SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

Religious Education

Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and

their families and to call them to commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

RCIA: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? Please join our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round RCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. For additional information and to register, contact the Church Office or email cre@olphbc.org.



A Humble God

The second reading from Revelations gives us a picture of the new Jerusalem as a sign of the power and majesty of God. Yet the other two readings seem to describe a humble God who wishes "not to place on you any burden beyond . . . necessity" (Acts 15:28), and Jesus in the Gospel tells his disciples that "the Holy Spirit that the Father will send in my

name . . . will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you" (John 14:26). This gentleness reminds me of an icon by the Russian monk Andrei Rublev that depicts the Trinity as three angels bowing in deference to each other. This humility may be what moved Jesus to say that "the Father is greater than I" (John 14:28). It is certainly a unique way of understanding God. I used to think of free will as God's way of testing our worthiness for the kingdom of heaven. But it is more likely part of that same humility, God not being forced on us. While we are given ways to know God, especially through the scriptures and the witness of those who went before us in faith, God leaves us free to believe or not, to love God or not.

So does this mean God leaves us on our own to get through life? No, he gives us the Holy Spirit to teach and remind us of all that Jesus said. That "reminding" is an important way the Spirit helps us today. You may have spent years in religion classes or the RCIA process. When you need an answer to life's questions, the Spirit may remind you of something you heard from a teacher or read in the scriptures. As you pray over that question, the Spirit may help you understand how the scripture applies to you. So the more you read the Bible, the more likely that the Spirit will have something of which to remind you.

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri The NEW FRONTIER

Once again, our shrinking imagination has been grasped, at least until the next click of the computer Green Goddess screen, by "Space. The New Frontier", (JFK and Star Trek).

The return home of our politically stranded astro-explorers, aided by the technological genius of Elon Musk and the political will of President Trump, has rocketed our gaze upward to the "Starry, starry night" with "palette blue and grey". ("Vincent" by Don McLean)

The feelings of earned pride, the flawless touchdown in the Gulf of America, and the spec-

tacular Chorus Line of curious dolphins, gave rise to a collective case of goosebumps (grace?). It also provided us the opportunity to revisit a 'Space Sage' from the closing decades of the previous century: Carl Sagan (1934-1996).

Sagan was a perfect match for television: brilliant, telegenic, likable, and possessed that rare gift of communicating the mysteries of the cosmos. Sagan didn't talk at you or above you. He was able to explain the mysteries of the universe in such a way that you were not "Lost in Space". Never stranded in ho-hum indifference.

Sagan's extremely popular thirteen-part series, 'Cosmos: A Personal Voyage', struck a chord with the general public. Like Aristotle, Sagan believed that the human being by nature desires to know. Hence, knowledge begins with wonder - WHY is there something rather than nothing? This first question, the question about existence itself (being), is the door that opens to the truth and meaning of the nature and destiny of the human person. Sagan walks through that door as an endless searcher for knowledge. And his GPS is the SCIENTIFIC METHOD.

His approach and journey raise the God-Question: Did Sagan believe in a Supreme Being, a Creator God? His response to this guestion is direct: "I am not an atheist. An atheist is someone who has compelling evidence that there is no Judeo-Christian-Islamic God. I am not that wise, but neither do I consider there to be anything approaching adequate evidence for such a god. Why are you in such a hurry to make up your mind? Why not simply wait until there is compelling evidence?" (Letter to Robert Pope, Oct. 2,1996).

Sagan often talked about the "God hypothesis". He was an agnostic, that is, the verdict of God/No God had not been rendered by science beyond a reasonable affirmation or negation. This refusal to "rush to judgement" came from his disdain for DOGMATISM, either the religious or secular variety. That is, he dismisses any truth-claim which lacks evidence from the scientific method. For Sagan, to abandon science and turn to "clutching our crystals and nervously consulting our horoscopes" results into a decline of our "critical faculties". This ends in our being "unable to distinguish between what feels good and what's good and what's true". We, "almost without noticing, back into superstition and darkness". (Cosmos). (See Jacob Bronowski's series/book, The Ascent of Man).

At the same time, a science which narrows rationality to the natural and social sciences denies the spiritual, ethical, and transcendent dimensions of reality. Pope Benedict XVI lectured: "This [shrinking of truth to only science] was a dangerous state of affairs for humanity, as we see from the disturbing pathologies of religion and reason which necessarily erupt when reason is so reduced that questions of religion and ethics no longer concern it [science]. Attempts to construct an ethic from the rules of evolution or from psychology and sociology, end up being simply inadequate." (2006 Regensburg Lecture).

As science and its application continues to advance in its technical/utilitarian power, the religious and ethical questions become more important, and urgent, for the theological and scientific communities, the dignity of the human person, the advancement of the common good, and the wonder of creation and the splendor of the God who "looked at everything he had made, and found it very good." (Gen 1:31).




