Sacraments















SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Baptisms are usually celebrated on the fourth Sunday of the month during the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Due to demand, some months may be eliminated or another day or time may be chosen by the family if it is available on the church schedule of events." To begin the process, parents are encouraged to go to our website at **www.olphbc.org** to access the forms under Sacraments and return the forms by email or drop off at the Church Office. Parents and godparents are required to attend a seminar prior to the Baptism. The Baptismal Seminar is held on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Church Day Chapel. If you need more information or have questions, call the Rectory at (504) 394-0314 or email **cre@olphbc.org**.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST COMMUNION: First Eucharist is celebrated the first Saturday of May for students in the 2nd grade or above. Children older than 2nd grade will be prepared on individual situations. The Sacrament of Reconciliation must be celebrated prior to Communion.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Confirmation is celebrated in the Fall of 11th grade. Candidates who attend Catholic high school or are enrolled in the High School of Religion program come together for Sacramental preparation. All candidates are asked to pre-register in their freshmen year and no later than December of their 10th grade year. Information and registration can be found on our website: www.olphbc.org.


SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Contact the Church Office at least nine months prior to the planned date. No other arrangements should be made before contacting the Church Office.

VISITATION OF THE SICK: Inform the Church Office when someone is sick, shut-in or hospitalized and unable to attend Mass.

FUNERALS: Inform the Church Office as soon as possible when someone in the family dies, preferably before contacting the funeral home.



Religious Education

The mission of OLPH's Religious Education program is to bring the "Good News" of God's love to all children and their families and to call them to

commit their lives to Christ. Religious Education is available for children in Kindergarten through adults. We encourage parents to be parishioners of OLPH when registering students for Religious Education classes. Census forms can be obtained from the Parish Office during regular business hours, on the Welcome Table located in the back of church or you can register online. CHILDREN'S SUNDAY LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Children in grades K-2nd are invited with a catechist during 10:30 a.m. Mass to the Day Chapel for the Liturgy of the Word for Children (September-May). A summary of the readings of the day is discussed on their level.

PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Our PSR program is divided in two parts. Family Faith Formation is the "academic" part with the textbook discussed at home as a family. Our Finding God LIVE sessions are a chance to come together as a community to worship together, do crafts, or engage in traditional events like our Nativity Play and Living Way of the Cross.

HIGH SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Students in 9th through 12th grade not attending a Catholic High School are offered Faith Formation with academics at home, working at their own pace, but also some time to get together to discuss what they have learned with their peers about three times a year. It is intended to be an informal study with honest Catholic answers.

OCIA (aka RCIA): Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic or completing Sacraments? If so, please join our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We have a Year-Round OCIA process that you can enter into whenever you are ready. Everyone can work at their own pace and attend gatherings as they like. Sharing our faith with one another is a huge part of our Baptismal call. This is for you if you have never been baptized, if you have been baptized into another denomination and now want to become Catholic, or if you are an adult Catholic but have never been confirmed. Sessions will be held in person with day and time to be adjusted to personal schedules. Saint Carlo Acutis

Canonized a Saint—September 7, 2025 Feast Day—October 12

Patron Saint of: Youth, The Internet and **Computer Programmers**

Also Known As: The First Milennial Saint

Symbols: The Eucharist & Eucharistic Miracles

Beatified: October 10, 2020 by Pope Francis

Carlo Acutis was a Catholic teenager born on May 3, 1991 in London and raised in Milan, Italy. From a young age, he showed a deep love for the Eucharist, daily Mass, and the Rosary. He was also a talented computer programmer who used his skills to evangelize online. Carlo created a website and a traveling exhibit that cataloged 187 Eucharistic Miracles from around the world. He believed the Eucharist was "the highway to heaven" and inspired many to grow in devotion to Jesus. He is known for his deep faith, devotion to the Eucharist, and his life of kindness and charity. Carlo challenges us to live with purpose and holiness. He once said "I'm happy to die because I lived my life without wasting even a minute on things unpleasing to God". Carlo passed away on October 12, 2006 at the age of 15 due to leukemia.

The miracles attributed to His Intercession: (1) In 2013, a Brazilian boy named Mattheus Vianna, with a rare pancreatic disorder was miraculously healed after prayers to Carlo; and (2) In 2022, a Costa Rican teen (Valeria Valverde) miraculously recovered from a near-fatal brain injury after her mother visited Carlo's tomb and prayed for his intercession. Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati

Pier Giorgio Frassati was born in Turin, Italy on

April 6, 1901. From a young age he loved the outdoors, and developed a passion for mountain climbing. He would bring his Catholic youth groups on mountain climbing adventures and turn them into spiritual retreats. His famous quote, "Verso L'alto" (To the heights)" was written on a photo of what would be his last climb. This phrase has become a motto for Catholics, inspired by Pier to strive for the summit of eternal life with Christ. He encouraged other young people to attend daily Mass, develop unshakeable prayer habits, and devote themselves to the Eucharist and the Virgin Mary. Pier was active through the St. Vincent de Paul Society visiting the sick, providing for their needs, and offering companionship and spiritual support. In the end, Pier contracted polio while tending to the sick and died on July 4, 1925 at the age of 24. Over 10,000 people, many of which he had personally cared for, attended Pier's funeral.

The miracles attributed to His intercessions: (1) In 1933, a man, Domenico Sellan, suffered from severe tuberculosis was miraculously healed after praying to Pier; and (2) in 2017, a US Seminarian from the Archdiocese of Los Angeles was miraculously healed from a severely torn Achilles tendon after praying a Novena to Pier. Miracles of Faith

Besides being cured, what do Nathan (first reading) and the leper who thanked Jesus (Gospel) have in common?



Both of them began to believe. Nathan proclaims Israel's God to be the only God. The only leper who returned to thank Jesus was "glorifying God in a loud voice" (Luke 17:15). It makes me wonder, what miracles do we see that help us grow in faith? For an answer, we can look at a second thing they had in common: they both asked for help. Sometimes we get caught up in self-sufficiency mode, thinking we have to handle all our problems by ourselves. We may miss out on ways to solve those problems by not asking for help. If you think asking for help is a sign of weakness, you may be missing a chance for God to act through one of your friends and give you support. And, of course, you can ask God for help in prayer.

We may have friends who help us in times of need or inspire us with their faith, but we have to decide to make a leap of faith ourselves. The third thing that Nathan and the leper did in common was express their faith. You can spend your whole life thinking that you are a Christian, but if you never express that faith, it will be just a theory. St. Paul in the second reading, for example, was suffering in prison, but he didn't mind because his suffering demonstrated the importance of Jesus' message to him. So he wrote from prison in the hope that other Christians would be encouraged in their faith. Perhaps you know of someone who inspired you with their faithfulness and dedication. Having a friend who helps us grow in faith can be a very nice miracle indeed.

Straight Talk by: Father William Maestri **Pro-Life Includes Animals (Part I)**

The story of humanity and the story of non-human animals is a SHARED narrative. Don't STOP! What follows is NOT an attempt to "baptize" Darwin (Origin of The Species) or Desmond Morris (The Naked Ape). They have had their run on the stage of history (granted they still enjoy a revival in certain academic theaters). What this column hopes to achieve is even more anachronistic, yet evergreen. Specifically, the Book of Genesis makes a compelling case that God, "the Creator of heaven and earth,

of all things visible and invisible," is the "Father" who spoke into existence the non-human and human. And furthermore, they are to enjoy a special relationship.

The stories of creation unfold in an ORDERLY manner. Each of the "days" reveals a greater level of consciousness, of being, and a deeper intimacy with the Supreme Being.

DAY: CREATION / POST CREATION

ONE (Gen 1:3-5): LIGHT/DARKNESS. DAY/NIGHT

TWO (Gen 1:6-8): Creation of DOME separating the water above (sky) from below

THREE (Gen 1:9-13): Dry land (earth). Basin of water (sea). Vegetation. Fruit trees. Seeds

FOUR (Gen 1:14-19): Celestial illumination: stars, moon, and sun

FIVE (Gen 1:20-23): Sea creatures. Winged birds. Crawling creatures

SIX (Gen 1:24-31): Living creatures of every kind - tame and wild. Non-human animals

SEVEN (Gen 1:31; 2:1-3): The creation of the human being. God pronounces "VERY GOOD"

POST CREATION (Gen 2:19-20): Adam names the animals

In recent years, concern for both the ecological and humane treatment of animals has gained much traction around the world. Not surprisingly, much of the framing has been polluted by political ideologies. Notably absent is little, if any, mention of God in the secular press and various advocacy groups. This lacuna is a serious flaw that can be filled in by the contributions of the Sacred Scriptures and Catholic theological and spiritual reflections.

The Psalmist gives full voice to the connection between God and creation. For example: "The heavens declare the glory of God; the firmament proclaims the works his hands." (Ps 19:2); "The earth is the Lord's and all it holds, the world and those who dwell in it. For he founded it on the seas, established it over the rivers." (Ps 24:1-2); and "Let the heavens be glad and the earth rejoice; let the sea and what fills it resound; let the plains be joyful and all that is in them.... let all the trees of the forest rejoice.... who comes to govern the earth.... To govern the world with justice and the peoples with faithfulness." (Ps 96:11-13).

The Catholic imaging is one with the Scriptures. Such an imaging is SACRAMENTAL, that is, the whole of creation and ALL therein points to the love and wisdom of God. God's relationship is NOT tyrannical, coercive, competitive, nor is it absent or indifferent (Deism). God's loving plan for His creation is PROVIDEN-TIAL, that is, God's involvement is SOLICITOUS, guiding all that is to its good and proper end. This luring is respectful of freedom; hence, our cooperation is essential for good stewardship. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), teaches: "To human beings God even gives the power of freely sharing in his providence.... God thus enables men to be intelligent and free causes in order to complete the work of creation, to perfect its harmony for their own good and that of their neighbors.... God is at work in all the actions of his creatures..." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, Nos. 306-08). And one of these essential actions is good stewardship of ALL creation. Pope Leo XIV's special intention for September 2025, is the following: "Let us pray that, inspired by Saint Francis, we might experience our interdependence with all creatures who are loved by God and worthy of love and respect."
