Sacraments



SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 AM Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to the www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7 PM in the Church Day Chapel. Need more info or have questions? Call the Rectory (504-394-0314) or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

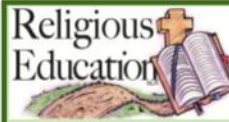
SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. Call the church office at (504) 394-0314, or email cre@olphbc.org for more information.

SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 11:00 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

Who's More Generous?

Does the Christian duty to help the poor seem to be overwhelming? We hear more and more about the homeless and jobless. Even in St. Paul's time there was more than enough poverty to go around. He was trying to build interest (in our second reading) in a project to help the Christians in Jerusalem. We see two of his reasons here.

First he tells what fine Christians they are, and hopes that they will be just as good in giving to his collection. Paul is challenging them to continue to show their love for God in their support for fellow Christians. The second reason was to show a good example: By helping the church in Jerusalem, they would show that Christians were united in faith and love for each other.

The main example he uses is Jesus, who made himself poor (i.e., human) so that we could be rich in grace and forgiveness. Paul challenges them, and us, to follow that example in giving from our wealth so that others can survive. Note that he doesn't expect them to live in poverty, just to share what they have out of love for Christ.

Today, we can ask ourselves, "Do I give to the poor because I feel guilty about all that I have? Or do I want to show my love for Jesus when I see him in the poor?" By looking at why we give to charities, we may find ourselves being even more generous than we expected.

NOTE: Mass intentions can be scheduled for weekday and weekend Masses. Some guidelines include:


- An intention may be for the deceased or the living (i.e. “The Healing of...”, “The intentions of...”).
- Each weekend, one Mass is reserved for “All Parishioners’ Intentions.”
- Only one intention can be offered at each Weekday Mass, except for Holy Days of Obligations that fall during the week.
- Mass can be said for an individual (e.g. “John Smith”), a married couple (“Joe and Mary Smith”) or a family (e.g. “The Smith Family”).

The Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time



Straight Talk

Stars and Stripes

America is a Nation of memory and hope. On days such as July 4th, a feast day on the calendar of our civic religion, we look backward. At the same time, we look forward towards "that more perfect union" (Abraham Lincoln). We immerse ourselves in the 'thickness of time', that is, there is an insoluble connection between what was, is, and may be. We are beings-in-time (Martin Heidegger), as such, we are involved in a great mystery (St.

Augustine). We try to understand our temporal condition by compartmentalizing time in discreet slices- past, present, and future. In so doing, we miss the gift of time as a wisdom which allows us to be grateful for past sacrifices and contrite for past failures. The wisdom from the past can enlighten our present, so that we may treasure and enhance the "City on a hill" (John Winthrop, 1630 sermon). The wisdom of time is not to be torn asunder.

The 'distant mirror' (Barbara Tuchman) of 1776, reflects a time not unlike our own. Our forbearers faced the hurricane winds of an 'impossible dream' - birthing a republic unlike any ever seen (Novus Ordo Seclorum, NEW ORDER OF THE AGES); a form of government in which "We the People" are the ultimate authority; a government to serve and not be served; a moral foundation grounded in natural rights - "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness"; these rights are not the gift of government, but are endowed "by nature and nature's God" (U.S. Declaration of Independence, (DI)); and when government no longer respects these rights, the People, "appealing to the Supreme Judge of the World", has the right/duty to "alter...to institute new government...to affect their safety and happiness" (DI); and such action requires PRUDENCE, so that it "not be changed for light and transient causes" (DI).

These lofty principles (aspirations) were given structure with the gift of a written Constitution. It comes to us with the scars of war, the wounds of a house divided (Abraham Lincoln), the burden of past failures, and yet it endures as a beacon to the "tired...poor...huddled masses yearning to be free...the refuse of your teeming shore" (Emma Lazarus).

The U. S. Declaration and U.S. Constitution both reflect America as an experiment as to whether "a nation conceived in liberty can long endure" (Gettysburg Address). This contingency echoes the words of Ben Franklin when asked what the 'Genius Generation' had produced: "A republic IF YOU CAN KEEP IT."

In order to keep the Republic and "the Flag for which it stands", much depends on its religious-moral foundation (John Adams). This task of stewardship was best expressed by Fulton Sheen as the storm clouds of World War II were gathering: "Christianity has a new battle before it....a freedom that is independent of God, independent of the moral law, and independent of inalienable rights as the endowment of the Divine Spirit....America will save her stars and stripes by grounding them on other stars and stripes than those that are on the flag; namely, the stars and stripes of Christ, by whose stars we have been illumined and by whose stripes we have been healed." (A Declaration of Dependence, p.p.121-22).
