Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.


SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to

commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD: Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Encountering Engaging Events are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

OCIA (aka RCIA): Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? If so, please join our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round OCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. Everyone can work at their own pace and attend gatherings as they like. Sharing our faith with one another is a huge part of our Baptismal call. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. August 6: Transfiguration of the Lord—Feast



Robbing a Bank

The second reading from the Letter to the Colossians goes well with the first reading and the Gospel. Those passages warn how useless material wealth will be when we die. St. Paul continues this warning by reminding us that we have already died with Christ in baptism and risen to new life. To live this new life we

must put to death whatever tendencies keep us from Christ.

Wealth can be a gift from God. The abuse is not necessarily in the possession of wealth. More likely, we abuse wealth in the way we attain it. How does that happen? I can give an obvious answer such as robbing a bank. Instead, do I work a full day for my pay, or do I spend a lot of time visiting with other employees or texting my friends? Am I honest with my customers, charging only for work I have done? As for using our wealth, we usually think of family first. Do we spoil our kids, so they can "have the things I couldn't afford when I was young"? Or do we teach them to work for what they get? Do we teach our children to be generous to others?

Notice that Paul goes deeper, pointing out the thoughts and desires that lead to a life centered in wealth. In baptism we put to death passion and greed, tendencies that push us to own more or to control another person. Paul uses the image of taking off these vices as if they were clothing and putting on a new self that shows Christ in us. We begin to see Christ in others, for as Paul says, "Christ is all and in all" (Colossians 3:11).

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri That Time...AGAIN!

It is a time of TRANSITION: lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer give way to the buzz, bang, boom, and bells of a new school year. In addition, there is a shift from casual to school clothes, snack pack to back pack, video games to BOOKS, and sleeping late to "Get up! You'll be late for school!". This shock to the system can be traumatic, yet most survive. It is also a time of great adventure into the new and unknown; a time of anxiety and hope.

A new school year offers us the opportunity to reflect, with gratitude, on one of the enduring contributions the Catholic Church has made, and continues to make, namely, the PAROCHIAL SCHOOL SYSTEM for the COMMON GOOD.

The first Catholic school in the U.S. dates back to 1606, established by the Franciscans in what is now St. Augustine, FL. In 1782, St. Mary's in Philadelphia, PA, became the first PAROCHIAL school. In the 1800's, the presence of such schools grew rapidly, reaching a peak in 1965-66 with approximately 5.7 million students in grades K - 12. Over 10% of all school-age children in the U.S. attended Catholic schools. During this period, there were more than 12,000 Catholic schools.

Like all things subject to "time's swift chariot" (Andrew Marvell), while the Catholic population has grown over 50% since 1965, there has been a dramatic DECLINE in Catholic school enrollment by a corresponding 50% (12,000 in 1965 to recent estimates of 6,000 or less). The number of students attending Catholic schools has remained steady at approximately 1.7

Why the decline? Among the major factors: An increased secular culture; decline in Catholic Church parishes; decline in staffing by religious sisters (180,000 in 1965, less than 50,000 today); rising cost of education and the need to staff schools with salaried personnel; a waning of Catholic culture within schools (less emphasis and opportunity for participation in Mass, Sacraments, and devotionals, (Way of the Cross, First Friday, Marian celebrations, and lives of the Saints); and the home placing less importance on Catholicism as essential to family life).

There is reason for HOPE! Recent studies indicate a renaissance in Catholic education. A growing number of Catholic schools have not only survived, but are FLOURISHING. Parents are once again (post-Covid) becoming engaged in their children's education.

Parents are increasingly concerned that education has become indoctrination. Various sociopolitical ideologies, along with those of race and gender, have awakened parents to the content and methods to which their children are exposed.

More troubling to parents is the belief that the State and NOT the parents are the primary educators of THEIR children. A certain segment of the educational establishment (bureaucracy and teachers unions) has sought to silence and disengage parents as unqualified. Some school districts (parts of Virginia) have even indicated that children "belong" to the State and education "professionals"!

Such an education 'child grab' has moved parents to give Catholic education a second look. For the Catechism of the Catholic Church states clearly: "Parents have the first responsibility for the education of THEIR children....parents receive the responsibility and privilege of EVANGELIZING THEIR CHILDREN Parents are the 'first heralds' for their children (CCC Nos. 2223-5). (An excellent resource for parents, teachers, administrators, and pastors is CATHOLIC SCHOOL PLAYBOOK).

OLPH is blessed with the presence of an elementary school. And twice blessed with the committed and prudent leadership of Rev. Pastor Kyle Dave and Principal Brittany Breaux. OLPH has experienced its own renaissance. This 'rebirth' has been accomplished by Pastor and Principal sharing a common vision of Catholic education, enhanced by a dedicated faculty, engaged parents, supportive parish, and the acknowledgement by the larger community as to the contributions of OLPH in general, and the school in particular, to the overall well-being of civic life.


Mrs. Breaux's first principle is "continuing growth within our Catholic faith and culture". This commitment to Catholic faith/culture is also a dedication to academic excellence. OLPH was listed as one of the top five Archdiocesan schools for improvement in Math and language test scores. Tutoring is provided for students in math, science, and language. Also, additional tutoring is provided during the summer months by OLPH faulty. There are plans for increased opportunities in the arts and athletic competition.

Father Kyle offered the following reflection on the gift of a parish school: "It is a privilege and a grace to be blessed with this school. It is a deep trust that parents allow us to be a part of their children's formation, spiritually and intellectually. Each student in our school touches the present and builds bridges into the future. A future to hope in."

I asked Father Kyle if the effort is worth it. He responded by relating an incident that occurred this past year at the close of the school for summer: "After mass this little girl came running to me all excited with a card in her hand. She hugged me and said, 'Thank you, Father Kyle', with an ear-to-ear smile. Her parents also expressed their gratitude. Is the school worth it? What do you think?"

Enough said.
