SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.

reconcile with the Church and God. The meaning of confession and its value helps you realize your mistakes and cleanse your soul of sin.

According to Canon law, it is recommended that you go to confession at least once a year. Most Catholics attend confession during Lent to prepare for Easter and the Resurrection. 

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri The Right (BE)ATTITUDE

Catholic theologian/philosopher, Peter Kreeft writes: "'Tragedy' is almost another word for the word 'suffering'". He explains that tragedy "does <u>not</u> mean accidental sufferings, like an auto accident, but suffering that is fated, destined, predestined to be brought about precisely through the protagonist's [lead actor] free choices". The <u>cause</u> of the tragedy/suffering according to Greek philosophy is HUBRIS; that pride which precedes the fall (Gen 3); (Sophocles, <u>OEDIPUS the King</u> (496 BC-406 BC)). Kreeft explains pride as "not just vanity and selfishness, but attempting to

exceed the limits of human nature". (Kreeft, God on Stage, pp.79-84).

The ultimate expression of pride is wanting to BE God (Gen 3:4-5). Like Adam and Eve, Oedipus wants to be God so he tragically ignores the wisdom of Creon and Tiresias (blind prophet who "sees"): "Crave not to be master of all things". St. Paul will put it this way, "no one lives as his own master, and no one dies as his own master. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; ... we are the Lord's". (Rom 14: 7-8).

There is a fundamental difference between Greek philosophy's view of tragedy/suffering; Fate/Moria; freedom/bondage and the Christian teaching about suffering.

St. Thomas Aquinas understands human suffering through a three-fold connection to the Passion of Jesus. The Cross reveals God as redeeming, faithful LOVE. Such a LOVE is FOR US and WITH US through the Incarnation and Paschal Mystery (see <u>Catechism</u>, Article 4 - paragraphs 2-3).

The three points of St. Thomas are as follows:

- 1. The Passion of Jesus is for the healing of ALL humanity from the disfigurement resulting from Original Sin: "But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us". (Rom 5:8).
- 2. The Passion of Jesus is the supreme act of ATONEMENT by which humanity is cleansed from sin and made righteous before the Father. By the blood of the Innocent Lamb on the Cross we are SAVED from judgement: "...we are now justified by his blood...saved through him from the wrath". The Atonement through the Cross of Jesus goes beyond mere forgiveness. We can "also boast [praise] of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation". (Rom 5:10).
- 3. The salvation of humanity <u>required</u> Jesus, the God-Man, the Word to become flesh (Jn 1:14). Why? Original Sin was an offense against God (Creator) by humanity's "first parents". The "just" payment must be done by a Being of the SAME Being. The Word is "one in Being with the Father" (<u>Nicene Creed</u>).

The problem of human suffering <u>continues</u> to be one every person faces. Shakespeare's <u>Macbeth</u> bemoans: "Life is but a walking shadow, a poor player that struts and frets his hour upon the stage, and then is heard no more. It is a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing". (Macbeth, Act 5, Scene 5).

This view by Macbeth is contested by the Jesuit scientist-theologian, Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (1881-1955). He teaches that suffering is part of our all too human condition, BUT of greater presence is the power of "gestation", that is, the advancement of LIFE throughout the cosmos. This will-to-life is manifest by greater complexity, enrichment, and unity throughout the cosmos. This drive for life is built into the nature of things by Divine Providence. All of existence is moving toward the "Omega" when Christ (*Logos*) will be "all in all". (Col 2: 9-15).

The Passion of Jesus is a message of HOPE, "and does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5). What, WHO, is the reason for this hope of ours? It is now and forever "because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us". (Rom 5:5; 1Pt 3:15).

Adam and Eve were human and wanted to be God, which yielded banishment (Gen 3:23). By contrast, "the Word was God" (Jn 1:1), but "emptied himself...coming in human likeness; ...he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross... [so that] every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father". (Phil 2:7-11).

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
