

March 21 2021 - Fifth Sunday in Lent

Reading I: Jeremiah 31: 31-34


These four verses have been described by scholars as "one of the profoundest and most moving in the entire Bible." It marks the only time in the Old Testament when the words "new covenant" are used.

Reading II: Hebrews 5: 7-9

Jesus' call from God makes Him uniquely qualified as one who can sympathize with sinners. His obedience elevated the value of His death.

The Gospel: John 12: 20-33

The Gentile Greeks come seeking Jesus, thus opening a new dimension of evangelization past the Jews and Samaritans. The well-known parable about a grain of wheat Jesus uses to comment on His pending death.






