

Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at www.olphbc.org to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email cre@olphbc.org.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.


SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to

commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. CHILDREN'S SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Finding God LIVE sessions are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

OCIA (aka RCIA): Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? If so, please join our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round OCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. Everyone can work at their own pace and attend gatherings as they like. Sharing our faith with one another is a huge part of our Baptismal call. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. 

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri Forecast: FAIR Weather!

Festivals, feasts, and FAIRS are an essential part of the human story. An innate part of what it means to be human is the need to assemble, celebrate, give thanks, ask forgiveness, remember the past, bravely face the present, with hope, adventure into the future, and lift our whole being in recognition of our blessings.

We do all of the above through festivals, feasts and fairs. At the center of these community expressions is RELIGION (the Latin "religio") "religare" meaning to be bound together and remember).

The Hebrew Scriptures contain a number of festivals and feasts which celebrate the active presence of God in the life of the Jews. To name but a few: Passover (slavery to freedom); Tabernacles (remembering God's care for the Jews during their time in the desert); and Pente-

cost (Moses receiving the Torah) celebrated fifty days after Passover and considered the most significant event in Jewish history. There are a number other feasts and festivals, often around autumn harvesting and spring seeding. Through all these celebrations, God is the focus and His active presence in Jewish history, and the history of ALL nations and peoples.

In the Christian Scriptures and the history of the early Church, feasts and festivals mark significant contributions to the spiritual and civic well-being of the community.

In the Gospel of John for example, the three Passovers recorded in his Gospel we find the cleansing of the Temple as a sign that the worship of Jesus as the Son of God fulfills and perfects true worship. The old animal sacrifices are replaced by the Innocent Lamb who takes away the sin of the world (Jn 2:13-25). At the feast of Pentecost, Jesus performed cures on the Sabbath. The Pharisees accuse Jesus of violating the Law forbidding work on the Sabbath. Jesus responds by saying, "My Father is at work until now, so I am at work." (Jn 5:17). Jesus is Lord of the Sabbath. Jesus, the Son of God, is continuing the work. Jesus and the Father are one. Finally, the last Passover celebrated by Jesus with the disciples, is the most profound. For it is then that Jesus celebrated the Last Supper of the Jewish Passover and inaugurated the New Eternal Covenant in His body and blood. It was at this same meal that Jesus established the priesthood. (Jn, ch. 13; Lk 22:14-20; 1Cor 11: 23-26).

Finally, it was at the Jewish celebration of Pentecost (fifty days after Passover) that the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples and Mary (Acts 2:1-13). This dramatic event resulted in Peter and the disciples going forth and proclaiming the greatest news in history: "God raised this Jesus.... Exalted at the right hand of God, he received the promise of the holy Spirit from the Father and poured it forth, as you see and hear." (Acts 2:32-34). Such is the beginning of the Church Jesus entrusted to all disciples until He comes again.

The early Church celebrated various feasts and festivals with churches, monasteries, and convents servings places for worship and fellowship. Over time, these festivals became places of commerce in addition to religious celebrations. This commingling of the religious and secular provided an opportunity for merchants to display and sell their wares, while affording religious entities their opportunity to obtain much needed financial resources. It also provided churches the opportunity to evangelize.

The reach and influence of the Catholic Church, especially during the Medieval period, with fairs and festivals coming to include various forms of entertainment, games of skill and chance, and a variety of dramas and plays, grew in civic and political importance. For the most part, fairs, festivals, and feasts were welcomed. However, there were concerns raised that these festivals had become too secular and political. In effect, the Church was becoming too much with the world.

With the waves of immigrants coming to the United States in the later part of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, came the appearance of the parish/parochial fare. These immigrant waves, mainly European, brought with them many of the religious, ethnic, and national practices from the "Old Country". The Church Fair was one of these.

OLPH has been preparing for its annual parish fair. It is a special time; a time of grace (kairos), but also a time of challenge, patience, cooperation, flexibility, and selflessness.

St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians offers some wise spiritual and practical guidance:

- 1. There are different gifts, different forms of service but the same Spirit and Lord. ALL come from the same God.
- 2. Gifts are NOT for self-glory but for some benefit for the good of all.
- 3. The distribution and use of gifts is the will of God.
- 4. A fair is LIKE a body. There are no useless, unwanted members. There is no division. The members are to have concern for ONE ANOTHER.
- 5. The community is a Christian body, as such, it "strives eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts" FAITH, HOPE, and LOVE. "The greatest of these is LOVE". (1Cor chs. 12-13). Forecast? FAIR Weather!


