SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email **cre@olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.



Strength in Weakness

Is Paul serious? Can you imagine being content with "weaknesses, insults, hardships, and persecutions?" (2Cor 12:10) Paul never specifies what that "thorn in the flesh" was. I used to think it referred to a physical weakness, or disability. But some of the commentaries I've read say that it was a person who opposed Paul (think of a "thorn in my side.") That opponent may have been a

Christian who Paul did not want to mention by name.

Paul could have been proud of all that God revealed to him, and of all that he accomplished in spreading the gospel. He sees that "thorn" as God's way of keeping him humble. So instead he boasts about his weaknesses. He knows that all the good work he has done have been accomplished by Christ. So he accepted suffering, rejection, setbacks and persecution because they helped him see how much Christ was doing through him.

We can learn a lot from St. Paul. Remember how Jesus said to love your neighbor as yourself. Paul loved himself in the good sense of accepting his faults and weaknesses. He was always aware that he once persecuted Christians. But that fault enabled him to experience God's forgiveness. I usually try to avoid doing things that show my weaknesses. That means I might miss a chance to see how God can help. Suppose you don't know how to swim, so you stay out of swimming pools. Of course, then you could never learn to swim. But if you get in the water and let someone teach you, you might just find yourself liking the water.

St. Paul says that when he is weak, then he is strong. He knows that God will still work through him, showing God's power to heal the sick and draw converts to Christ, in spite of Paul's weaknesses. Paul did what he could to encourage others to follow Jesus, but he knew the results of his preaching and healing were up to God. When you think that you would fail at spreading the faith, remember Paul and give your weaknesses to God. Then see what he can do! Tom Schmidt,

Straight Talk

Human Dignity:
In the Beginning and Forever

The Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith issued a significant teaching entitled, <u>Dignitas Infinita</u> ("Infinite Dignity", 4/15/2024), inviting Catholics, and people of good will, to <u>expand</u> the scope of one's conscience and consciousness in respecting the dignity of <u>each</u> human person. This expansion is to include persons (and issues) too often treated like Lazarus outside the door of the rich man ("dives", Latin for "rich man", Lk 16: 19-31) - in need of respect and <u>recognition</u> as a human

being. (He too is a son of Abraham).

Not surprising given today's bipolar world, supporters and dissenters rushed to their bunkers preparing for the "clear and present danger" (a Vatican document): the "it didn't go far enough" warriors in one trench, and the "Church is off the rails" across the way. Those who dared to venture into the "no true believer" zone advocating civility, listening, prayerful reflection, and dare one say it - HUMAN DIGNITY -, both sides at last found common ground - vomiting over the lukewarm (Rev 3: 15-18). Perhaps we may yet see the day when extremism is exposed as fear driven, power hungry, and a lack of faith in the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit (Mt 10: 19).

A question: Isn't the talk of reasoning together and moderating one's criticisms just a tactic to mute disapproval and avoid honest evaluation? No. Questioning and respectful, thoughtful criticism, are <u>not</u> the enemies of truth. They are the active mind at prayer. Properly done it takes <u>courage</u> to question and <u>humility</u> to receive it as <u>gift</u>. Criticism and inquiry are not the enemies of truth-seeking, but the nutrients for a proper welcoming of the "Spirit of truth [who] will guide you into all the truth...and he will tell you what is yet to come." (Jn 16: 13). Larry Chapp writes, "...let our criticisms be out of charity and grounded in a measured sobriety. If not, we run the risk of becoming nothing but a grumbler." (<u>National Catholic Register</u>, 4/18/2024).


The adventure of Faith Seeking Understanding is an ongoing one. The Church is at once historical, a community of pilgrim-disciples within the webbing flow of time. At the same time, the Church in its origin, foundation, mission, and destiny "transcends it [history]. It is only 'with the eyes of faith' that one can see her in her visible reality and...in her reality as bearer of divine life." (CCC, No. 770). The Church Jesus entrusted to the Apostles and their successors, is commissioned to preach and teach and pastorally care for God's people. These charisms (graces of the Holy Spirit), are not separate, but are united in order to "preserve God's people from deviations and defections and to guarantee them the objective possibility of professing the true faith without error." (CCC, No. 890). The Good Shepherd (Jn 10: 11), provides the model for exercising both the teaching and pastoral ministry: the bishops, with priests as co-workers, are to be aware of their "own weaknesses...[and] have compassion for those who are ignorant and erring. He should not refuse to listen to [those] whose welfare he promotes...". (CCC, No. 896, Heb. 4: 14-16).


