**SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM**: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at <a href="www.olphbc.org">www.olphbc.org</a> to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. **SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION**: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

**SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION**: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

# Religious Education

## **Religious Education**

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. **SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:** Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

**PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION:** Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.







#### **By His Poverty We are Filled**

"Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." (Mk 10:21). Particularly in today's society, we tend to center ourselves around instant gratification. The newest trends that money can buy hold a constant allure since we can get them

off Amazon with just the click of a mouse. Yet most are afraid or ignorant of what to expect after death. Heavenly treasures await us if we are not first distracted by the false riches we may be exposed to here on Earth. Food, material possessions and earthly comforts are temporary, whereas reliance on Christ allows for eternal salvation.

Those who by worldly standards are considered first today may be last tomorrow at Christ's second coming. The Litany of Humility has always helped keep me grounded, reiterating the importance of loving others rather than seeking that love that we desire for ourselves. As Christians, we must ask ourselves if we take the time to tend to those most in need and live in service first to one other. We must recall the big picture, that as Christians we have the blessing to be able to spend eternity in the presence of God's great love, if we choose to emulate that love during the short time we have here on Earth. This is best demonstrated by the love Christ displays for us poor sinners by dying on the cross. Instead of seeking comfort and security we are called to depend on God always, following His example of love.

Ultimately, we must never be afraid to break open our hearts in front of others for Christ. The life of a Christian is often going to be messy. If we're not suffering alongside Christ, we are not giving our all to Him. We must take up our cross, and not hold back nor be ashamed. The Lord is worth so much more than the sum of our fears and doubts. And in the end, He does not demand much at all. Simply that we love Him with all our heart and love our neighbor as ourselves. It is generally believed that Luke was a gentile doctor. He was a good. kind man who came to know the Lord from the great apostle Paul.

After he had become a Christian, he sometimes traveled with Paul. Luke was a great help to him in spreading the faith. The Bible calls Luke "the beloved physician."

St. Luke is the author of two books in the Bible: the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. Although he did not meet Jesus while the Lord was on this earth, he wanted to write about him for new converts. So he talked to those who had known Jesus. He wrote down all that they had seen the Lord do and heard him say. It is Luke who tells us some of the best-known stories about Jesus. Luke tells us the story of the first Christmas. He tells about Jesus lost in the Temple when he was twelve years old. He also tells us the story of Zaccheus the tax collector, who climbed the tree to see Jesus. Luke repeats for us the parables of the good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. Luke also wrote the story of how the apostles began to teach the message of Jesus after he went back to heaven. It is in Luke's book, the Acts of the Apostles, that we learn how the Church began to grow and spread. St. Luke is the patron saint of painters and doctors. We are not sure when or where Luke died. #### The Punch Line

The first reading is supposed to remind us of Solomon, choosing wisdom over wealth or power. In the scriptures wisdom means doing and we will sing for joy! God's will in all things. As Jesus tried to tell the man in the gospel,

knowing and doing God's will is more precious than wealth, or even family!

So if wisdom is that good, why do so few seek it? Most of us have no problem doing God's will, as long as it is the same as ours. Or we do God's will if it is painless and convenient. Sometimes we are like that man in the gospel, desiring wisdom but not willing to pay for it.

Maybe our problem is that we don't trust God enough. The first reading, after praising wisdom more than health, wealth, and beauty, ends with a promise of "countless riches" while Jesus promises that the one who gives up everything will receive "a hundred times more." Because the rich man left in sorrow, he missed the punch line.

I can think of two ways to interpret that promise. One is that the more we give up for love of the Lord, the more we get back. The other is finding that what truly makes us happy is knowing we are loved by God and responding with love for others. Tom Schmidt

# Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Importance of Humor

Beware! A new virus has been detected. NO, it's not foreign born. This invader is <u>domestic</u> and does damage to the brain's "higher functions". Specifically, it impairs the brain's HUMOR centers. In severe cases, the afflicted have lost the capacity to "laugh at oneself". At the same time, one takes oneself "too seriously". We might label this new virus: Humor Deficiency Syndrome (HDS). Its more common names are "sourpuss", "malcontent", "wet blanket", "kill joy", and even "crepehanger".

You might think I'm kidding. Never! I would never kid about the loss of the kidding capacity! The

loss of a sense of humor is just as tragic, if not more so, than the loss of taste, touch, feel, smell, and sight. Needless to say (why say it then?), this is no laughing matter!

If you doubt its existence, just spend a few minutes in the grocery store, drive on the highway at "rush hour", and for the real skeptics, indulge in viewing your favorite cable talk show. Any of these will convince the most hardened agnostic of HDS's existence: the grocery store is the jungle where only those with the sharpest elbows survive (Darwin); only the suicidal dare drive without a rosary and checking the auto and life insurance policies, and watching cable talk-shows, gladiators 2.0, is to risk becoming a Prozac pill popper. No, this is no time for humor! It's time for our Lenten ashes and sack cloth; for tragedy, lamentation, and the funeral bell. Resurrect Calvin and bury G.K. Chesterton.

In the past several decades, mental health professionals have produced a number of studies correlating a sense of humor with physical and mental well-being. For example, researchers G. Galloway and A. Cropley (<u>HUMOR</u>, 1999), examined "numerous empirical studies [which] indicate that, in general, humor can beneficially influence mental health. Specifically, it has been observed that humor as a response is associated with a <u>reduction</u> in some <u>existing</u> mental health problems...a sense of humor appears to <u>moderate</u> the perceived intensity of negative life events". What are the benefits of humor? <u>Web MD (</u>2009), lists the following: organ stimulation, stress relief, rapid blood circulation which takes away tension and yields calmness, improved immune system, pain relief, and improvement in one's coping ability by connecting with others for support.

In addition to the mental and physical benefits of humor, it is a grace-filled aid to SANCTITY (holiness). Both mental health professionals and spiritual directors share common ground in finding a developed sense of humor present in those who engage life with a hopeful outlook, a generous spirit of giving, and a keen sense of discerning when humor hurts or heals. (Dan Brennan, M.D. 2023). There is a prudent difference between laughing <u>at</u>, as opposed to laughing <u>with</u> others.

St. Lawrence the Martyr (225-258 AD), is honored as the "Patron Saint of Comedians". And with good reason. Lawrence was summoned to Rome and ordered to bring all the Church's wealth as tribute to the Emperor Valerian. Lawrence requested three days to complete the demand. During that time, he gathered the poor, sick and all those considered of no account. When he returned, Lawrence said to the Prefect, "This is the Church's treasure...the Church is truly rich, far richer than your emperor." Lacking a sense of humor, the Prefect ordered Lawrence to be roasted "little by little" over a flaming grill. At one point, Lawrence said to the "grill master", "I am well done on this side. You can turn me over." All the while he continued to pray for the conversion of Rome. Finally, Lawrence said, "It is cooked enough now". He died a martyr's death in 258 AD.

Centuries later, St. Thomas More (1478-1535), who would be beheaded by King Henry VIII for his refusal to accept Henry as head of the Church of England, for refusing to support the King's divorce of Catherine and subsequent "marriage" to Anne Boleyn. St. Thomas left behind the following "Prayer for Good Humor": "Grant me a healthy body, and the necessary good humor to maintain it.... Grant me, O Lord, a sense of good humor...the grace to be able to take a joke to discover in life a bit of joy."

Recently, Pope Francis hosted a gathering of comedians from around the world. During the festivities, the Pope quoted from his "Apostolic Letter", Gaudete et exaultate: "...the saints are joyful and full of good humour. Though completely realistic, they radiate a positive and hopeful spirit."

How could WE be anything but joyful, hopeful, and life affirming? After all, on that first Easter evening, unto those first Easter disciples, locked behind the doors of fear, Jesus appears "and said to them 'Peace be with you'.... The disciples rejoiced..." (Jn 20:19-23).

Through our modern doors of fear once again Jesus is present and says, "have peace in me...take courage, I have conquered the world." (Jn 16:23).
