

Padre's Corner

October 1, 2017 Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by the things that you didn't do than by the ones you did do, so throw off the bow lines, sail away from safe harbor, catch the trade winds in your sails, Explore, Dream, discover." The inspiration behind this observation was Samuel Langhorne Clemens, more commonly referred to as Mark Twain. The writer and publisher was born on November 30, 1835 and died April 21, 1910. The adventurer and writer created the tales of Tom Sawyer (1876) and Huckleberry Finn (1885).. Twain was born in Florida, Missouri and died in Elmira, New York (locale of a Benedictine retreat house I went to the end of 1987, to discern whether to stay in the seminary or not).

His longing for travel and adventure was cultivated by jobs as a riverboat pilot on the Mississippi River, spending five months in 1867 on a cruise excursion in the Midwest on the Quaker City steamship, writing journalistic stories for the Virginia City Territorial Enterprise, a miner at Angels Camp in California, printer in New York City, soldier for the Confederates during the Civil War, secretary to Nevada Territory governor James W. Nye in 1861, patented a history trivia game, and in 1909 became a consultant to Thomas Edison. He also had misfortunes such as daughter Susy dying in 1896 of meningitis, lost fortune due to bad book writing investments, the death of his wife Olivia in 1904, and dying himself of a heart attack. His funeral was at the Old Brick Presbyterian Church in New York. Though not Catholic, Twain found himself attracted to the life of Saint Joan of Arc, resulting in the 1894 book "Personal Reflections of Joan of Arc." His daughter Clara said many years ago: "Sometimes he believed death ended everything but most of the time he felt sure of a life beyond." He would certainly have been an advocate of personal growth through travel. Twain did not have a strong affinity for organized religion, but his books of adventure did reflect a core spirituality. Joan of Arc (martyred in 1431 at the age of nineteen, and canonized for France in 1920 by Pope Benedict XV) was authentic to him.

Each individual must assess their lifestyle, income, interests, and personality to ascertain how much focus and attention will be paid toward vacation and travel. As a young boy in the late 1960's into the early 1970's my family rarely vacationed. My Mom stayed at home as most mothers did them, and my Dad labored as a New York City fireman in the South Bronx. I remember one week at a South Jersey cabin, joined by cousins, and recall it raining most of the week. The spirit of adventure and travel began earnestly during my ten year career with New Jersey Bell Telephone (1978-1988), when paid vacations were a norm for most corporate employees. My excursions, mostly to cousins in California and on spiritual pilgrimages to Europe helped me to eventually discern my vocation to the priesthood.

As a priest I sacrifice both wife and family, which is not easy, but do take advantage of the opportunities to lead Parishioners to religious destinations. My allotted vacation time is used for these ventures. Priests are allowed to take thirty vacation days per year, one week for a study and retreat week, and additionally can take a day or two off per week like most workday employees. My trips, visits, concerts, ballgames, and pilgrimages are all rich opportunities to grow spiritually as authors like Mark Twain did. I have the additional blessing of friends and acquaintances who want to join many of these ventures, with the similar motivation to grow in religious understanding. I enjoy sharing these enriching experiences with parishioners while recognizing that many of my brother priests would choose to see things differently. Also, because of family responsibilities and economic restrictions, I acknowledge the fact that it is not possible for many to lead similar active lifestyles (which definitely enriches my imagination, our of which so many homiletic stories are created).

A recent survey by the "Associated Press -NORC Center for Public Affairs Research" painted the reality that forty-three percent of respondents will not take vacations this year due to cost and work responsibilities. I was in that state of affairs once myself. Despite the realities, many spend lots of money in other ways. My point that travel is worth the expense, expanding our lives of faith. Give it a try.


