### **Sacraments**



**SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM**: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at **www.olphbc.org** to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email **cre@olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION**: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

**SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION**: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

### Religious Education

### **Religious Education**

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. **SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:** Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.





### **What Makes** You Happy?

St. James message of peace is as true now as it was two thousand years ago. Where else do wars and terrorism

come from, than people holding on to wealth, power, or hatred? But the message James shares, and that of Jesus in the gospel, is a simple call to be different. Neither of them condemns anyone. They call us to look at what we really want and what truly brings happiness.

Jesus' disciples argued about who was greatest. We are no different today. We have to learn that having the latest gadget, the most expensive cellphone, or the latest-model car are at best temporary delights. And that being admired by acquaintances is never as lasting as loving someone for themselves. Can we learn to be more excited about what God has done for us than what we did to improve our home? Can we share our faith in God's mercy instead of bragging about our golf or bowling scores?

St. James ends our second reading with a challenging statement: He says we ask but don't receive because we ask wrongly. How often do we desire things that won't really make us happy? ### The Twenty-Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time



### **Straight Talk** by: Father William Maestri Let's ALL be FAIR!

The best window into the American soul was written by Alexis de Tocqueville (1805-54) during his visit to America (he visited New Orleans). His Democracy in America (Vols. I-IV), are a true classic. As the parish fair is about to begin, his thoughts about association and participation are helpful.

Civic associations (citizens voluntarily joining together for some common purpose), in their number and variety, were considered a unique aspect of American life: Tocqueville wrote:

"Americans of all ages, conditions, and all dispositions, constantly unite together.... To hold fetes, found seminaries...construct churches...dispatch missionaries...establish hospitals, prisons, schools...if they wish to highlight a truth...they form [an association]."

Tocqueville believed that associations exist for two reasons. First, to solve common problems: "Among democratic nations all citizens are independent; they can achieve nothing by themselves...a state of impotence, if they do not learn to help each other voluntarily." Second, associations draw individuals out of their "comfort zones", and this helps citizens to appreciate the daily challenges others face. One's narrow, protective bubble of concern is burst open to a wider perception and perspective of life together. Furthermore, the individual must learn to work with others and their differing gifts. In so doing, the individual can learn the "people skills" of collaboration, compromise, and investing in the common good. For Tocqueville this was "The only way opinions and ideas can be renewed, hearts enlarged and minds developed...through the reciprocal influence of men upon each other."

The importance of civic associations is their MEDIATING role between an isolating individualism (Me-ism) and a large, central paternalistic government (Big Brother/ Nanny State), which produces "a flock of timid and hardworking animals." Tocqueville's valuing of civic associations reflects two basic principles of Catholic Social Thought (CST): solidarity (a walking with those in need and promoting the common good, CCC, Nos. 2437-49), and subsidiarity (respecting the gifts and wisdom of the local community, CCC, No. 1883). Tocqueville held that the local labs of social well-being originated within the dynamic genius of local associations: "the knowledge of how to form associations is the mother of all knowledge since the success of all the others depend on it."

The parish fair is a prime example of civic association and Church community. Of the many meanings of the word 'parish', the Ancient Greek (paroikos) means, "dwelling beside". Hence, a parish is a group of people who share a common space. A Catholic parish fair is also the sharing of a common faith, a faith which is 'catholic' as to universal - "all y'all come!" Events of food, feasting, and fun, strengthen bonds of friendship and establish new ones. A parish fair reminds us we are stronger together than alone; more blessed when we welcome the gifts of others; and less isolated when discovering there is much more common ground than battle ground we share with others.

A parish fair is one which embraces PARTICIPATION - a gathering of the many to affirm the common good (CCC, Nos 1913-17). The various barriers of race, creed, gender, politics, etc. that separate, crumble in the light of a common humanity shared in Jesus Christ: "There is neither Jew or Greek, slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Gal 3:28).

A parish fair is a grace-moment in which the civic and religious spheres transcend a wall of separation, build bridges of cooperation, and brings forth the "finer angels" (Lincoln) which "improve the conditions of human life." (CCC, No. 1916).

Finally, a parish fair signals a future to hope in. How? A parish fair connects the generations - the zest of the young (novice) with the wisdom of the veteran, drawing from the heart those treasures too often buried and unappreciated (Mt 13:44-6). The parish fair uncovers real treasures and recognizes lasting value. The parish fair extends beyond the present and encourages us "to think that the future of humanity is in the hands of those who are capable of providing the generations to come with reasons for life and optimism [HOPE]". (Gaudium et spes 30.1).

May these days be times of unity in the Spirit, who gives "different forms of service...but [it is] the same God who produces all of them in everyone [for] some benefit...the same Spirit produces all of these." (1 Cor 12:4-11). Amen.
