Months ago we announced that we would be celebrating the 100th anniversary of Saint Nicholas Chapel with a special Mass on Sunday June 25 at 3pm in the Chapel. Bishop John O'Hara will be celebrant and preacher. We will have a lottery for the fair distribution of tickets for the Mass. We will also accept reservations for the gala dinner that follows at 5pm at Li-Greci's STAATEN restaurant. Details will follow. Join us on June 25 for this celebration/reunion of Saint Nicholas Chapel.

I am very happy and grateful to announce that once again our parishioners gave generously on Easter Sunday to support the needs and expenses of our parish. The collection brought almost \$37,000 to our account. In anticipation of your support, and using Easter vacation days with less foot traffic, we organized a big job for safety as well as aesthetic reasons: new concrete slabs in two sections near the street, and the whole plaza in front of the church.

As I wrote in last Sunday's bulletin, 22 of us were leaving on April 20 as pilgrims to places associated with saints who lived and/or died in Italy: Saints Peter, Paul, Francis, Claire, and Padre Pio. (Our itinerary is posted on the vestibule bulletin board.) We will be back this Friday. When we know in advance that Fr. John or I will be away, there is one scheduled Mass each day at 8:30, and no 12 Noon Mass. We are grateful to Father Steven Challman who is assisting with Sunday Masses.

People like us, living in a big city with many things to do and worry about, probably had no awareness that March 25 through April 1 was NATIONAL FARMWORKER AWARENESS WEEK. Why now, and why should we care? Because every five years — and this is the year — Congress works on a re-authorization of the federal farm bill that was written in the 1930s as part of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal. And so already the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry is holding hearings and focusing on what should be included in this very important bill.

A coalition of many organizations, including Catholic Relief Services, which is part of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, is trying to raise awareness of the difficult situation faced by many farmworkers. They say that It is a great paradox in our American food system that the people who work to feed us cannot feed their own families.

Advocates report that nearly two million people work in the farms, orchards, dairies, and plant nurseries that keep our huge and crucial agricultural industry going. Yet they describe farmworkers as among the poorest workers in our country, who often have deal with hazardous conditions, pesticide exposure, extremes of heat, and lack of clean drinking water. There are also children working in the fields, because their parents cannot earn adequate wages to support a family.

To explain more about this, let me copy some paragraphs from the column of Bishop Nicholas DeMarzio in the April 8 edition of <u>The Brooklyn Tablet</u>. Bishop Robert Brennan is the Bishop of Brooklyn and Queens now, but Bishop DeMarzio, now retired, is an expert on social justice issues, undocumented migration, and the crisis on our southern border.

"The Supreme Court has made clear on several occasions that Congress has the plenary power to adopt immigration laws. Sadly, Congress has not passed significant immigration legislation in decades and will not anytime soon.

The border crisis has been prompted, in part, by many people from Venezuela and other countries who are arriving at our southern border seeking asylum and relief from desperate social conditions including, but not limited to, poverty, persecution, and a lack of freedom.

70% of American farmworkers are foreign-born. Half are undocumented. While mechanization has reduced the need for as many farmworkers as in the past, farmworkers are very needed. They are essential workers who keep our grocery stores stocked and food prices low. These essential workers are human beings who do difficult work needed by our country, but they are not justly compensated, nor treated with the dignity that workers deserve.

There are 10 states that use the H-2a program, which is the legal way to employ temporary agricultural workers. More than 500,000 people are currently using these visas. The H-2a program allows workers to come for a particular period of time. But the process is cumbersome. Many employers fail to use it and instead rely on undocumented labor.

To address these problems, the US House of Representatives passed a bill in the last Congress that would have modernized the system and granted several hundred thousand undocumented farmworkers a path to citizenship. However, the bill did not pass in the Senate. The new Congress should try again to adopt this important legislation.

Reform of our agricultural worker programs is badly need. Twenty percent of these workers earned salaries below the poverty level. The average farmworker makes less than \$25,000 a year, and the average earnings for a farmworker family is between \$25,000 and \$30,000 for the whole year. And full-time employment is not available to these migrant farmworkers.

Poor treatment of farmworkers reminds us of the need for comprehensive immigration reform, as many industries in our country face a labor shortage. Agricultural and other industries rely on these workers to insure that we can put food on our tables. Our country cannot treat farmworkers in the future as it has in the past."


