Dear Parish Family

We would like to express our gratitude to Nancy Beecher who has served our parish community for 12 1/2 years. Her dedication to the Religious Ed department, Nursery, Fundraising



events and for many years assisting the Adult Faith Formation and Youth programs. We are so grateful for her time with us and wish her the best on her new adventures. Thank you Nancy!

During the month of November we are invited by Mother Church to pray for our faithful departed brothers and sisters. As disciples and pilgrims on earth we are united with those who have gone before us, marked with the sign of faith, into the "Communion of Saints". Therefore, we are all the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ; the Church. We are called to pray; the departed for us and we for them. I invite you to honor your loved one's memory by writing their names on the envelope you will find in the bins at the entrances of our church. Bring the envelope to the church and place it on the altar or put it in the collection basket. Beginning in November, our Holy Family community will join together in prayer for all the departed family, friends and parishioners at each Mass during the month.

The **Day of the Dead** (*All Souls Day, Día de los Muertos* in Spanish) is a holiday celebrated with a unique emphasis in Mexico and by people of Mexican heritage (and others) living in the United States and Canada. The holiday focuses on gatherings of family and friends to pray for and remember friends and relatives who have died. The celebration occurs on the 1st and 2nd of November, in connection with the Catholic holy days of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day which take place on those days. Traditions include building private altars honoring the deceased, using sugar skulls, marigolds, and the favorite foods and beverages of the departed, and visiting graves with these as gifts.

At the side of the main sanctuary you will notice "The altar of remembrance", which will be up all the month of November honoring our deceased brothers and sisters. These altars usually have the Christian cross, statues or pictures of the Blessed Virgin Mary, pictures of deceased relatives and other persons, and scores of candles. Traditionally families spend some time around the altar praying and telling anecdotes about the deceased. In some locations, celebrants wear shells on their clothing so when they dance the dead will wake up because of the noise. Some will dress up as the deceased. I would like to invite all of you to bring the pictures of the deceased members of your family and friends so we can give them special honor by placing them on "The altar of remembrance", and making special prayers for them.

I continue to pray for each one of you and your families. Please pray for me

Today's Gospel offers us a powerful example of faith and persistence in prayer. Those around him rebuked Bartimaeus for his efforts to attract Jesus' attention. When silenced by the crowd, however, Bartimaeus called out all the more. He is persistent and bold in his confidence that Jesus will show mercy on him and do what he asks. His persistence and great confidence that Jesus would help him reminds us of the confidence with which our children bring to us their needs. In their faith and trust we can find an example of the

attitude with which we might ap-

proach God in prayer.

As a family, recall a request that has been made repeatedly by one family member to another. Talk about why the request continues to be made if the answer continues to be no. Then read together today's Gospel, Mark 10:46-52. After reading the Gospel, pose questions such as these to your family: Why must Bartimaeus be persistent in calling out to Jesus? (Some people in the crowd are telling him to be quiet.) What does Bartimaeus do when some try to stop him? (He calls out to Jesus all the more.) When Jesus stops and calls for him, what does Jesus do and say? (He restores Bartimaeus's sight; Jesus tells Bartimaeus his faith has saved him.) When we pray, God wants us to be so confident he will help us that we don't permit anyone to keep us from bringing our needs to God in prayer. Invite family members to identify the things they need most from God. Pray these prayers of petition together as a family, confident that God will hear and answer your prayers. Respond to each petition, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on us." Conclude by praying the Glory Be to the Father.





The Secret to Loving Your Neighbor

Love your neighbor as yourself: Mark 12:31

Do you know who you are?

Yes, you. Do you know who you are? Because what I've learned is that loving God and loving others, is only possible when I know who I am.

Follow me here.

According to Jesus, the whole law and the whole way of life for a Christian is summed up in these two commandments – love God, and love your neighbor.

What has always struck me about this verse though, and what I've been praying about again this week, is that Jesus says love your neighbor "as yourself." It's a condition that must be in place before we can love our neighbor. We have to love ourselves because if we don't, then 1) how will we know how to love another human, and 2) from where will we get the energy and fullness of life that we need to love others?

In my own life, it's taken me awhile to be okay with taking good care of myself because I always thought that "dying to self" and "setting myself aside" and "sacrifice" meant that I had to put other people before myself in every way, or whenever asked. So that's what I did. And I was miserable. I had no boundaries because I always said yes to whomever needed me, whenever they needed me.

I was exhausted. I wasn't truly loving my neighbor because I didn't have much of myself to give them. How could I give them love when I didn't even know who I was or what I needed in order to be a whole, healthy, happy person?

St. Teresa of Avila reiterates this idea when she says, "It is foolish to think that we will enter heaven without entering into ourselves."

When I gave myself permission to enter into myself and get to know who I am, I began to ask myself questions like "what do I need today in order to be fully present to God and others?"

Sometimes that answer is daily Mass. Sometimes it's 10 minutes to paint my nails. Sometimes it's a walk with a friend. Sometimes it's alone time to write in my journal about whatever emotion I'm experiencing.


Whatever it is, the truth I've discovered is that in learning to take time to get to know myself, and to love myself in the ways that I need, I am so much more present and energized and simply more "me" when I go to love and serve my neighbor. Don't get me wrong, this isn't an excuse to be selfcentered There's a certain balance you have to maintain in order to properly care for yourself and love others. It means constantly asking the question, "am I in a good place to serve someone else right now?" and if not, "how will I plan to take care of myself before or after I serve them?"

The tough part I've learned is that sometimes I have to say no to things that are good in order to take care of myself. Like saying no to helping a friend move because I've been having back pain and need time to rest. Or saying no to volunteering that one night at church, because I had a rough week and need to care for myself by going to bed early. Those are the times that I used to shame myself for being a "bad Christian" and not offering up the inconvenience for the sake of someone else, even if it came at too high a cost personally.

I'm done living in shame and I'm ready to love my neighbor in beautifully radical and authentic ways because I know who I am and what my own wants and needs are. The truth is that life is tough and if I'm not caring for my own needs, if I'm not empowering myself to take care of me, I'll start looking in all the wrong places for fulfillment, and I'll only be loving God and my neighbor with half the capacity that I could be.

If you want to give your best to those around you, start by caring for yourself. It's not selfish; it's honoring the gift of life God has given you.

With great sincerity, a scribe asks Jesus in today's gospel, what is the greatest commandment. Since there were 613 commandments in the Jewish Torah, this was a significant question.
