# From the Desk of Fr. Seán

Dear Parishioners,

#### The Beheading of St. John the Baptist

Seán is Irish for John, so my patron (name) saint is St. John the Baptist. I have a great devotion to this saint and prayerfully reflect each year in a special way on his two feast days on the liturgical calendar--his nativity on 24th June and his beheading which is commemorated this week on 29th August.

St. John is the Forerunner to the Lord Jesus, in birth, ministry, and death.

Following the Baptism of the Lord, St. John was locked up in prison by Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch (ruler of one fourth of the Holy Land) and governor of Galilee. The prophet of God John, openly denounced Herod for having left his lawful wife to cohabitate with Herodias, the wife of his brother Philip. He was martyred for speaking truth to power on God's plan for marriage and the family.

Too often we hear people say that matters of marriage and sexuality do not really matter, almost implying that God does not care that much about these issues. St. John's death tells us that these things do matter to God. They are worth dying over. The beheading of John the Baptist calls us to greater fidelity to God's love and his plan for human sexuality and marriage. We too must be joyful witnesses to God's plan and refuse to compromise with the culture.

On our recent pilgrimage to Rome for the jubilee, we began by visiting the shrines of Malta. In the co-cathedral of St. John in Valletta, we were able to see Caravaggio's masterful depiction of St. John's martyrdom. It is a huge altar piece that is 17 by 12 feet. Caravaggio's uniqueness lies in his revolutionary style that blended intense realism with dramatic *tenebrism*, a technique using strong contrasts of light and shadow. He departed from the idealized portrayals of the High Renaissance, opting for gritty realism by painting ordinary people as models for religious and mythological scenes.


According to Andrea Pomella in Caravaggio: An Artist through Images (2005), the work is widely considered to be Caravaggio's masterpiece as well as "one of the most important works in Western painting." Jonathan Jones has described The Beheading

of St. John the Baptist as one of the ten greatest works of art of all time: "Death and human cruelty are laid bare by this masterpiece, as its scale and shadow daunt and possess the mind."

This vivid, realistic, and disturbing image lays the sacrifice of St. John's martyrdom to bear. May he pray to God for us that we may have something of his spirit, to bravely hold to the truths of our faith even when they come into conflict with those in power.

#### **The Baltimore Catechism Teaches**

Lesson 3 - The Unity and Trinity of God


33. Can we fully understand how the three divine Persons, though really distinct from one another, are one and the same God?

We cannot fully understand how the three divine Persons, though really distinct from one another, are one and the same God because this is a supernatural mystery.

34. What is a supernatural mystery?

A supernatural mystery is a truth which we cannot fully understand, but we firmly belive because we have God's word for it.

- (a) In addition to those truths which can be attained by man;'s natural reason, there are certain mysteries hidden in God which we cannot know without divine revelation, but which we must believe because God has revealed them. Divine mysteries by their very nature are far above the power of human understanding and even when revealed and accepted on faith they remain obscure during our life on earth. To understand these things fully, a finite mind would have to comprehend the infinite.
- (b) In heaven there will be a fuller understanding of these mysteries, but never an infinite comprehension of them.
- (c) It is reasonable to belive supernatural mysteries revealed by God because He can neither deceive nor be deceived. In our everyday life, we believe many things on the word of human beings even though at times they deceive or are deceived.

#### Saints of the Week

### Saint Monica (331 - 387)--Feast Day 27th August

She was born at Thagaste in Africa of a Christian family. She was married young, to Patricius, and among her children was Augustine. He had a brilliant intellect and uncertain morals and his wayward spiritual career saw him at one time a Manichee and then a Neoplatonist. With many tears she prayed unceasingly to God for his conversion and her prayers were answered shortly before she died. She had a deep faith and outstanding virtue and is a wonderful example of a Christian mother.

# St Augustine of Hippo (354 - 430)--Feast Day 28th August



Augustine was born in Thagaste in Africa of a Berber family. He was brought up a Christian but left the Church early and spent a great deal of time seriously seeking the truth, first in the Manichaean heresy, which he abandoned on seeing how nonsensical it was, and then in Neoplatonism, until at length, through the prayers of his mother and the teaching of St. Ambrose of Milan, he was converted back to Christianity and baptized in 387, shortly before his mother's death.

Augustine had a brilliant legal and academic career, but after his conversion he returned home to Africa and led an ascetic life. He was elected Bishop of Hippo and spent 34 years looking after his flock, teaching them, strengthening them in the faith and protecting them strenuously against the errors of the time. He wrote an enormous amount and left a permanent mark on both philosophy and theology. His Confessions, as dazzling in style as they are deep in content, are a landmark of world literature.

He was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Boniface VIII in 1308.

# Feast of the Beheading of St. John the Baptist 29th August

Saint John the Baptist has two feasts to himself. One, in August, celebrates his death, and one, in June, celebrates his birth. And this is as it should be, for as Christ himself said, John was the greatest of the sons of men.

The greatest, but also the most tragic. A prophet from before his birth, leaping in the womb to announce the coming of the incarnate God, his task was to proclaim the fulfilment of all prophecies – and thus his own obsolescence. And he did it: with unequalled courage he spread the news that he, the greatest of all men, was the least in the kingdom of heaven. His disciples, and the devil, would have preferred him to fight, to build his sect, to defeat this upstart whom he himself had baptized, to seize his place in history. But he did not – and so, rightly, he has his place, and he has glory in heaven.

We envy the great and the talented, and sometimes we think that they themselves are beyond envy. But when they come across someone with greater gifts, as one day most of them will, they will see for the first time what it means to feel like us. Let us pray that they, like John the Baptist, may pass that test.

## Registration for Religious Education

Our parish's religious education program is intended to assist parents in fulfilling their obligation in the formation of their children in the Catholic faith. Our children should be baptized as infants and then catechized so they are well prepared for the happy day of their first holy communion ideally at seven years of age, and their confirmation ideally at twelve years of age. As a part of the program, all families are expected to regularly worship with our parish community at Sunday Mass, an obligation shared by all Christians.

We have two distinct programs:


- --St. Margaret's with class on Wednesday's from 4:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. in the school building
- --St. Gabriel's with class on Sunday's immediately following the 9:30 a.m. Mass from 10:30 a.m. to 12 noon in the school building
