This is the sixth in a series of "one-minute" explanations of different aspects of the Catholic mass. They will appear here once a month.

The Books

People often wonder why, at most Catholic churches, you won't find a Bible in the church. Yet you will find a number of books.

The two main books used during Mass are the lectionary and the Roman Missal. The lectionary is the book that contains the Scripture readings for every Mass. The lectionary is typically kept at the pulpit, or ambo, from which the Scripture readings are proclaimed.

Many parishes use another book that is carried in during the opening procession. This is the Book of the Gospels, from which the bishop, priest, or deacon will read the Gospel passage for that Mass.

The other book that is prominent at Mass is called the Roman Missal. It's kept on the altar. This book contains the prayers used by the priest or bishop presiding at Mass. It also provides rubrics, or instructions, for the priest's gestures, movements, and even the volume of his voice. The word "rubric" comes from the Latin word for "red," because the instructions are typically in red type.

Finally, many parishes have books in the pews. These books allow the assembly to follow along with the Scripture readings and prayers, and many contain hymns that are often used at Mass. These books are called missalettes, as they are smaller, seasonal versions of the Roman Missal.



The Saint Ann's Rose Garden

Tucked into the little space before the breezeway that connects St. Ann's Church with the Rectory, the rose garden may not even be noticed by many as they hurry to mass on Sunday morning. But if you take the time to stop here and visit for a bit, you'll be rewarded by a beautiful display of roses from early June through mid-September. For many parishioners, the garden carries memories of those who carefully tended its roses over the years: Anne Marie Ventriglia, Fr. Emil Bettley, Fr. Cresus Fernando, and many others, who gave their time to water, nurture, and prune the roses to maintain this lovely part of St. Ann's.

Mary, The Miraculous Rose



The beauty and grace of the rose have long been associated with the Blessed Virgin Mary, who in one litany is called "the Miraculous Rose," the rose without thorns.

St. Ambrose tells this story which explains the reference: In the beginning, in Paradise, roses grew without thorns. But after the sin of Adam and Eve, the roses took on thorns as a sign of humanity's fall from grace. Yet, they kept their beauty and fragrance as a sign of

our eternal destiny with God in Heaven.

Our Mother Mary, who alone from the first moment of her existence was filled with grace and preserved from original sin, was therefore called the thornless, "Miraculous Rose."

And when we pray the Rosary, we take a walk through Mary's rose garden, filled with beautiful, fragrant roses,

Roses frequently play a role in stories of the saints as God sends a special message.

It was the miraculous presence of roses in winter that confirmed the testimony of St. Juan Diego to the bishop that Our Lady of Guadalupe had appeared to him.

And a story is told of Saint Diego of Alcala, who was accused of taking food from the monastery for the poor. When he was forced to open his cloak, where he was indeed hiding bread, miraculously, there appeared only roses.

And then there's St. Theresa of Lisieux, who promised that after her death she would "let fall a shower of roses." Pope Francis tells that once, exhausted from greeting thousands of pilgrims, he decided he could go on for only two blocks more. But he asked St. Theresa to send a sign if God still wanted him to continue. As he approached the end of the second block, he came upon a man holding a single white rose. The Pope blessed it and started to turn away to give his last few blessings. "Don't you understand?" the man said, smiling. "It's the sign you've been waiting for!"

"The rose she had offered was truly an enchanted rose, which would bloom until his twenty-first year. If he could learn to love another and earn their love in return by the time the last petal fell, then the spell would be broken.

If not, he would be doomed to remain a beast for all time."

Squirrels can't love God: they automatically achieve their Godgiven purpose by following their instincts. Not so with us. We have to choose to achieve it, and that's love.

As she clasped hands with the Beast, Belle asked permission to gaze into the magical mirror in order to see her father. Viewing her father in obvious distress, she dropped the mirror and gasped at his plight. "I've got to go to him!" she sobbed.

The Beast responded, "Go to him, then."

Cogsworth later walked into the room with an air of triumphant expectancy as he declared to the Beast, "I must say that things are going swimmingly." His mood changed, however, when the Beast uttered the most significant line in the film. "I let her go."

"You did what?" Cogsworth gulped, knowing that letting Belle go was taking a colossal risk.
