#### **Sacraments**













**SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM:** Baptisms are usually celebrated after any weekend Mass. Currently we only schedule one family at a time. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The seminar is usually held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel in Church. More information and required forms can be found on our website.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

**SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION**: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

**VISITATION OF THE SICK:** Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

## Religious Education

### **Religious Education**

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. Call the church office at (504) 394-0314, or email **cre@olphbc.org** for more information.

**SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:** Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

#### ATTENTION!! BAPTISMS & MASS TIME CHANGE


During Covid, Baptisms were celebrated individually after weekend Masses for the safety of the

#### Jesus Will Calm Your Inner Storm

Today, in the Gospel of Mark, we read that Jesus calmed the storm when He and the apostles were out at sea. We all know this story. Jesus had fallen asleep when a storm began to brew. The apostles, fear-

ing they would capsize and drown, became terrified. So they woke up Jesus and said to Him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" Jesus then calmed the storm and asked them, "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"

Jesus didn't ask "Do you not have faith?" He asked, "Do you not yet have faith?" The word yet is an integral part of that question. We could ask the same question to ourselves when we encounter difficulties in life or when we feel sad and alone. These are the times when we may feel like we are perishing. And sometimes we may even feel like God doesn't care. How many times, out of despair, have we asked Him, "Jesus, where are you?" We allow fear to take over. We allow the outside world to convince us that God doesn't care, that we are not lovable, and that we are all alone. But we are never alone. No matter what we go through in life, Christ is there for us. Christ is there with us. In those times, He could ask us the same question, "Do you not yet have faith?"

So how do we build that trust we should all have in God? We get to know Him. We read stories in the Bible or other religious books. We talk to Him in prayer. We count our blessings. We think about the love we have for our children or the love our parents have for us, and we multiply that love by a thousand. Our Heavenly Father loves us more than we can even begin to imagine. And that love should calm our inner storm. That love should keep us from giving in to sadness, anxiety, and fear.

Yes, we may still feel these emotions, as they are a normal part of being human. But the difference between having faith and not having faith is the ability to acknowledge those feelings, lay them at the foot of the cross, and simply say, "Jesus, I trust you to calm this storm." 

## **Straight Talk** by: Father William Maestri **UNCOMMON Common Good**

Inflation is the enemy of money. Everyone who visits the grocery knows this "wallet fact". Inflation weakens purchasing power. The dollar is less while the price is more. Inflation hurts hardest those least able - middle class, fixed income, elderly, the poor. Inflation is taxation without representation. It raises issues of justice.

Inflation not only injures the bottom line. WORD INFLATION inflicts damage on communications and the well-being of communities (family, church, business, neighbor-

hood, politics, etc.). The pathology of Word Inflation appears with the OVER USAGE of a term(s). Over usage is a sign that the term's shared meaning is no longer shared. It has lost its "cash value" (William James), as a legitimate currency in the market of daily intercourse. The term is bankrupt.

A prime example of Word Inflation, is the excessive appeal to the "common good". This concept is increasingly used (abused) in our religious and political discourse. Supposedly, the "cure" for our hyper-partisan political climate, and overall discontent, is a renewal of the "common good". The Catholic Social Tradition is deeply committed to the common good (encyclicals, Vatican teachings, papal homilies, etc.). Pope Francis has made the "common good" and the development of a "social conscience" a central theme of his pontificate. However, this appeal has been received with controversy instead of a general consensus. Why?

The fuel that drives Word Inflation, and pollutes the air with confusion and division, is the failure to DEFINE terms. Without a shared meaning, we erect our Tower of Babel (Gen 11: 1-9). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), defines the common good this way: "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily." (No. 1906). This definition highlights three principles: respect for the human person; secondly, the overall well-being of society for the betterment of all; and finally, the establishment of those institutions which promote domestic tranquility based on justice, equality of opportunity, and participation by all in the public square. It is the responsibility of political authorities to establish structures and practices for an open society founded "on truth, built up in justice, and animated by love". (CCC, Nos.1903-12).

The term common good is also challenged by the cultural headwinds of AUTHENTICITY: "I gotta' be me. I gotta' be free." In order to be "ME", I have to be unique. I cannot be an echo nor follow the dust of the crowd. I must follow that inner voice which calls me to the "road less traveled" (M.S. Peck). The drive to be "true to oneself" and live by "one's truth", has given rise to what Charles Taylor calls the "culture of authenticity" and "expressive individualism" (THE SECULAR SELF). The origins of this new culture appear in the late eighteenth century (Rousseau and the Romantic Poets (Wordsworth). The key to the "real, inner self", is the rejection of society's moral restraints (Christianity). By doing so, one is authentic and free. (see Carl Trueman's excellent, The Rise and Triumph of the Modern Self).

By contrast, the biblical and Christian traditions teach that the human person is a social being. We need to be with and for others (Gen 1: 18; CCC, No. 1905). The development of society is a natural outgrowth of human nature. There are variations in structures and values, but all must aim for the development of a just social order which allows "the largest possible number of citizens to take part in public life in a climate of genuine freedom." (CCC, No.

Genuine authenticity, freedom, and the common good, promotes the guidance of truth which "goes beyond material goods. In spreading the spiritual goods of the faith, the Church has promoted, and often opened new paths for, the development of temporal goods...throughout the centuries has the Lord's saying been verified: 'Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things [material goods] shall be yours as well." (Mt 6: 33; CCC, No. 1942).

Such is the UNCOMMON Common Good.
