Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.


PASCHAL CANDLE


Childish or Child-like?

The Gospel for Easter this year reminds me of little children. Mary of Magdala runs from the tomb when she sees it has been opened. Then Peter and the other disciple race each other to the tomb. The other one wins the race but Peter goes in first (John 20:1-5). Besides running like excited kids, there is another way they are like children.

Remember the Gospel about St. Thomas, who would not believe Jesus' resurrection until he could see him? Compare that to the disciple in today's reading, who "saw [the empty tomb] and believed" (John 20:9). That is the kind of faith we find in a little child.

Children will believe in things they cannot see, especially if there is a good reason. We "bribe" them into believing in Santa Claus or the tooth fairy by giving them Christmas presents or money under the pillow. If we teach them that God made them and loves them, if we love them ourselves and teach them to love others, they will have good reasons to believe in a real and loving God. As they get older, we can teach them how to pray, save money for the poor, visit the sick, or volunteer to help the homeless.

Jesus didn't say that only children could enter the Kingdom. He said we must become like children if we want to enter the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 18:3). Becoming like children does not mean being selfish or stubborn, throwing tantrums when we don't get our way. Those are childish behaviors that we put aside. Instead, we can keep a child-like faith and trust in God. Teaching them about God is a great way to help our own faith to grow. By giving them real examples of God's love for them, they will continue to believe long after they have given up the fairy tales of childhood.

The Empty Tomb Changed the World

The significance of the empty tomb cannot be overstated. It is the foundation of our faith and the source of our hope. As Cath-

olics, our actions would be in vain if the tomb was not empty. But it was, and this is what gives our faith its purpose and our hope its substance. We are called to live out this faith and pass it on to others, just as previous generations have done for over two thousand years.

As Catholics, Easter is not a one-day event but a life-changing reality that transforms our perspective and gives us hope to be with the Lord for all eternity. Our faith is not fantasy but reality, a reality that we get to live and share with our family and those we interact with on a daily basis. The Church affirms this reality by inviting us to celebrate the Octave of Easter (8 days ending on Divine Mercy Sunday) and the Easter Season (50 days ending on Pentecost). As we read in the Gospel, Mary Magdalene was the first to witness the empty tomb, the first to enter into it. St. Thomas Aquinas called her the "Apostle of the Apostles." Imagine sharing the Good News of Jesus' Resurrection with His very own followers!

This Easter, may we worship, thank the Lord, celebrate, and be filled with the joy of Jesus, just like the first witnesses of His resurrection did. May the powerful truth of this greatest of Feasts pour into the ordinary moments of our lives and sanctify them. The details of how we live the faith matter, for from our heart spills out our love, belief, and faith in Jesus, which we then share with our family, friends and the greater community.

The tomb is empty, just as He said! Have a blessed and joyful Easter!

Straight Talk

Dare to LIVE Easter!

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches: "The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the CENTRAL mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith.... It is the most fundamental and ESSENTIAL teaching in the 'hierarchy of the truths of faith'. "(No. 234).

The CENTRALITY of belief in the Trinity is one with the belief in the bodily resurrec-

tion of Jesus from the dead on the third day (Nicene and Apostle's Creeds). The resurrection of Jesus is the apex and confirmation of the central mystery of the Christian faith. As to this point, the Catechism teaches: "The Resurrection of Jesus is the crowning truth of our faith in Christ, a faith believed and lived as the central truth by the first Christian community; handed on as fundamental by Tradition; established by...the New Testament; and preached as an essential part of the Paschal mystery along with the cross." (No.638). Pope Benedict XVI adds: "The Christian faith stands or falls with the truth of the testimony that Christ is risen from the dead," (Jesus of Nazareth, (Part Two), p.241).

Why is the Resurrection so crucial for the TRUTH of the Christian faith AND OUR daily witness to "Christ is risen"? After all, even if we discounted the testimonies of those who encountered the risen Jesus, and the stories of these encounters preserved in Scripture, we could gather sufficient evidence from other sources to verify that Jesus lived, preached, and exerted a great deal of influence on the religious and political establishments, as well as on the people (especially on those of low religious and social regard). However, IF Jesus had not been resurrected, Pope Benedict puts it bluntly: "the Christian faith itself would be dead. Jesus would be a failed religious leader" whose influence would last only as long as his influence on others. Jesus could join the ranks of Socrates, Aristotle, Buddha and Confucius. In effect, Jesus would be just another human but not "the way and the truth and the life". (Jn 14:6). According to Pope Benedict, the only authentic quidance for our life would be OURSELVES!

What if we dare a kind of Pascal-type wage that something spectacular and extraordinarily new occurred in Jesus and appeared in human existence and history? This is the most profound wager we can make: Has, or has not, Jesus risen from the dead? Pope Benedict reminds us, "In answering yes or no to this question [our wager], we are taking a stand not simply on one event among others, but on the figure of Jesus as such." (Pope Benedict. Jesus of Nazareth, (Part Two), Chapter nine, pp. 241-77; see also Blaise Pascal (1623-1662), Pensees)

To say YES to the crucified and risen Lord is one filled with "fear and trembling" (Soren Kierkegaard (1813-55)). We are invited to enter into a new form and way of existing. We no longer live for the world or by its standards for judging truth, beauty, and goodness. To die and rise with Christ is totally different than a 'make-over' or a new set of priorities, rather, it is the transformation of one's being; of WHO one is! In the words and PERSONAL EXPERIENCE of St. Paul: "I have been crucified with Christ, and it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself up for me." (Gal 2:20).

This new living in the resurrected Christ is a process of grace unfolding within. Sometimes it is the slow maturation of the mustard seed (Lk 13:18-19); or it may occur on the road to Damascus (Acts 9:1-19) in dramatic fashion. God's time and manner are not for us to determine. Rather, may the words of St. Paul be our Easter prayer: "that I may know him, and the power of the resurrection.... It is not that I have already taken hold of it, but I continue my pursuit in hope...since I have been taken possession of by Christ...forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead, I continue my pursuit toward the goal, the prize of God's upward calling in Christ Jesus. (Phil 3:10-14).


