Pastoral Council Update

The Sacred Heart Pastoral Council continues to work on its major restructuring of our system of parish committees and ministries with the hope of having the new plan ready to go by the end of May, 2017. Here is where we are now at following our most recent meeting last week:



- The new Pastoral Council Constitution, which will establish the new structure, will be ratified at the meeting of the Council on *February 7th*.
- A second *Parish Leadership Summit* will be held on Saturday, *February 25, 9:00 am—1:00 pm*, to assist all committees to revise their working documents to reflect the new structure and to choose who will represent those committees on the new Pastoral Council.
- Our inaugural meeting with both new and old Pastoral Council members on *May 2, 2017* with the hope of orienting ourselves for our upcoming work to begin in earnest in September after all have returned from summer vacations.

those noticeably weakened by age; those suffering from an emotional illness or addiction; those preparing for surgery. We are also inviting family members and caregivers to come forward to receive the blessing.

The power of this sacrament goes beyond those who are anointed. The prayer of the community strengthens each of us in the daily struggle to face the mystery of suffering while remaining faithful.

A Word from Father...

Dear Friends.

As you obviously know by now, I am away this weekend taking some time with my crazy brothers on the Annual Codd Boys Ski Trip. Each year we choose



a different place to settle in for a few days of brotherly togetherness, which includes a fair amount of smoking cigars (I refrain), enjoying cold beers, and eating big each night. We also ski. A little. Bunny hills mostly. At least the first day.

They've been doing this for decades now; I joined in once I returned from my years in Europe. They had a proud record of no one ever breaking a bone on the ski hill...until I crashed and burned about three years ago and cracked my arm bone just under the shoulder. It took two moths to heal, but what never could be healed was the fame of being THE ONE who ruined a perfect record for the family. Ouch.

One of the best things for me is catching the chair lift for the ride up the mountain with just one brother. Then we can chat without a lot of noise or "family dynamics" to distract us. We don't talk about much of anything, certainly not politics...or religion for that matter...just small stuff like how beautiful the mountains are or how pretty the sunshine on the snowy trees is, or...look at that IDIOT over there! Well, it'll be his own fault when he crashes into a pine tree. As I said, nothing too grand, just brotherly chat. Sometimes we don't really talk; quiet holds on the ride up. It doesn't matter. We're here. Together. It's good.

My oldest brother, Phillip, used to come with us until he died. That remains sad. We miss him. He was funny. We toast him on the first night over the big ham dinner: *To Phil, our fallen bro! Cheers!*" We presume he is with us in another way...maybe in the sun shining on the snow on the trees. That would be just like him. With him gone now, we try to say more often things like "I love you", but its not so easy so when we leave to head home, we usually end up just saying "Love ya" and "Love ya back." Not too demonstrative, but enough for us to know what we mean and that we mean it.

There is a verse from Psalm 133 that we don't say when we are together, but which could probably be our ski weekend motto:

Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brothers to dwell together in unity!
