Sacraments



SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.

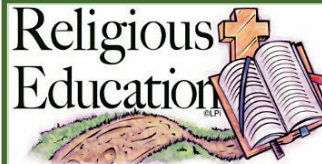
SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to

commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. CHILDREN'S SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Finding God LIVE sessions are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

OCIA (aka RCIA): Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? If so, please join our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round OCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. Everyone can work at their own pace and attend gatherings as they like. Sharing our faith with one another is a huge part of our Baptismal call. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. 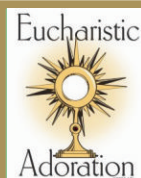

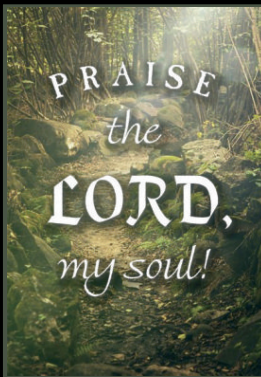

Coach Paul

Today's reading from First Timothy sounds almost like a coach getting his team ready for the big game. This coach has much higher goals than a home run or a touchdown. Instead of pursuing a league championship, he seeks faith, love, patience, and gentleness. How about us? Are we in the game or on the sidelines? Let's look at what Coach Paul is talking about.

Faith is a relationship with the Lord in which we imitate Jesus' outlook on life, his teachings, his love of God. We struggle with his commands to love our enemies, to turn the other cheek, to forgive all wrongs, and to take up our cross each day. As Paul would say, we are "competing well for the faith." We pursue love by listening to the Gospel, in which Jesus tells the parable of the rich man who was only concerned with his own comfort. Jesus says that if we truly understood the prophets, such as our first reading from Amos, we would not spend all our energy and wealth on ourselves.

As we learn to let go of our need to have everything go our way, we become more patient with people who disagree with us, or with frustrations and problems. We learn to see God in our setbacks as well as in our successes. Experiencing the Lord is the championship we want. Tom Schmidt

Straight Talk

Pope Leo XIV: Catholic University

On July 25, 2025, Pope Leo XIV ventured into the turbulent waters of Catholic higher education. The occasion for this daring plunge was the 28th General Assembly of the international Federation of Catholic Universities (IFCU). The theme of the conference was, "Catholic Universities: Choreographers".

This theme struck the right note with the pope who commented that

Catholic education "evokes harmony, unity, dynamics, and joy". In effect, Catholic education is the gift of faith seeking an ever deeper understanding of God, the dignity of the human person, and the wonder of creation.

Keeping with a musical theme, Pope Leo cautioned that the "songs of the sirens" are alluring because they are unconventional and excite flights of fancy. By contrast, the formation of the Catholic mind is one that travels the path to God (Pope Leo draws attention to the important work of St. Francis of Assisi's systematizer St. Bonaventure in his book, *The Mind's Road to God*.)

These "songs of the sirens" are not new (Greek mythology warns of beautiful sounding, seductive songs which draw ships to their destruction and the death of all aboard) within the Church and society. St Paul in his instruction to his student Timothy writes: "For the time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear." (2Tim 4:3). The contemporary versions of siren songs include Relativism (moral and intellectual), Reductionism (cause/effect leaves no room for Providence or grace) and Solipsism (truth is reduced to "My-truth"; reality is narrowed to the Imperial Self).

The Catholic university is NOT immune to these enticing lyrics and melodies. However, the end result as in the time of the Greeks, St. Paul, and modern sirens is the same - mortal wounds to the soul of a university and those on board. Pope Leo, a member of the Augustinian order, quoted the words of St. Augustine: "The soul left to itself, has neither light nor strength...It[soul] darkens when it turns away from the source [Christ] of immutable truth and is illumined when it draws near". (*City of God*, Bk XIII).

Today's cultural landscape is one in which reason has been reduced to the empirical and scientific method. Talk about God, the metaphysical and spiritual are dismissed as irrational or simply private choices - expressions of taste. Pope Leo challenged this anemic view of reason: "Christ is not a stranger to rational discourse but the keystone that gives coherence and meaning to all our thoughts, hopes, and efforts to improve life and find purpose."

Pope Leo went on to make it clear that the Catholic university is not a hot-house for closed minds, rather it is a nursery in which the intellect continues to mature. Such a maturation is nurtured in the rich soil of faith and reason to flower beyond the ivy-covered walls. In so doing, the mission to evangelize, given by Jesus, enriches both Church and academy, so that ALL nations and peoples may progress in the truth that sets us free (Jn 8:32).

Pope Leo closed his address by challenging Catholic university faculty and administrators to be NOT afraid; NOT timid; to profess and share the treasure that is the Catholic theological, intellectual, and humanist Tradition. Such an exhortation recalls St. Paul: "I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God.... For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control. So do not be ashamed of your testimony to our Lord..." (2Tim 1:6-8).
