

Padre's Corner

September 17, 2017 Twenty Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Merriam-Webster Dictionary, established in 1828, defines "fragile" as coming from the Latin word "fragilis". "Fragile" means "breaking easily, and implies extreme delicacy of material or construction and need for careful handling." We can so easily see physical fragility with our bodies, such as cancer or back spasms. (I recently heard about the Washington Nationals pitching closer Koda Glover, having to go onto the disabled list. Why? "I was taking a shower, bent over to get my body wash, stood up and had a little kink... Now my back's in pretty bad shape." Even our appearances can reflect a fragile emotional system. We hear about teenagers who take their life, after cruel things are said about them on the Internet. Parishes in transition can be a tough place with a few spreading hurtful comments, wantonly throwing around verbiage or words in a reckless way.

Looks or appearances can seep other types of hurts into the psyche of the person. If we could only step back and laugh. While in surgery following a heart attack, a middle-aged woman sees a vision of God by her bedside. "Will I die?" she asks. God says, "No. You have 30 more years to live." With 30 years to look forward to, she decides to make the best of it. So while in the hospital, she gets breast implants, liposuction, a tummy tuck, hair transplants, and collagen injected into her lips. She looks great! The day she's discharged, she exits the hospital with a swagger, crosses the street, and is immediately hit by an ambulance and killed. Up in heaven, she sees God. "You said I had 30 more years to live". "That's true," says God. "So what happened?" God shrugs. "I didn't recognize you."

How do we deal with this fragile state of affairs, when it has invaded our culture? Look at the harsh discourse at recent senate meetings, throwing the reputations of politicians to the wolves. The fragile unborn baby, unprotected legally in the womb, can be destroyed with the belief it is a mere blob of tissue. (I recently saw an awful visual out of China, involving a dispute over a donkey between scorned investors and zoo officials. The donkey was horribly thrown by the investors into a water pool with tigers, resulting in sickening results. The tranquil donkey is what Jesus and the Blessed Mother traveled on during ancient times. Despite this disheartening story, can the Virgin Mary reference help us?

Enguerrand Quarton (1410-1466) was a famous painter in fifteenth-century France, born in the northern part of the country in a village called Laon. Quarton moved to Provence, France in 1444. He would become a renowned artist through the fusion of Italian, Flemish, and French Gothic influences. During that period of time he was famous for "The Virgin of Mercy" (1452), and "The Coronation of the Virgin" (1453). In 1834, a historian named Prosper Merimee (later author of "Carmen", (the eventual famous opera) found another of Quarton's paintings in a small church near Avignon. Painted in 1445, it was entitled "Pieta of Villeneuve-les-Avignon." Judith H. Dobrzynski, cultural historian, recently reflected on this compelling piece of artwork. Now on display in the Louvre of France, it clearly reflects human fragility in the context of the Virgin Mary looking at the body of Her Son Jesus at the foot of the Cross after the Crucifixion. "She is, unusually, old and weary. Her face is wrinkled, her nearly closed eyes have bags and her skin is as pale as her dead son's... With her hands folded in prayer, she is resigned to the sacrifice she has just witnessed and experienced. She aches in silence... It conveys not just sorrow and spirituality but also, especially in Mary, acceptance of God's plan for his son and hers... It is a portrait of unspeakable grief achieved with unimaginable restraint".

Many times as a priest I have turned toward Mary, in the midst of the fragilities I face in my own humanity and that of the Church I serve. How about you also turning to Her, the mother of the Saviour, when facing the fragile moments of your life? The betrayals, illnesses, fatigue, worries, and distress being faced.


