SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

OLPH School News







Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of the 2025 Liturgical Year. The Advent season includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.

In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle

C). Today's Gospel is taken from the last chapter before the passion narrative in which Jesus is teaching in the Temple. We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. This passage marks the conclusion of a lengthy dialogue in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, warns about the persecution and tribulations to follow, and identifies the signs that will signal the coming of the Son of Man in glory.

The community for whom Luke wrote his Gospel may have believed that they were already experiencing some of the events Jesus described. Most scholars believe that Luke's Gospel was written after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 A.D. At the time, many Christians interpreted this event as an indication that Jesus' second coming was near.

Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear, Jesus indicates that others will be frightened; Jesus' disciples are not to fear, but are to stand tall. Yet Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or tribulations. He encourages his disciples to pray for strength. The early Christian communities did not find consolation in the promise of a utopia, nor should we. Instead, we find in our Christian faith the means by which we witness to God's unfailing love for us in all circumstances.

Jesus' predictions about the end times may sound dire, but in the next paragraph Luke tells us that people woke early to listen to Jesus' teaching in the Temple area. In his person and in his message, those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation. Like the first Christians, we may encounter events and circumstances that could lead us to despair. Through prayer, however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus' words and in his continuing presence with us to endure all things and to witness to the action of God in our World. https://s3staging.lovolapress.com/catholic-resources/liturgical-year/sunday-connection/first-sunday-of-advent-cycle-c-sunday-connection/

The **Advent wreath** is a familiar symbol of the Advent and Christmas season. Traditionally, the Advent wreath is a circle of evergreen branches and is often decorated with berries and pinecones. Both the evergreen branches and the circular shape symbolize the passing of time and eternal life. The Advent Wreath traditionally holds four candles (three purple

and one pink) which are lit, one at a time, on each of the four Sundays of the Advent season. Each candle represents 1,000 years. Added together, the four candles symbolize the 4,000 years that humanity waited for the world's Savior—from Adam and Eve to Jesus, whose birth was foretold in the Old Testament. The shape of the wreath, with no beginning or end, reflects the complete and endless love that Jesus has for us. During the Advent season, we eagerly anticipate his coming and the promise of eternal life in heaven with him.

Candle Name: the Prophecy Candle

The First Week of Advent Represents: Hope (reminding us that Jesus is coming)

Candle Color: Purple



First Sunday of Advent



Straight Talk

by: Father William Maestri Advent: God's Divine Comedy As a way into the holy season of Advent, please consider the following:

It is done. Once again the Fire has penetrated the earth. Not with the sudden crash of thunderbolt, Riving the mountain tops: Does the Master break down doors to enter his own home? Without earthquake, or thunderclap: The flame has lit up the whole world from within. (Pierre Teilhard de Chardin [1881-1955], from Hymn of the Universe]

Before proceeding further, a word of clarification about the title of this column. It may seem at first blush to be irreverent, if not sacrilegious. Such is NOT the case. For the Bible and the Christian Story are a play in three acts: Creation, Redemption, and the Afterlife. The subplot of the play, which joins the three acts into a whole, is COMEDY rightly understood. That is, the word 'comedy' has its roots in the Greek, "koma" as in sleep, not a state of unconsciousness, but a condition of dreaming in which the unexpected, mysterious, and impossible are possible. The visionary is one who wakes up and dreams! The three acts of God's Divine Comedy challenge the ways in which we believe God should act and the world should work. The season of Advent is the middle act which reverences MEMORY (has Been) while living forward in HOPE (will be).

Advent, thick in the fabric of time, requires a looking back to Eden and the tragic loss of Original Innocence and the expulsion from paradise (comedy and tragedy are sides of the one human drama). However, banishment does NOT mean abandonment. The God, one and true, shocks all expectations. God promises that sin will not have the last word. A new phase will commence, namely, the pledge of a Redeemer who will heal the breach between God, humanity, and all creation (Gen 3:15/ protoevangelium- the good news that "where sin abounded, grace did much more" (Rom 5:20-21)). How this will happen is beyond our great expectations. (1Cor 2:9).

God's Divine Comedy unfolds east of Eden down the long road of history. Specifically, the love-comedy between God and Israel. This part of Act I, involves the good (Noah, Gen 7:1; Abraham, Gen 12:1), the bad (Nebuchadnezzar and the destruction of the Temple in 597 BC), and the ugly (Jezebel, whose wickedness disfigured her soul by persecuting the prophets and instituting the worship of Ba'al, 1Kgs 16:2 - 2Kgs 9). For "comic relief", God raises up Jonah as a most successful prophet in terms of conversion of the sinful (Jn 3:6-10). However, Jonah becomes God's reluctant prophet to the point that he prays, "Lord, please take my life...for it is better for me to die than to live." (Jon 4:3). Jonah's success is his torment! Jonah doesn't want repentance, but destruction, not mercy, but damnation. God will have none of Jonah's "comical" histrionics. Finally, the Divine Comedy displays a delicious sense of irony. God raises up the Persian King Cyrus who, after defeating the Babylonians, allows for the return of the exiles to Jerusalem and the rebuilding of the Temple (2Chron 36:22): "The Lord...has...charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem.... All among you...who belong to his people, may their God be with them, let them go up." (2Chron 36:23).

The passage from Act I into Act II is expressed by St. Paul who writes: "...when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to ransom those under the law, so that we might receive adoption." (Gal 4:4-7). Fast forward thirty-three years to Golgotha. We are informed that on or about three o'clock, "Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last." (Mk 15:37). A centurion guard was moved to proclaim, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" (Mk 15:39). It is "reasonable" to conclude - end of the Divine Comedy. No need for Act III.

However, there will be an Act III. After a three day interlude in the tomb (bodily), an angel announces: "He is not here, for he has been raised just as he said." (Mt 28:6). Furthermore, the two women are to go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and he is going before you to Galilee, there you will see him."" (Mt 28:7). When Jesus meets the women on their way he says, "Do not be afraid." (Mt 28:10). These women carry the message of the Resurrection and pass it on to His "disciples". Salvation history, from Eden to the empty tomb, is God's Divine Comedy. The Third Act is a commencement, a fulfillment and a whole new, unimagined way of human existence and the meaning of history. The curtain has NOT been drawn. The Divine Comedy continues until He comes again. The Church, the community of disciples in each age, is an Advent Church. Saint John Paul II preached the following: "...we must understand that our whole life should be an "advent", in vigilant expectation of Christ's final coming...we must learn to recognize his presence in the events of daily life. Advent is then a period of intense training that directs us decisively to the One who has already come, who will come and who continuously comes." (December 18, 2002).

May we be that Advent people who proclaim and live the Great Mystery of Faith within the Divine Comedy: "Christ has died. Christ is Risen. Christ WILL COME AGAIN." One thing is clear: Satan's "victory lap" around Eden is short lived. For with the Crib, Cross, and empty Easter Tomb, the joke is on the Evil One. It is God who enjoys the last laugh. In the words of Shakespeare: "Many a true word hath been spoken in jest." (King Lear, 1606). Can WE enjoy God's Divine Comedy? Can WE laugh with God?
