SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.



Bible Verses for the Year!

July—KINDNESS

A friend owes kindness to one in despair... Job 6:14

Tend the Flock: In today's first reading from Jeremiah we hear the Lord in agony over the shepherds he has called to tend to his flock. Jeremiah shares God's words: "You have scattered my sheep and driven them away. You have not cared for them, but I will take care to punish your evil deeds." It could be easy to look at this and think about the faults of priests and bishops over the centuries, but I read this and hear Jeremiah talking to me and to all of us. Vatican II was very clear that as lay people we are all called to preach the Good News, to engage the culture, to help bring people into the Church, and to show love to all we meet. Pope Paul VI stated: "As sharers in the role of Christ as priest, prophet, and king, the laity have their work cut out for them in the life and activity of the Church. Their activity is so necessary within the Church communities that without it the apostolate of the pastors is often unable to achieve its full effectiveness." (*Apostolicam Actuositatem*, section 10)



Let's reflect on that for a second. The pope said that if we do not evangelize and fulfill our offices of priest, prophet, king, then pastors cannot be truly effective. See how the words from Jeremiah start to apply to us today? I think there is an ideology that has crept into the Church that as long as we are nice and treat others well then people will somehow make the connection that we are Christian and we don't need to explicitly evangelize. Of course, this doesn't work. Any number of people can be nice and caring without being Christian. Christ makes it clear in the Gospels: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

In order for us to respond to the call of Christ we have to ask for the courage to be explicit about our faith. Living a good life is not enough. Everyone has different strengths and spiritual gifts, so maybe you are not personally called to go into the streets and talk to people about Jesus or to give a public talk at a youth group, but there is something specific that God is calling you to do. Maybe it is talking with a coworker or someone at the gym who has questions or maybe even someone on staff at the parish who needs some help. Let's pray today that we might realize how God is calling each of us to evangelize in our own way. Jesus has chosen us to be instruments of his love, peace, and mercy. Let's answer the call and preach the Gospel to all those we meet. From all of us here at Diocesan, God bless! By Tommy Shultz

The Sixteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Chorus of Courage

"What hath God wrought?". Such was the first long-distance telegraph message sent by Samuel F. B. Morse, from the U.S. Capitol to a railroad station in Baltimore (1844). The message was proposed by Annie Ellworth. The quotation was taken from the Bible (Num 23:23).

In today's techno-wired world, the quotation might be: "What new gadget has Silicon Valley created?" This question suggests an expecta-

tion that the latest "must have" trinket will soon be replaced by the next "must have" device. This is the cycle of Silicon Darwinism discard the latest in order to make room for the "newest, latest best". The secular religion of Progress has become uncritically accepted if our quality of life is to be maintained. And to make sure WE are on the "cutting edge" of TOMORROW. To question the Religion of Progress and the Silicon clergy, is to be labeled and libeled as "anti-scientific", hence counted among the "new unclean", exiled to the tombs of the UNFRIENDED!

What if along with the latest wonder from the Valley, and the mandated "Alleluia, alleluia", it births a culture and mentality of RE-PLACEMENT, driven by the categorical imperative: "All that is new is best". All that is yesterday <u>must</u> be <u>discarded</u> in favor of what is NOW and what is YET TO BE? What if such a culture and mind-set trickles out from our machines and infiltrates our values when it comes to life, the dignity of the human person, and to a society that calculates life in terms of cost/benefit analysis?

To seriously engage such questions, is to exhibit a social death wish, or an act of courage; a voice crying in the modern wilderness of the culture of death.

There were <u>and</u> are such public voices: St. Pope John Paul II condemned, "whatever insults human dignity, such as subhuman conditions...where people are treated as mere instruments of gain.... They [conditions] poison human society, and they do more harm to those who practice them, than to those who suffer from the injury." (<u>Evangelium Vitae</u>, 1995, No. 3).

Pope Benedict XVI, teaches that to be pro-life, is to be a witness to issues of social justice. He advocates an ethic that is integral and intergenerational: "Our duties towards the environment are linked to our duties toward the human person.... It would be wrong to uphold one set of duties while trampling on the other." (Caritas in Veritate, 2004).

Pope Francis preaches powerfully against what he terms, "the throwaway culture". Such a culture emerges as the result of a "culture of relativism" and the "absence of objective truths or sound principles". Pope Francis writes: "Is it not the same relativistic logic which justifies buying the organs of the poor...or eliminating children because they are not what their parents wanted? This same use and throw away logic generate so much waste...when the culture itself is corrupt and objective truth and universally valid [moral] principles are no longer upheld, then laws can only be seen as arbitrary impositions or obstacles to be avoided." (Laudato si, 2015, No. 123).
