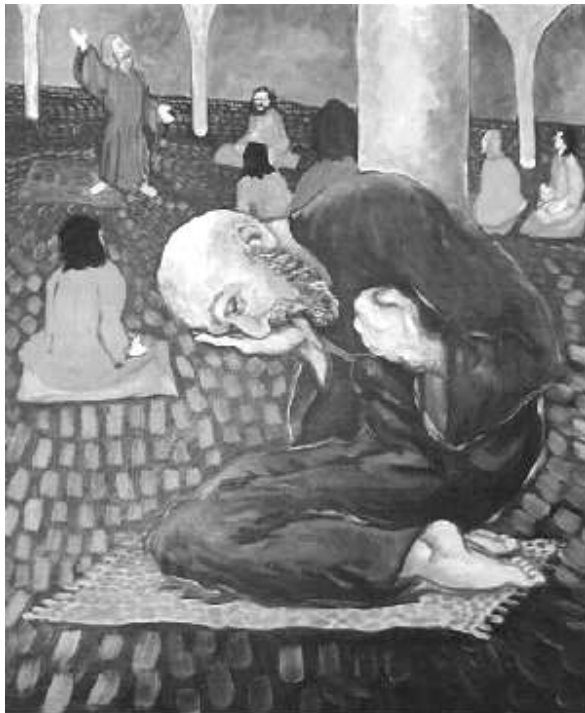

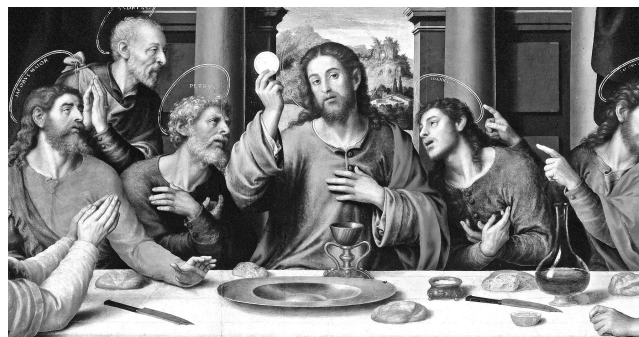

FEAST OF ALL SAINTS

A Holy Day of Obligation

The Feast of all Saints, celebrated on Tuesday, November 1st, is a Holy Day of Obligation. On this day, the Church commemorates all saints, known and unknown. Mass for the Feast of All Saints will be celebrated at Our Lady of Loretto Church on Monday, October 31st at 5:00 pm and on Tuesday, November 1st at 8:15 am and 7:30 pm.

ALL SOULS DAY INDULGENCES

On All Souls Day (November 2nd) a Plenary Indulgence, applicable only to the Poor Souls, is granted to those who visit any parish church or public oratory and there recite one Our Father and the Creed. Also, on all the days from November 1st through November 8th inclusive, a Plenary Indulgence, applicable only to the Poor Souls, is granted to those who visit a cemetery and pray, even if only mentally, for the departed.

Conditions for both indulgences are as follows:

- Only one Plenary Indulgence can be granted per day.
- It is necessary to be in the state of grace, at least by completion of the work.
- Freedom from attachment to sin, even venial sin, is necessary; otherwise the indulgence is only Partial. (By this is meant attachment to a particular sin, not sin in general.)
- Holy Communion must be received each time the indulgence is sought.
- Prayers must be recited for the intentions of the Holy Father on each day the indulgence is sought. (No particular prayers are prescribed. One *Our Father* and one *Hail Mary* suffice, or other suitable prayers.)
- A sacramental confession must be made within a week of completion of the prescribed work. (One confession made during the week, made with the intention of gaining all the indulgences, suffices.)

As we approach the November elections: OUR DISCERNMENT IN VOTING

It is important to carefully choose the person who is closest to our values, starting with the most important issues. From the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops:

“Decisions about political life are complex and require the exercise of a well-formed conscience aided by prudence. This exercise of conscience begins with outright opposition to laws and other policies that violate human life or weaken its protection. Those who knowingly, willingly, and directly support public policies or legislation that undermine fundamental moral principles cooperate with evil.” (*Forming Consciences For Faithful Citizenship*)

Voting is a moral obligation; participation in the political process is a virtue. The U.S. Bishops have written:

“We encourage all citizens, particularly Catholics, to embrace their citizenship not merely as a duty and privilege, but as an opportunity meaningfully to participate in building the Culture of Life. Every voice matters in the public forum. Every vote counts. Every act of responsible citizenship is an exercise of significant individual power.” (*Living the Gospel of Life*)

POPE: THROUGH SMALL WORKS PEOPLE CAN CHANGE THE WORLD

Vatican City, October 12, 2016 – The Catholic News Agency and EWTN News reported that in his catechesis, the Pope focused on both the corporal and spiritual works of mercy, as found in the Gospels, emphasizing that it is through these small works that people can change the world. “The works of mercy awaken in us the need and the ability to make a living and active faith with charity. I am convinced that these simple everyday actions can make a real cultural revolution, as it was in the past,” he said. The Church has a “preferential love for the weakest,” Francis said, emphasizing that it is often those who are closest to us who need our help the most. But it doesn’t have to be through complicated or “superhuman

gestures.” “It is best to start from the most simple,” he said, adding that the Lord shows us what is “most urgent.” In a world “unfortunately stricken with the virus of indifference,” Pope Francis said the works of mercy “are the best antidote.”

“How then can we be witnesses of mercy?” he asked, noting how “Jesus says that every time we feed the hungry and give drink to the thirsty, clothe a naked person and welcome a stranger, visit a sick person or someone in prison, we do it to Him.” And the spiritual works of mercy are equally important to the corporal especially today, Francis said, “because they touch the soul.” “Bear wrongs patiently.’ It might seem like a minor thing, which makes us smile, but instead it contains a feeling of deep love,” he said.

“And so also for the other six, which it is good to remember: to counsel the doubtful, to teach the ignorant, to admonish sinners, to comfort the afflicted, to forgive offenses, to pray to God for the living and for the dead.” Promising to focus on these in his next catechesis, Francis explained that these spiritual and corporal works of mercy are given to us by the Church as a concrete way to live out compassion.

HONORING MARY IN OUR HOMES

From Maria Augusta Von Trapp's memoir, *Around the Year with the Trapp Family*

“Two months in the year are especially dedicated to the Blessed Mother - the month of May and the month of October. October is the month dedicated to the Rosary, since the feast of the Most Holy Rosary is celebrated on October 7th. In these months the Blessed Mother's statue or her picture in the living room are daily decorated with fresh flowers and candles. The family adds one or the other prayer, mornings and nights, such as the Salve Regina or the Memorare or the Magnificat. It is traditional throughout the Catholic world to sing hymns in honor of Mary the Mother of God. We love especially the round by Mozart. It is composed only on the two words with which the Angel greeted Our Lady the first time and which countless millions of lips have repeated since: "Ave Maria." "Meerstern" (Stella Matutina) has been received enthusiastically by everyone who has heard it sung even once.”
