Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at **www.olphbc.org** to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email **cre@olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.


SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to

commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. CHILDREN'S SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Finding God LIVE sessions are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

OCIA (aka RCIA): Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? If so, please join our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round OCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. Everyone can work at their own pace and attend gatherings as they like. Sharing our faith with one another is a huge part of our Baptismal call. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. 



The Clever Crook: The parable in today's the Gospel has a crooked steward who is commended by his master for being prudent, or clever, trying to protect himself. Jesus wanted us to be just as clever in serving

the Lord. Let's look at the first two readings and how they challenge us to do more. The reading from Amos talks about those "who trample upon the needy and destroy the poor" (Amos 8:4). The challenge here is to ask yourself, "What do I do for the poor?" Most parishes have organizations to help the needy and are happy to get volunteers. Do you ever think of praying for the poor?

Speaking of prayer, our second reading also challenges us to do more. Paul recommends prayers for "kings and for all in authority" (1 Timothy 2:2). It's easy to pray for friends and family; how much time do we give to prayers for government leaders and executives? Paul reminds us that God wants everyone to be saved (1 Timothy 2:4), sinners as well as saints, terrorists and embezzlers, atheists and agnostics. I'll bet you don't spend much time praying for the "bad guys." Yet Jesus said, "Love your enemies. Pray for those who hurt you" (Matthew 5:44). I can't say I've ever heard anyone say that was their favorite Bible passage. But if Jesus expects more from those who love him, who are we to let him down? Tom Schmidt

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri IS GOD PRESENT?

A big part of our conventional wisdom holds that our culture is secularized, and increasingly so.

A corollary to the secularization thesis is a corresponding decline in traditional and institutional forms of religious practice and belief. There is a good deal of data to support the inevitable extinction of religion.

A second corollary to the secularization thesis, and following from the first corollary, is the proposition that the relentless advance of our "brave new world", the world of science and technology, will open the way to an earthly paradise and the emergence of a new humanity. This "new creation and being" will be freed from the opium of religion, the shackles of oppressive moral codes, and the tyrannical demands of our projected god; a god we created to calm our fears, but in reality, a god who kept us from full actualization.

Before we offer a final blessing to religion, there are signs that it is the "death of religion" mantra that is waning. In fact, it is religion that is experiencing a "rebirth" (a resurrection?), not only among "the masses" but this revival is taking hold among the learned and clever. For example, the following three books, recently published, are worth our consideration. Each in their own way are NOT only taking note of this "awakening", but they are SUPPORTIVE of this renewal.

Consider the following brief "tease" about each book.

Book One: Living in Wonder by Rod Dreher contends that reality is much "thicker" than daily reality being REDUCED to that which can only be fit into the scientific method (quantified, measured, and predicted/repeated by experimental verification). In the words of Shakespeare's Hamlet, "There are more things in Heaven and Earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy." (Hamlet, Act 1, Scene 5). Dreher contends that this "more" is found in the marrow of our daily life, in the MYSTICAL: "We Christians have a mission to focus our attention on Christ...to purify the eyes of our hearts so that we can see the holiness all around us and share in the life of God." (p. 256).

Book Two: Believe by Ross Douthat (a Catholic weekly columnist for the New York Times (this is NOT a misprint)). He begins by laying out the case FOR materialism, atheism, and scientism. He avoids presenting them as "straw arguments", but presents them fairly and in their best light,

Douthat then moves to address their strongest points and responds respectfully, drawing on faith and reason. In his last chapter, "A Case Study: Why I AM a Christian" he writes: "I've had a wide range of encounters with religion in my forty-five years. I've read and argued and considered a lot of different currents and ideas, and I don't think I've had any special guidance leading anywhere except Christianity in general, Catholic Christianity in particular.... So, in that sense it would be both reckless and ungrateful for me to go anywhere except where I've ended up." (p. 189).

The Third Book for consideration by Jordan B. Peterson, We Who Wrestle With God, is a departure from the last two. That is, Peterson invites us to understand our present situation through the distant mirror of old acquaintances - Adam and Eve, the eternal serpent, Cain and Abel, Noah, Babel, Abraham, Moses, and Jonah. In their "wrestling" with God we are their "tag-team" partners. For down through the long corridors of history, it is our daily struggle to team up with God and NOT be "pinned" by the cunning tactics of the Evil One.

Peterson concludes with this: "At every moment of consciousness, we are fated to wrestle with God" (p. xxxi). Why? Because God loves us and beckons us to live UPWARD and bring to consciousness God's luring, non-coercive, loving presence: "God...is the spirit that leads up [ward]. Man is the being who struggles with that spirit" (p. xxxi). Yet it is in the struggle that strength is born. It is in the wrestling with God that we become ever closer, and God closer to us.

Again Peterson: "The life and words of Jesus dramatize and describe upward - striving abandonment of all that is INSUFFICIENT [egoism, pride, lust, etc.]." Rather, we are to be one with our biblical heroes and heroines who "kept their covenant with the divine, realized their true nature, and adopted the responsibility of walking with God." (p. 503).






