

Deacon Bob's Reflection...

SECOND SUNDAY of EASTER

Today ends Easter Week, not Easter Season. Easter Season continues until Pentecost, 50 days after Easter. All the readings today are from the New Testament, as they will be until Pentecost. The Church is reminding us to look at what has happened, Jesus' Passion, death and Resurrection, not at what His people were waiting for.

In the first reading from Acts, the Apostles are all together in Jerusalem, meeting openly at the temple, preaching God's word, and performing all sorts of miracles, healing the sick, driving out demons. They were also being persecuted by the Sanhedrin, thrown in jail and beaten. But they had the fervor of absolute conviction in the message of Jesus and the truth of what He had taught them and told them to do. They believed that they would overcome the Jewish leaders as well as the Roman occupiers.

Revelation is an interesting book. I have been told that there were about 400 other "apocalyptic" books in existence at the time it was written. Many of the symbols used in this book can be traced back to Old Testament prophets like Ezekiel and Daniel. But now these symbols point directly to Jesus, known to the believers to be the true Messiah promised by God.

John's Gospel records what was the first appearance to the Apostles of Jesus after His Resurrection. They still don't know what has happened or what they are supposed to do now. Jesus appears and says they are to go out and preach the Good News of Jesus. He breathes on them, giving them the spiritual life, faith and strength they will need to overcome the world.

There are many topics in these readings that we can focus on, often "doubting Thomas", but perhaps the most important are what Jesus said to all the Apostles: "Peace be with you." And "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Each of us is sent by God to bring His message of love, forgiveness, peace and joy to every person we meet. Meet them at their needs, as Pope Francis said in his final message. Don't just tell them of God's love; show them God's love, care and compassion for the poor and the needy. During this Easter season, share God's peace with all those you meet.





On April 30, 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized Sr. Maria Faustina Kowalska and declared the Second Sunday of Easter as **Divine Mercy Sunday**. Sr. Maria Faustina was a humble Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy.

God's message of Divine Mercy as revealed to Sr. Maria Faustina is simply that God loves us - all of us - and He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins. He wants us to approach Him in prayer and ask for His mercy, extend that merciful love and forgiveness to others, and trust completely in Jesus.
