

THE REAL PRESENCE OF JESUS IN THE EUCHARIST

-Bishop Robert Barron, taken from 2020 Religious Education Congress (Part 7)

One of the last things he (Thomas Aquinas) wrote were these questions on the Eucharist, 73-83. I'm gonna look at just the two places in it, for our purposes, something from question 73, and something from question 75.

In one of the articles in questions 73 Thomas asks, "is the Eucharist a Sacrament? and in his development of his answer, he says some wonderful things. First of all, he says, the Eucharist is best understood as "Alimentum Spirituale" it means Spiritual food. Remember "Padre, per favore" remember that iconic photo of a Bishop, when the people are reaching through the fence at the border at Mass. They're reaching through like they need this for life. So, Thomas says, the Eucharist is best understood as Alimentum Sirituale, it's spiritual food, and he says this, just as Baptism is generatio, it's the generation of Spiritual life, as Confirmation is augmentum, that means growth in the spiritual life, so the Eucharist is alimentum, food for the journey. Necessary? Uh-huh, last time I checked food is necessary for physical life, so this food necessary for the life of the soul.

Many years ago, with a friend I did a bike trip from Paris to Rome, I was younger in those days, and we would do like 70 or 80 miles a day. On that trip I had my first experience of what they call "hitting the wall," I'd read about it but never experienced it. That's when you're going and that's not like you're just getting tired, it's like you can't go on, you're so depleted that you can't move, and that happened to me somewhere in the south of France, and I just had to stop. Until, we always had these big French baguettes in the back of the bike, there and I ate one of those and drank water and then I was able to go on. That's always stayed vividly in my mind, *alimentum*, food for the body, necessary. So alimetum, spiritually, necessary, padre per favore, for the life of the soul.

His next observation, also good for catechist and for teachers, as you present the Eucharist, he says the Eucharist has three names depending upon its relationship to the dimensions of time. If we look back in time the Eucharist is called "sacrificum" sacrifice, because it embodies the sacrifice of the cross you look around the present time, the Eucharist is called "Communal" because right now it's a communion with Christ and with each other, members of the mystical body of Christ. If we look to the future the Eucharist is called "viaticum" because it's food that will take us on our final journey into heaven, and then the great name he says is indeed "Eucharistia," thanksgiving. Why? Because that's the whole life of heaven when we are totally Christified. In heaven all we will do is give thanks and praise. So, Sacrifice, Communion, Viaticum, Eucharist, these great names, beautiful stuff.

I love this, isn't it convenient Thomas asks, it's a favorite word of his, by the way, just means fitting. Is it fitting that Jesus established the eucharist? His answer of course is, yes. Just as the Emperor, he says leaves behind his *imago* in statues and on coins to remind the people of his presence even when he's absent. So, Jesus now in heaven, in a way absent from us leaves behind His great *imago*, His great image, this great sign of his presence. I love this too, and I try to think of it actually whatever I say matters, Thomas says, what someone says and does in the ultimate moments of his or her life is of tremendous powers and significance. Let's say you're gathering with someone, and they know they're gonna be executed the next day, and you're gathering with this beloved friend who's facing death, wouldn't you find written in your heart whatever that friend did and said that night? So, Aquinas says, we attend to everything Jesus said and did but with a very special intense attention. We watch what he did and said the night before he died leaving us this imago of Himself, beautiful stuff.

Peter had expectations about what it meant to call Jesus the Messiah, the Christ. Jesus was indeed the Messiah, but his life and death would show a different understanding of what it means to be the Messiah. We, too, have expectations of God and our own ideas about what we think God ought to be doing in our world. Like Peter, however, we may risk limiting our image of God by thinking only in human ways. God's plan is always more that we can ever imagine.

As you gather as a family, talk about what we expect God to be doing in our world and in our family life. Then read today's Gospel, Mark 8:31-35. Why do you think Peter was so upset by what Jesus was saying? Notice how Jesus reprimands Peter. Do we sometimes forget to let God be God for us? That is, do we sometimes get discouraged because God doesn't act in our world in the ways that we expect? Pray together that we will remember that God is always working for the world's salvation in ways that are beyond our imagination. Conclude by praying together today's psalm, Psalm 116.



The Family – The Building Block of Society & Hope of the World

Throwing rocks into a still lake on a summer evening is a surprisingly satisfying experience. The perfect sound of kerplunk as the rock breaks through the smooth surface of the water; the concentric circles that ripple outwards, all because of one stone being thrown, are mesmerizing to watch.

"As the family goes, so goes the nation, and so goes the whole world in which we live," Saint John Paul II prophetically said in a homily given in Perth, Australia, on November 30, 1986. Thirty-five years later and these words continue to ring true. But what exactly did St. JPII mean? How could a family impact the entire world? Let's go back to the beginning – to Genesis. God creates man and woman in His image, thus establishing the dignity of every human being. But why create Eve? Why not just stop at Adam? God articulates an essential truth prior to his creation of Eve - "it is not good that the man should be alone" (Genesis 2:18). Here it is revealed that humans are social creatures in need of companionship and meaningful relationships. From Adam and Eve the covenant of marriage is established and the fruit of that covenant is children – a family – the basic unit of the social fabric of society itself.

For better, or for worse, the family is that single stone being thrown into a lake. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that the family as an "institution is prior to any recognition by public authority, which has an obligation to recognize it" (2202). In other words, the family must be recognized by societies and governments; all laws should work towards upholding the sanctity of the institution God has established from the beginning of time. When human laws and decisions fail to respect this fundamental truth, the Church and the whole world suffers. But when the dignity of the family is upheld and protected, the ripple effects on the world can be profound – disciples are formed, vocations are born, Saints are raised.

Like St. John Paul II, St. Mother Teresa seemed to comprehend the importance of holy families and its potential impact on the world. She said, "and so, my prayer for you is that truth will bring prayer in our homes, and from the foot of prayer will be that we believe that in the poor it is Christ. And we will really believe, we will begin to love. And we will love naturally, we will try to do something. First in our own home, next-door neighbor in the country we live, in the whole world" (Mother Teresa, Nobel Peace Prize Transcript)

Because the family is the basic cell of society, and because we are called to be in relationship with one another, each Christian has the right and duty to participate in society, be an active member of one's community, and contribute to the good and well-being of all families. Especially those who are poor and vulnerable.

Call to Family, Community, and Participation The second theme of Catholic Social Teaching (CST) is the Call to Family, Community, and Participation. Throughout Scripture, the duty to love one's family is emphasized countless times. From Genesis, where we are told to be our brother and sister's keeper (Genesis 4:8-15), to Exodus when we are given the fifth commandment – to honor one's mother and father, to the holiness of Noah, Abraham & Sarah, Ruth, this theme is repeated. In the New Testament, these commandments are carried forth, but they are transformed. Your family, your neighbor, does not necessarily mean someone related to you by blood, or who lives next door to you. Instead, we are called higher, to love our brother and sister, to love our neighbor, as Christ loves us. And who is our neighbor? Any human being, because they too are created in the image of God.

If the family is the stone, then the concentric ripples would be local communities, state, nation, and the world. Thus, it is not enough to merely go home and love our families. The love we receive there must be carried forth – to the communities which we are a part of – and in time – to the whole world.

That may seem like a daunting task, so where do we begin?


Answering the Call

- 1. Go home and love your family members. Honor your parents and grandparents, listen to the stories of your siblings, pray together, forgive quickly, be intentional about setting your phone aside and giving them your undivided attention. Peace begins at home.
- 2. Make a list of all the communities you are a part of: your Church, school, clubs, sports, extracurricular, volunteer groups, friends, etc. What role do you play in each of them? Are you an active member? Or are you a bystander? Do you act differently in each setting, wearing a different mask to fit each group? Or are you authentically and truly yourself? Would the members of your communities be surprised to learn that you love Christ? Or do your actions help reveal the love of God? What is one branch of your community you can take a more active role in?
- 3. What are you passionate about? The environment? Healthy and affordable food? Providing housing options for the homeless? Promoting racial justice? Fighting for the unborn? Helping expectant/young mothers? Caring for the sick? Visiting with the elderly? Helping those who do not easily have access to education? Volunteer where your heart is. What organization could join that would allow you to minister to the needs of the vulnerable members of your community at large? Inform your conscience, and when the time comes for you to vote, become an informed voter. Do not get swept away with propaganda or jargon. Research, read, ask questions. Recognize that the laws our representatives make directly impact families and communities. There is no perfect leader, but we are called to choose leaders who we believe will work to uphold the dignity and protect the rights of all people.



- Communion may be received on the hand or on the tongue, we encourage receiving on the hand to keep our Priest and Eucharistic Ministers safe.














