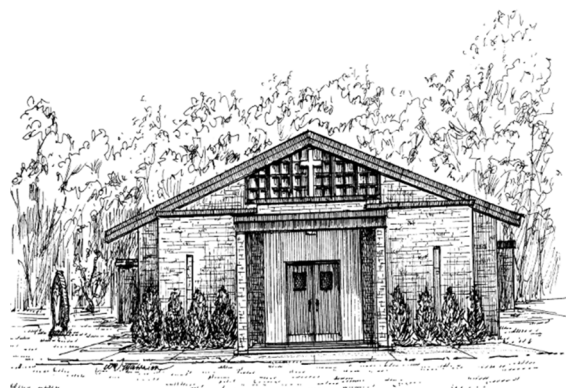

Many times due to traveling or sickness, parishioners are not able to come to Mass. Please do your best when this happens to make up the following week in your offering. Thank You.



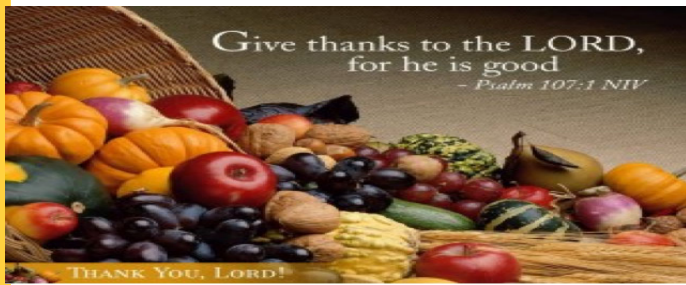

We can obtain an Indulgence for Holy Souls:

Requirements for obtaining a Plenary
Indulgence on All Souls Day -

- Visit a church and pray for souls in Purgatory.
- Say one Our Father and the Apostle Creed in the visit.
- Say one Our Father and one Hail Mary for the Holy Father's intention of the month.
- Worthily receive Holy Communion (that day if possible).
- Make a sacramental confession within 20 days of All Souls Day.
- For a plenary indulgence be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin (otherwise, the indulgence is partial, not plenary, "full").
- You can acquire one plenary indulgence a day.

A partial indulgence, applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory, can be obtained when saying the "**Eternal rest...Requiem aeternam...**" prayer.

Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen

Requiem aeternam dona ei (eis), Domine, et lux perpetua luceat ei (eis). Requiescat (-ant) in pace. Amen

It is customary to add the second half of the "Eternal Rest" prayer after the prayer recited at the conclusion of a meal.

We give Thee thanks, almighty God, for all Thy benefits, Who livest and reignest, world without end. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Gratias agimus tibi, omnipotens Deus, pro universis beneficiis tuis, qui vivis et regnas in saecula saeculorum.

Fidelium animae, per misericordiam Dei, requiescant in pace. Amen.

Shouldn't we be free from attachment to sin? To what degree is being attached to sin *okay*? In the final analysis, perhaps we have to admit that gaining plenary indulgences is rarer than we would like.

That said, it is not impossible to gain them.

I don't think we have to be a hermit living on top of a tree beating his head with a rock to be free of attachment to sin so as to gain this plenary or "full" indulgence.

Also, we do not know the degree to which a "partial" indulgence is "partial". It could be *a lot*. That in itself is something which should spur us on!

Generally, if someone is motivated to obtain an indulgence, he does so from true piety, desire to please God and to help oneself and others.

Holy Church offers us many opportunities for indulgences. **The presupposition is that Holy Church knows we can actually attain them.**

They can be partial (and we don't know to what extent that is) and full or plenary. But they *can* be obtained by the *faithful*. Holy Church is a good mother. She wouldn't dangle before our eyes something that is impossible for us to attain.

That doesn't mean that a full indulgence is an *easy* thing. It does mean that we *can* do it. In fact, beatifications and canonizations have been more common in the last few decades and in previous centuries. **The Church is showing us that it is possible for ordinary people to live a life of heroic virtue.**

Therefore, keep your eyes fixed on the prize of indulgences. Never think that it is useless to try to get any indulgence, partial or full.

Perhaps you are not sure you can attain complete detachment from all sin, even venial. Before you perform the indulgenced work, ask God explicitly to take away any affection for sin you might be treasuring. Do this often and, over your lifetime, and you may find it easier and easier. Support your good project with good confessions and good communions. You need those graces.

A person does not become expert in *worldly* pursuits overnight or without effort. Why would not the same apply to *spiritual* pursuits? It takes time and practice to develop skills and virtues. It takes time to develop habits of the spirit as well

We *can* do this. And when we fall short, we still have the joy of obtaining the partial indulgence and that's not nothing.

THE TRUE KINGSHIP OF JESUS CHRIST

What kind of King is Jesus? How do you envision him? Remembering that they were promised a king from the line of David, the Israelites hoped for a Messiah who would set their political problems aright and bring about a worldly kingdom of Judaic power. Even Psalm 122 seems to describe this type of ruler. Luke's Gospel today shreds that image after the whip of the Roman soldiers tore at Jesus' flesh. Still, the Romans flaunted the traditional notion with their ironic inscription above King Jesus' crown of thorns. Soldiers and ordinary people jeered the royal title at him. Yet the throne of Jesus was the cross of Christ, from which he dispensed kingly mercy and justice toward the humble criminal who shared his execution. Writing to the Colossians, Saint Paul describes the truth about Jesus and his kingship, using words like fullness, peace, and forgiveness. So let us go rejoicing! Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rey del Universo

LA VERDADERA REALEZA DE JESUCRISTO

¿Qué clase de Rey es Jesús? ¿Cómo te lo imaginas? Recordando que se les prometió un rey del linaje de David, los israelitas esperaban a un Mesías que arreglara sus problemas políticos y trajera un reino terrenal de poder judaico. Incluso el salmo 122 parece describir este tipo de gobernante. El Evangelio de Lucas de hoy destruye esta imagen después de que el látigo de los soldados romanos desgarrara la carne de Jesús. Sin embargo, los romanos hicieron alarde de esa noción tradicional con la inscripción irónica en el letrero que pusieron sobre la cabeza de Jesús que está coronada con espinas. Los soldados y la gente de a pie se burlaban de su título de realeza. Sin embargo, el trono de Jesús era la cruz de Cristo, desde la que administraba misericordia y justicia majestuosa hacia el criminal humilde que compartía su ejecución. Al escribir a los colosenses, san Pablo describe la verdad sobre Jesús y su realeza, utilizando palabras como plenitud, paz y perdón. Así que ¡vamos a alegrarnos!

Salmo — Vamos alegres a la casa del Señor (Salmo 122 [121]).

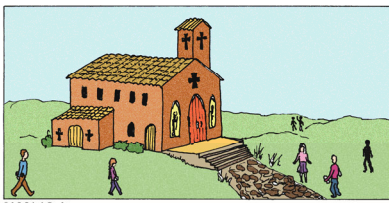
Segunda lectura — El Padre nos trasladó al Reino de su Hijo amado (Colosenses 1:12-20).
