The Baltimore Catechism Teaches

Important Truths about the Unity and Trinity of God: Both reason and revelation assure us that there is, and can be, only one God, for the very idea of the Supreme Being makes it impossible for God to have an equal; but from revelation we learn that the one God is three distinct Persons, known as the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Before the coming of the Son of God this truth was not manifested even to the Jews, although there are some texts in the Old Testament which seem to imply that there is more than one Person possessing the divine nature--for example: "Let *us* make man to our image and likeness." (Gen. 1:16).

In His discourse at the Last Supper our Blessed Lord mentioned the three Persons by name, and He clearly spoke of the doctrine of the Holy Trinity to the apostles just before He ascended into heaven...There was also an external manifestation of the Holy Trinity at the time of Our Lord's baptism by St. John in the River Jordan. On that occasion it was God the Son in His human nature who was baptized, while God the Holy Spirit descended on Him in the form of a dove and God the Father announced from heaven: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." (Matt. 3:17).

Hence, according to Catholic belief, there are three divine persons, but only one divine nature. All three Persons are perfectly equal to each other, because all possess the same divine nature with all its infinite perfections. From all eternity, the Son proceeds from the Father as the Word, the product of the intellectual act whereby the Father understands the divine nature; and the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son as the products of the act of love of these two Persons for the divine goodness. All the actions of God outside of those whereby the second and third Persons proceed are acts of the three Persons operating together through the one divine nature. However, certain works performed by all thee Persons are appropriated or attributed to particular Persons as if they individually performed them--for example, the work of creation to the Father, the work of producing the human nature to the Holy Spirit (Lk. 1:35); but only the Second Person became incarnate.

Registration for Religious Education

Our parish's religious education program is intended to assist parents in fulfilling their obligation in the formation of their children in the Catholic faith. Our children should be baptized as infants and then catechized so they are well prepared for the happy day of their first holy communion ideally at seven years of age, and their confirmation ideally at twelve years of age. As a part of the program, all families are expected to regularly worship with our parish community at Sunday Mass, an obligation shared by all Christians.

We have two distinct programs:

--St. Margaret's with class on Wednesday's from 4:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. in the school building

--St. Gabriel's with class on Sunday's immediately following the 9:30 a.m. Mass from 10:30 a.m. to 12 noon in the school building

The program runs from late September to May.

To register you children, please fill out the forms available in the vestibule of our churches and drop them off either in the sacristies after Mass or at our rectory offices.

Saints of the Week

Pope St Gregory the Great (540 - 604), Feast Day 3rd September

He was born in Rome and followed the career of public service that was usual for the son of an aristocratic family, finally becoming Prefect of the City of Rome, a post he held for some years.

He founded a monastery in Rome and some others in Sicily, then became a monk himself. He was ordained deacon and sent as an envoy to Constantinople, on a mission that lasted five years.

He was elected Pope on 3 September 590, the first monk to be elected to this office. He reformed the administration of the Church's estates and devoted the resulting surplus to the assistance of the poor and the ransoming of prisoners. He negotiated treaties with the Lombard tribes who were ravaging northern Italy, and by cultivating good relations with these and other barbarians he was able to keep the Church's position secure in areas where Roman rule had broken down. His works for the propagation of the faith include the sending of Augustine and his monks as missionaries to England in 596, providing them with continuing advice and support and (in 601) sending reinforcements. He wrote extensively on pastoral care, spirituality, and morals, and designated himself "servant of the servants of God."

He died on 12 March 604, but as this date always falls within Lent, his feast is celebrated on the date of his election as Pope.



Mother Teresa of Calcutta (1910 - 1997), Feast Day 5th September

Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu was born on 26 August 1910 at Skopje in Macedonia. She left home at the age of 18 to join the Sisters of Loreto in Ireland, where she received the name Sister Mary Teresa, after St Thérèse of Lisieux. In 1931 she was assigned to the order's Calcutta house and taught at their school there, where she eventually became headmistress.

She received a new vocation to help the poor and destitute, and in 1948, obeying this call, she left the convent and took up a new life caring for them wherever they might be: lying sick in the street or even dying in dustbins. Some of her former pupils joined her, one by one, and the new congregation of the Missionaries of Charity was established in the Diocese of Calcutta in 1950, spreading across India and eventually onto every continent, even behind the Iron Curtain. Many related orders followed, involving men and women, clergy and laity, and both the active and the contemplative life. Mother Teresa died on 5 September 1997 and was beatified by Pope John Paul II on 19 October 2003 and canonized by Pope Francis on 4 September 2016.

Mother Teresa's widespread appeal comes from the directness of her inspiration, and her direct response to it. She went out and did things where they were needed.
