the Spirit, and a fraternal love which respects the other as other. At the closing Mass of the first session (October 2023), Pope Francis said, "We have plenty of good ideas on how to reform the Church, but let's remember: to adore God and to love our brothers and sisters with His love, that is the great and perennial reform." Pope Francis has extended the Synod on Synodality to October 2024. A number of complex issues await. One might do well to heed the words of H. L. Mencken: "For every complex question there is an answer that is clear, simple, and wrong."

Pope Francis is wise by placing LISTENING as crucial for a Holy Spirit way forward.
