Dear Future First Grade Parents.

Welcome to first grade!

Reading is a developmental skill that children master at different ages. There are many different levels of readers among beginning first graders ranging from non-readers to fluent readers. Each child is developing at their own pace. The more they read/listen to stories, the more their reading skills improve. Reading to your child is important as well. Your child will hear a fluent reader and it opens up an opportunity to talk about the story. Any book your child is interested in will help nurture excitement about books and a love of reading.

Here are some discussion suggestions:

Before and During Reading

- What story clues are in the title and in the pictures?
- Is this selection fiction or nonfiction? How do you know?
- What do you think will happen next? Pause in a place where a prediction can be made.
- Would you do things differently if you were the main character?

After Reading- After enjoying a book with your child, continue the experience by asking:

- How did the story make you feel?
- What did you like or dislike about the story?
- Does the story remind you of any other story?
- What was your favorite part?
- Were there any parts that surprised you?
- What was the problem in the story? How was it solved?
- Can your child retell the story or parts of the story?
