FROM THE Pastor...



Our 1st Reading from the Prophet Jeremiah describes a time of turmoil – one of many in the history of Israel. For as long as there have been writing tools, Israel has been a place of distress. Particularly in more ancient times, its place along the sea in the arid, mountainous, desert region of the larger area has always made it a dangerous place to live. Much of its land is fertile and a great trade route between Egypt and its grain and the rest of the known world. Its trade routes, in particular, make it a desirous acquisition for anyone with an army strong enough to take it: Assyrians, Babylonians, Persians, and Romans. Jeremiah writes during the Babylonian exile of a promise by God of a return to the Promised Land. This would happen after the Persian conquest of Babylon. Two things to note: this was not a welcome message to everyone among the dispersed Jews. When the Babylonians exiled the Jews in an attempt to break up their culture, they did not bring along the poor, blind, lame, and sick. They took only the healthy, wealthy, and wise: educators, artists, and craftsmen who could be of use to their culture. Secondly, many did not want to return home to Israel. After 70 years, new homes had been formed, places of employment, friendships, marriages, etc. The difficulty of our relationship with God is that He often calls us out of our comfort zones to enter into the great Mission of making Him a priority in our lives and in our world. Most often, it is the case that we do not understand what God is doing in our lives as it happens. Rather, we must look back over the course of our lives and the sequence of events therein to gain greater perspective of how we are a part of a much greater plan than we can possibly imagine.

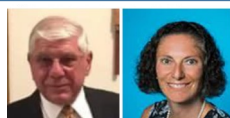

Voting Guidelines: Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship

Our redemption has a social dimension because

"God, in Christ, redeems not only the individual person, but also... social relations." -Pope Francis

Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship is the teaching document of the U.S. Catholic Bishops on our political responsibility. How can we best form our consciences, learn about Catholic social teaching on important issues, contribute to civil and respectful public dialogue, and shape political choices in light of Catholic teaching?

Some suggestions:

- **Review how voting is part of our Christian duty.** "In the Catholic tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation."
- **Put on 'the mind of Christ.'** Take time away from social media. Spend time with Holy Scripture and the Blessed Sacrament.
- **Study Church teaching on the issues.** Some good resources are *Part II of "Forming Consciences,"* the *2024 Voter's Guide*, and the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*
- **Stay well-informed about the issues and the candidates' positions, character and effectiveness.** Visit campaign websites, pay attention to interviews and debates, study proposed legislation.
- **Engage in reasoned, compassionate, and loving dialogue** with others.
- **Properly form your conscience - and vote accordingly!**
- **Don't stop on Election Day.** Pray, serve, act.
