**SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM:** Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at **www.olphbc.org** to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email **cre@olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION**: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

**SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION**: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: **www.olphbc.org**.

**SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:** Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

## Religious Education

### **Religious Education**

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. **SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:** Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

**PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION:** Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.



#### **Revolutionary Love**

"And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know-ow we are Christians by our love." The well-known song, written in the 1960's by Fr. Peter Scholtes, echoes today's Gospel. Sixty years later and two thousand years into Christianity, the song might seem trite or timid.

Sweet images of walking side-by-side, and hand-in hand; that's nice. In truth, though, it is so much more. It is, like today's Gospel, the call for a revolution.

Christ encourages his disciples to a revolutionary love, one unheard of in their time — a love that gives expecting nothing in return, a love that is neither earned nor deserved. Love those who hate you. Love those who hurt you. Forgive the unforgivable and have mercy on the merciless. There is nothing trite in this love. It is so unexpected, so counter-cultural, so revolutionary that it sets us apart. It is a generous, self-sacrificing, humbling love that makes the world wonder, "What is up with that?" There is nothing timid in this love. It is bold, strong, and steadfast. This love calls for the courage to stand in the wake of hate, cruelty, and injustice. This love calls for the fortitude to speak God's truth even when it's unpopular. No, not to judge or condemn, but to challenge and correct.

If I have run a wooded path and know that it opens to a cliff, what am I to say to another who is running headlong and full speed through the thicket? Does this powerful love step back and say, "Hey, you be you, friend. Who am I to judge?" Or does this steadfast love look the runner in the eye and urge him, "Hey, that path is dangerous. There's another way we can travel together." Of course it is the latter. What that runner does next and how he finishes is not mine to decide — that is between him and God — but the love of today's Gospel begs me to speak up in mercy.

This kind of love is downright supernatural; we are not capable of it on our own. Only with the strength of grace, only through Christ can we love like this, and when we do, He shines through. This love should set us apart so the troubled world might notice and long to know more.

Indeed, by the grace of God, they will know we are Christians by our love — by our humble, self-sacrificing, unexpected, bold, steadfast, merciful, revolutionary love. By Pamela Kavanaugh

Straight Talk

Are YOU Lonesome?

Admittedly, the title of this article can be a turn-off. Yet, from the beginning loneliness has been a challenge. After God speaks creation into existence, with all its adornments, it is pronounced "good" (Gen 1:25). It is with the creation of the human person; creation is declared to be "very good" (Gen 1:31). However, something was missing, the solitary human being needed a complementary partner, for "It is not good for the man to be alone." (Gen 2:18). Adam needed another one who was "bone of [his] bones and flesh of [his] flesh". Man needs woman "so that" the two of them become one body." (Gen 2:21-25). This <u>mutual</u> need for "the other", is built into our nature. To live for oneself alone is a <u>deforming</u> of our being, and a

denial of our being created in the image/likeness of God who is the Tri-unity of Persons - Three distinct Persons, united in Love, and one in Divine Being (Catechism of the Catholic Church, CCC, Nos. 232-267).

Tragically, sin enters and the Original Innocence of Eden becomes a place of alienation. The Primal Harmony of creation is torn asunder. Humanity becomes a stranger, an alien, in what was meant to be God's dwelling with the human race (Rev 21:3). But now humanity hides in fear and shame. The nuptial complementarity between the sexes is replaced by competition and division. Humanity and nature are at odds. Adam must work and survive by the sweat of his brow. Most of all, humanity is alienated from God. There are no more walks with God in the breeze (Spirit).

Sadly, the result is banishment. Sin has inflicted a wound which renders humanity <u>homeless</u> (Peter Berger, <u>The Homeless Mind</u>). There is no return to Eden. The entrance is blocked by "the cherubim and the fiery revolving sword". Humanity and history unfold east of Eden (Gen 3:14-24).

Throughout history and the unfolding of our all too human nature, loneliness has been a constant. Each age has its confrontation with loneliness. In the 1950's, it was captured by David Riesman's, The Lonely Crowd (1950), and more recently by Robert Putman's, Bowling Alone (2000). Since then, with the added presence of "social media" and techno-gadgets, there has been a dramatic increase in isolation, loneliness, depression, and thoughts of suicide especially among millennials and those of the "Z" Generation (Emile Durkheim, Suicide). The increased use of social media, the weakening of the traditional family bonds, the increased secularization of culture, and a lessening of participation in the life of one's local community have all contributed to increased loneliness and alienation. A growing number of relationships have become purely transactional and utilitarian (see the research by Yale Child Study Center and the American Psychological Association, both in 2024.)

The pathologies of loneliness, alienation, and rage have adversely affected the well-being of society and culture. Specifically, the horrific legacies of communism, Nazism and Fascism denied the existence of God, viewed the human personas a means only to be offered up as a sacrifice to the glory of the State or some ideology, and glorified the Leader to a divine status. Such dystopia is driven by the love of power and not the power of love.

These 'boot and bayonet' totalitarianisms have for the most part given way to a 'cat's paw' approach in which Big Brother (1984) is replaced by Big Data. The New Totalitarian's weapon of choice is the computer. Its ammunition is the logarithm and algorithm which collects our choices, in effect, we choose therefore we are! Our being is reduced to a puny, everchanging collection of preferences. There is no innate sacred foundation or dignity proper to the human person.

This mercurial view of the person offers a "soft target" for those who seek power - economic and political. Our desires, values, and beliefs can be collected so as to yield a profile for the most <u>effective</u> way to achieve some goal(s). This ability to collect data also yields the power to DIRECT and produce NEW PREFERENCES. The power to direct behavior enhances propaganda and obliterates the truth which sets us free (Jn 8:31). The great political philosopher Hannah Arendt (1906-1975), wrote: "The truth is that the masses grew out of the FRAGMENTS OF A HIGHLY ATOMIZED society .... The chief characteristic of the mass man...[is] his ISOLATION and LACK OF NORMAL SOCIAL RELATIONSHIPS." (The Origins of Totalitarianism, 1951).

The socially isolated individual, filled with loneliness and rage, is attracted to extremist groups which advocate violence, even assassinations (Brett Kavanaugh and Donald Trump). The goal is destruction without construction.

What might we do? Confiscate all the computers and smartphones? Tear down the techno-corporate structure? NO! Unrealistic and undesirable.

An early Christian saint, Dymphna of Ireland (d. 650 AD), can rightly be called 'The Saint of the Lonely'. Dymphna's father suffered a severe mental illness after the death of his wife. He turned his affections, obsession, to Dymphna, even to the point of wanting to marry her. She fled to Belgium with her spiritual director. Her father tracked her down and had the director murdered in front of her. Horribly, her completely deranged father beheaded Dymphna with his sword!

St. Dymphna's care for the mentally ill was based on fostering communities of compassion, human contact, and true communication by listening.

During the Covid pandemic, we learned the importance of flesh pressing flesh. The story of salvation reaches its decisive point with "the Word becoming [our] flesh". Into the darkness of our loneliness shines the light of LOVE and is "not overcome" (Jn 1:4-5).




