SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.



The Third Week of Advent: **December 15, 2024**

Candle Name: The Shepherd's Candle

The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Third Sunday of Advent Candle Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus. How is Jesus inviting you to experience greater joy this Advent?

Matthew II:10

This Sunday's Gospel continues last week's focus on John the Baptist and his role in preparing the way for Christ. Recall that last week's reading described John's appearance in the desert and established his connection with the prophetic tradition of Israel. If we were to read Luke's Gospel continuously, we would learn about John the Baptist challenging the crowds who came to him and calling upon them to show

evidence of their repentance. John tells his listeners that they cannot rely on their lineage as Israelites because children of Abraham can be raised up from stones. Repentance, rather, must be observable in one's actions. Here, Luke is continuing to set up two important themes of his Gospel message: the Christian faith is expressed in one's actions, and the call to salvation is extended to everyone, Jews and Gentiles.

In today's Gospel reading, the crowds ask John the Baptist for specifics. What evidence of repentance is required? John replies by naming concrete actions: crowds should share their food and cloaks; tax collectors should be just; soldiers should act fairly. The concern for justice is a hallmark of Luke's Gospel.

When the crowd begins to wonder if John the Baptist might be the Messiah, John interprets his baptism and makes it clear that his ministry is in preparation for the Messiah. John the Baptist knows his place and role in God's plan of salvation. By encouraging the crowd to act similarly in accordance with their stations in life, John's teaching suggests that each person has a role to play in God's salvation. It is the great mystery of our salvation that God permits and even asks for human cooperation in his divine plans.

The third Sunday of Advent is also called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is a Latin word that means "rejoice." This name is taken from the entrance antiphon for Sunday's Mass, which is also echoed in today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians. Some people mark this Sunday by lighting a pink candle instead of a purple one on their Advent wreath. It is a reminder that the Advent season is a season of joy because our salvation is already at hand. https://sunday-connection/third-sunday-of-advent-cycle-c-sunday-connection/



Third Sunday of Advent



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Close Encounter of the Merciful Kind

The Season of Advent is short, intense, and not well liked by many within both secular and "religious" realms. Why? Advent is the Season that requires PATIENT WAITING. And on a deeper level it requires we prioritize mercy over condemnation.

We modern folk put time on a short leash. We want what we want NOW, better yet, YESTERDAY. We are addicted to the fast-food, computers, and sports (baseball and tennis have succumbed to the tyranny of the clock and the dollar; faster paced games = more eyeballs = higher incomes and ticket prices). The result of this vicious dynamic is a severe case of mental and emotional shrink-flation, that is, our capacity for concentration shrinks while our level of frustration (rage) inflates.

On the religious side of the Advent coin, the talk of patient waiting signals promises made but too often broken. History's passing parade of the "Real Thing" messiah is long; as long as the list of village idiots who blindly follow. We're tired of being scammed. We've become those "hard headed" realists (William James) who reject those "reasons of the heart which the mind knows not." (Blaise Pascal 1623-62). Before canceling Pascal, we might consider Shakespeare's Hamlet: "There are more things in heaven and earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy." At the time of Jesus' birth there was a heightened sense of great expectations. The long-promised Messiah was near at hand (Lk 3:15-17). The general consensus was the Messiah would restore Israel's glory as in the days of King David (2 Sam 5 and 6) - political independence and economic prosperity. However, God's Messiah is quite different than the one of Israel's making.

When the "fullness of time" (Gal 4:4) had come, we gaze on a newborn in a crib (a feeding bin), wrapped in swaddling cloths (discarded rags), inside a stable (inhospitable), and with field shepherds in attendance (poor and simple). These aspects point to deep theological meanings: Jesus is the food and drink for eternal life (Jn 6:51); swaddling clothes prefigure Jesus' burial; Jesus' "own" do not receive him (Jn 1:11), the Gospel includes the poor, simple, and rejected (Lk 4:18), and most stunning is the Word becomes fully human (Jn 1:14).

This solidarity with the poor, simple, and outcasts, is not the resume of the expected Savior. Worse still, this "King of the Jews" (Mt 27:37) is nailed to a cross between two criminals (Lk 23:33) and buried in a borrowed tomb (Lk 24:53). There were reports he had risen and was seen by more than 500 disciples (1Cor 15:6). Some have even claimed he will return soon and establish God's Kingdom of justice and peace. Such would NOT be the case (2Thes 2:1-17). As time goes by without Jesus' return in glory, two questions confront the early Church: When will Jesus return? And why the delay?

The "when" question has a modern ring to it. The disciples were eager for an answer right before the Ascension: "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom of Israel?" (Acts 2:6). Jesus' answer is direct: "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority." (Acts 1:7). The Church is to enter into a new Advent Season of waiting and preparing. However, the Spirit will be sent to strengthen and guide the Church down the corridor of history (Acts 2:8). This new Spirit guided time is anything but a time out. Rather, it is an urgent call for personal Christian maturity (2Thes 2:13-15). Furthermore, filled with the Spirit, the Church is to go forth into the whole world, without fear, and proclaim the Good News - "Jesus is Lord" (Acts 1:8; Mt 17:7; Acts 2:29-33).

Why the delay? The Second Letter of Peter faces this pressing and perennial question (complaint) head on. There are "scoffers" (like the "mockers" at the Crucifixion (Mt 27:41)) who claimed Jesus was not coming again (2 Pt 3:3). Again, the question: Why the delay? The response is as direct as the question: "The Lord does not delay his promise [Parousia], as some regard "delay", but he is PATIENT with you, not wishing that any should perish, but that ALL should come to repentance." (2Pt 3:8 -10). The patient, merciful, universal love of God is NEVER governed by TIMEX time.

The Church, People of God, is between sunrise and sunset (daily living), hence hold fast to this exhortation: "...be on your guard not to be led into error...and to fall from your own stability. But grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and savior Jesus Christ." (2Pt 3:17-18).

And now we return to our Advent time of waiting and preparing for the empty crib to be filled; and our empty hearts. In the darkness of night, we keep vigil for the Light that shines and is not overcome (Isa 9:2; Jn 1:3-13). What do we behold; ENCOUNTER? Pope Francis captures it beautifully: "[The Infant] is in fact the humility of God... taken to the extreme; it is love with which...he assumed our frailty...suffering...anxieties...desires...our limitations. The message that everyone was expecting... searching for in the depths of their souls, was none other than the tenderness of God...who looks upon us with eyes full of love...accepts our poverty...in love with our smallness.... The question put to us...by the Infant's presence is: do I allow God to love me?" (Pope Francis. The Infinite Tenderness of God, pp.22-23).
