SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

Fourth Sunday of Advent

Fourth Sunday

"Behold, the virgin shall be with child and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means "God is with us."

Matthew 1:23



On this the last Sunday before Christmas, our Gospel reading prepares us to witness Christ's birth by showing us how Jesus was recognized as Israel's long-awaited Messiah even before his birth. The Gospel turns our attention from the ministry of John the Baptist to the events that preceded John the Baptist's birth. The story of John the Baptist and his parents, Elizabeth and Zechariah, are reported only in Luke's Gospel. Luke pairs the birth of John the Baptist and Jesus, establishing John's early connection to the Messiah.

Our Gospel reading recalls Mary's actions after the announcement of Jesus' birth by the angel Gabriel. Mary goes to visit Elizabeth, her cousin, who is also with child. Elizabeth greets Mary with full recognition of the roles that they and their unborn children will play in God's plan for salvation. If we were to continue to read the verses that follow in Luke's Gospel, we would hear Mary respond to Elizabeth's greeting with her song of praise, the Magnificat. Both women recall and echo God's history of showing favor upon the people of Israel.

In Luke's Gospel the Holy Spirit helps reveal Jesus' identity as God to those who believe. Elizabeth is filled with the Holy Spirit and sings Mary's praise because she bears the Lord. We sing these words of praise to Mary in the Hail Mary. Even John the Baptist, the unborn child in Elizabeth's womb, is said to recognize the presence of the Lord and leaps for joy.

It is appropriate in this season of Advent that we consider the role of Mary in God's plan of salvation. Elizabeth describes Mary as the first disciple, as the one who believed that God's word to her would be fulfilled. Mary's faith enabled her to recognize the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to everyone. Because of this, Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan for salvation.



The Signs of God—Midnight Christmas Mass was always my favorite as a kid. We would get all dressed up and enter the beautiful Church with all the decorations and the nativity scene. It's like I can still smell the pine trees and see the glow of the Christmas lights. I think we probably all have memories that bring us back to the Christmas season. Whether it is the smell of freshly baked cookies or the Christmas ham roasting for hours, these physical signs point us back to memories and experiences that we have enjoyed.

The Gospel from the Christmas Mass during the Night proclaims, "For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord. And this will be a sign for you." This has me thinking about the importance of physical signs. Wedding rings are exchanged as a sign of commitment. Gifts are exchanged as a sign of love or friendship. In today's Gospel we have the signs of the manger and the swaddling clothes that are communicating to us that God has become flesh. Signs are important for us. The beautiful thing about the signs we have in the Catholic Church is that they go beyond mere symbols. Today we commemorate not just a sign of God's love in clothes and a structure, but we commemorate God literally taking on flesh to be a physical and effective sign of his

love. Not just a sign in the sense of symbolic representation, but a sign that is so real and so effective that it literally becomes what it signifies.

We see this played out in every Mass. We start with the Liturgy of the Word where we read from Scripture. But that Word, throughout the course of the Mass, becomes so living, so real, so physical, so effective, that the Word of God literally becomes flesh for us on the altar. This is the very thing we celebrate this Christmas season. We can think back to all the great symbols that plunge us deeply into beautiful memories of family life, but let's set aside some special time today to focus on the fact that God transcends all earthly signs and literally becomes one of us. He wants to be one with you and with me. If there is nothing else we take out of our celebrations today, I think it would do us well to focus on that reality. God loves you enough that he was born in a manger to have a relationship with you and one day be with you forever in paradise. From all of us here at Diocesan, Merry Christmas and God bless! 

Fourth Sunday of Advent



Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Advent: End and Beginning

An unknown sage once said: "anticipation is greater than participation". This seems to be so. The opened Christmas toys in the morning are ignored by the afternoon. Children of <u>all</u> ages are vulnerable to the Demon of "What's new?". Thanks to our tsunami of technological gadgets our ability to concentrate has shrunk. Our time horizon does not extend beyond the INSTANT, while our frustration and boredom with having to wait, or the repetition required to acquire a skill. However, even our participation or acquisition succumbs to the craving for the stimulation of the <u>novel</u> new thing,

or RELATIONSHIP. We moderns can find ourselves akin to the ancient Alexander the Great who after all his victories was found weeping because "he had no more worlds to conquer". Our tears come from the dread that Silicon Valley "has no new devices to conquer the old ennui".

Throughout history there is and will be until He comes again, the struggle between the Demon of Novelty and the Angel of Hope (Eph 6:12). Such a battle was present before the birth of Jesus. St. Luke reports that "the people were filled with expectations" for the promised Messiah. This 'great expectation' spawned a flood of speculation as to who it might be. Many were "asking in their hearts whether John might be the Messiah." John declares, "I am not". For "one mightier than I is coming who will baptize in the Holy Spirit and fire." He "with a winnowing fan will clear the threshing floor...gather the wheat into his barns, but the chaff he will burn with unquenched fire." (Lk 3:15-18). John, rather "was sent from God...to testify to the light. The true light...was coming into the world." (Jn 1:6-9). The testimony by John reaches its climax when he and two of his disciples watch Jesus walk by. John says to them, "Behold, the Lamb of God". The two disciples "... follow Jesus." (Jn 1:35-37). This brief encounter between two cousins (Lk 1:36) serves as a disclosure model for Christian discipleship and the Discipleship Church of the Lamb.

John as the "voice crying in the wilderness" (Jn 1:23) points to the supremacy of Jesus and says, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (Jn 3:30). John's disciples are to enter a new, deeper relationship, that is, they are to follow the "Lamb who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks before me, because he was before me'." (Jn 1:29-32). John is indicating the pre-existence and divinity of Jesus as the Son of God and the promised Savior (Jn 1:1-3).

By relinquishing his disciples to follow Jesus, John is revealing a deep level of love, that is, it is <u>not</u> that love which holds on (grasp), but that love which <u>surrenders the beloved to another</u> (the Father sending the Beloved Son for our Salvation; in secular fashion, when, in <u>Casablanca</u>, Rick (Bogart) sends Elsa (Bergman) to be with Victor (Henreid) so she can be free and part of her husband's mission). The true disciple dies to self, carries the cross of self-denial, and follow the One who is LIFE (Jn 14:6).

The mission of the Church of Disciples is <u>not</u> to point to itself but to reflect its Lord; the One around whom it knows <u>Who</u> it is, and to <u>Whom</u> it belongs. St. Ambrose (339 -397AD) transformed the pagan practice of moon and sun worship by viewing the Church as the moon "not with its own light but with that of Christ [not the sun but the true, eternal Light who is the SON of the Father]". This use of such pagan imagery is not a weakness but "thanks to the unshakable faith [in Jesus as Incarnate Word] ... [the Church enjoys] the wonderful freedom of introducing [this] into the beautiful images of God made flesh; of Jesus dying and rising." (<u>Myths</u>, p. 152. Hugo Rahner SJ).

The importance for those with Church authority to point to Jesus is indicated by the Risen Lord to Peter: "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." (Jn 21:16). The authority of those called to serve is not grounded primarily in an office but in the Person of Jesus the Christ. And Jesus is "among you [us] as one who serves." (Lk 22: 22-27).

The days of Advent are dwindling down to a previous few. It is the time for "Great Expectations", for God is about to unfold, and for us to behold, a "new thing", beyond our expectation, anticipation, and speculation - a revelation that infinitely exceeds our deepest longings. It will be a child, in a stable, lying in a crib, and surrounded by a virgin, a carpenter, and shepherds.

For now, the city of Bethlehem lies in slumber, but in a little while, the trajectory of history and the meaning of human existence will be forever altered. The God of the burning bush (Mount Sinai, Ex 3:1-6), and the God of a "gentle and quiet whisper" (1Kgs 19:11-14) will become human flesh! (Jn 1:14), "in a reality such that only God could create." (Pope Benedict. The Infancy Narratives, p. 56).

The empty crib will behold Emmanuel, "God is with us", to fulfill the promise of salvation made through the prophet Isaiah (Isa 7:14; Mt 1:23).

Come! In the stable there is always room for more. The end (Omega) is our new beginning (Alpha) - (Rev 22:13).
