SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

The Prophet's Profit

It's no coincidence that the first reading shows the prophet Elisha feeding a crowd of people like Jesus in the gospel. If you want to compare miracles, Elisha did his first, but Jesus did it better. Elisha had a hundred people to feed with twenty barley loaves and a handful of fresh grain. Jesus had five thousand people and only five loaves and a couple fish. So was Jesus trying to show up Elisha?

Neither Jesus nor Elisha ever did a miracle for their own benefit. The very next story in 2 Kings about Elisha is the one where he cured Naaman, the king's servant, of leprosy. (2 Kgs 5:1:19) When Naaman realized he was cured, he came back to Elisha and offered him a gift in thanksgiving. Elisha refused the gift, because it would imply that Elisha did the miracle, while the prophet knew that God had cured him. Jesus also refused to benefit from feeding the crowds. They came to take him away and make him king, but he went up to his place of prayer on the mountain. Jesus' miracle of feeding the five thousand was not done just for the crowd. He was using it to teach the disciples something important. He knew there would be times when they felt they were not holy enough or good enough preachers, to spread the gospel over the world. So he showed them what God can do with our meager abilities.

There are millions of people hungry for the good news that Jesus brings to the world. Remember the miracle of the loaves when you only have a few dollars to give to the missions, when you're not sure you know enough to teach someone about Jesus, when you don't know how to invite someone to come back to church. And remember that you do those things, not to make you look holy, but to let God show his loving power.

The Seventeenth Sunday of Ordinary Time



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri **Sticks and Stones**

"Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me." Such was often told to a child confronted by the "mean kids" in school or the playground. This piece of folk wisdom was true...up to a point. However, it was the "point" beyond the "broken bones" where the real pain lingered.

Even a child, most especially a child knows, feels, the power of words to inflict pain. Children feel acutely the damage murderous words inflict. Not only in the moment,

but can be a lasting part of one's identity and overall approach to life. For example, a child who is constantly told he/she is unloved, untalented, or a failure, is wounded in ways that don't appear on an X-ray. The scars are buried deep in the psyche and soul. Words can be lethal, like missiles which destroy families, communities, and nations.

The Apostle James in his universal epistle writes: "...the tongue is a small member and yet has great pretensions...no human being can tame the tongue.... With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth comes blessing and cursing." (Jas 3:5, 8:9-10). The ways in which we use words reflect more than one's vocabulary. They reveal the condition of the soul: "A good person...in his heart produces good...an evil person...produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks." (Lk 6:45). The same is true of nations.

The words of an evil heart are "earthly, unspiritual, demonic." Such speech yields a bitter harvest of "jealousy and selfish ambition" (Jas 3:15). When our grasping for power is endangered, our passions are enflamed, we easily turn to inciting conflicts, wage war, and kill. By contrast, "the wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable, gentle, compliant, full of mercy...[for] righteousness is sown in peace." (Jas 3:17-18, 4:1-2).

Jesus and James are reminding us of the real struggle, the one that began in Eden and CONTINUES throughout history; the conflict between the City of God and the City of Man (St. Augustine). St. Paul writing to the Ephesians does not mince words: "For our struggle is not with flesh and blood but the principalities, with the powers, with the world rulers of this present darkness, with the evil spirits in the heavens." (Eph 6:12). The Second Letter of Peter recognizes this SPIRITU-AL struggle: "Your opponent the devil is prowling around like a roaring lion looking for [someone] to devour." (2 Pt 5:8).

This struggle against Satan is NOT frozen in the Bible. It is an ever-present danger, as current as the attempted assassination of the former President Donald Trump (7/14/2024). From the Garden of Eden (Gen 2 and 3) to the crucifixion on Calvary (Mt 27:33-44), the work of the Evil One is sowing distrust, division, and death. By contrast, the gifts of the Spirit are: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord (Isa 11:1-2). The fruits of these gifts are: charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty and self-control. (Gal 5:22-23).

Today's current rhetoric often aims at dehumanizing and demonizing and in effect, polluting the cultural environment.

The labeling and libeling of an opponent as an "existential threat to democracy", such as attributed to a former President, invites, nay requires, extermination. The real lethal threats to democracy are godless communism, fascist state worship, and the enflaming of passions which yield mob violence and assas-

There is the need to refocus the purpose of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The cultural environment of boiler hot rhetoric melts away the ozone layer of civility. The smog and air pollution spewed by elites choke the ability to breathe free and see clearly. The muddy waters of ideology prevent drinking the spring water of truth, and the emissions from hate speech suffocates the promotion of life.


What are we to do? We must acknowledge our struggle is SPIRITUAL. Also, just laws and institutions are necessary, but NOT sufficient. "Therefore, put on the armor of God...resist the evil...hold your ground...stand fast...girded in truth...your feet shod in readiness for the gospel of peace...hold faith as a shield...and the sword of the Spirit...be watchful with all perseverance...that speech may be given to open [the] mouth, to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel..." (Eph 6:13-20).


