I hope you will look inside on page 6 for a very good explanation of our Catholic Church's understanding of Halloween—coming soon, and one of the most popular days on many people's calendars. Our monthly adult education offering —"GROWING IN FAITH"— also offers us a very encouraging reminder of the fact that each of us has a Guardian Angel assigned to guide and protect us all through our lives.

The word "Halloween" is a contraction of words. Hallow is a word associated with saints, and Halloween is the evening before All Saints Day. We say the word hallow every day. We do that in our morning and evening prayers, and at Mass, when we all praise God the Father and say: "Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name."

You may have seen this: It is a devout and loving practice to come to Mass and to pray for the souls of our loved ones who have died. {Give yourself a pat on the back if you know where in this bulletin to find these words of wisdom.} Respect for the deceased, and offerings and prayers for the repose (that is, peaceful rest) of their souls, is a deeply human and important thing. Religious people instinctively hope and pray that our family and friends who have died have a) avoided the eternal sufferings of hell; b) completed the cleansing from their earthly sins in the transitional place called purgatory; c) already entered God's place of eternal light, joy, and peace. That is why October 31, November 1 and 2 are significant days for people in a variety of ways to confront their inevitable future and to speak about death without fear, through a mixture of costumes and candy and prayer.

All Saints Day—November I—falls on a Wednesday this year. Because not only is it is right and just that we pray for our dear departed, but we should also celebrate their new life with God in heaven! A few thousand people have been so prominent and inspiring that they have been formally declared to be <u>SAINTS</u> by our Church. Thus we can be confident that they are in heaven, so we ask that they intercede for us.

That answers why we pray for the help of our favorite famous saints. But November 1 is for all the other SAINTS too, besides the many official ones. There are many many more of them. Think of the holy and loving parents, siblings, spouses, grandparents, teachers, protectors and benefactors, etc., etc., whom you have known, and whom we are certain are saints. All Saints Day is a celebration for them and with them, and encouragement to become saints too. So this day is a Holyday of Obligation. Masses on November 1 will be at 8:30, 12 Noon, and 7:30. We also have a Mass just for the students of our St. Teresa-St. Rita STREAM Academy. Because experience has shown us that very few people are willing to leave their homes—or give up trick-or-treating— on Halloween afternoon, we do not have a 4pm Mass on Halloween.

Before we get to Halloween/All Saints Day/All Souls Day, you can expect to see at the 4pm Mass this Saturday October 21, many basketball players, with their coaches and families. After Mass players will be going over to the gym for a loud start-of-the-season rally. Father Steven Challman will be the celebrant for this Mass; he helps us on Sundays at 5pm. I will be upstate with more than 7,500 Catholics in Auriesville, New York, at the National Shrine of the North American Martyrs. (Extra credit if you remember their names or research their sacrifices: Saints Isaac Jogues, Jean de Brebeuf, Charles Garnier, Rene Goupil, Jean de Lalande, Noel Chabanel, Antoine Daniel, and Gabriel Lalemant.) Auriesville is also the place where Saint Kateri Tekakwitha - the "Lily of the Mohawks" - was baptized.

I want to salute all parents who encourage and enable their children to play team sports, which build both confidence and friendships. Even more, I thank and praise all the leaders and coaches of our St. Teresa Parish sports teams! With their cooperation, we make sure each year that all the coaches who work with our young people have been to Archdiocesan Safe Environment training and know the rules and best practices for protecting our children. This year we have 23 basketball teams for boys and girls - the most on the North Shore of Staten Island.

I especially thank CYO leaders Greg Percoco and Rich Costello, who give great amounts of their time, energy, and patience. The list of names of all the other coaches is too long for the space we have here, but our experience says that many coaches and their words will be long remembered by their players. And this season we are starting something new and important for all the Catholic Youth Organization teams on Staten Island. This will be the practice of beginning each game with the recitation of the prayer that Jesus taught us to pray. This initiative to say the Lord's Prayer at the beginning of each game came from the Staten Island Director of CYO activities Michael Neely. He was supported by the Board of Trustees of Catholic Charities of Staten Island. We met several times this summer and ironed out the details. Joseph Delaney, the Chairman of the Board of Catholic Charities of Staten Island, and a great fan of the University of Notre Dame sports teams, sent us this reflection from a young ND graduate, Samuel Carlson, about the meaning of the Lord's Prayer, also known to us as the Our Father:

The Our Father prayer is the central prayer of the Church for good reason. There is wisdom in each verse: petitioning for our daily bread (physical or spiritual), being forgiven tied to how we forgive, and praying that the kingdom of God come to fruition according to God's will. Even the prayer's title carries a message that should be recognized. The Greek word in Luke's text is the standard Greek term for <u>father</u>. But Jesus was often known for using the Aramaic <u>abba</u>, which carries a tone of tenderness and affection similar to the English word <u>papa</u>.

At that time, the word father was as much about authority as it was about familiarity. The father was the head of the house, and his rule in that domain was total—not unlike how God's rule over all of creation is absolute. However, considering that Jesus refers to his Abba as merciful (Luke 6:36), generous (Luke 11:13), and attentive to our needs (Luke 12:30), one could argue that Jesus was not simply developing a more intimate understanding of God—but of fatherhood as well.



"Angel of God, my guardian dear ...

"Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life," said St. Basil. The Church teaches that we each have a guardian angel, assigned to guide and protect us until death (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #336). Jesus said: "In heaven their angels always behold the face of my Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 18:10). Tap your angel's powerful protection to grow in virtue and holiness:

Confide in your guardian. Guardian angels aren't mind-readers, but they do observe us

carefully. The more we tell them, the better they can help us make good choices, avoid sin, and keep us safe.

Ask for help. Our guardian can help make tough decisions, resolve conflicts, offer protection especially for our souls. They intercede for us, and help to prepare our souls for the moment when we stand before God.

Respect guardian power. Angels are powerful creatures, created by God to care for us. They aren't answerable to us but stand ready to help us get to Heaven.

Matthew 22:34-40, Jesus has the right answers

In their first meeting with Jesus, the Pharisees wanted to trap Him by getting Him to say something that contradicted Jewish

law. Then He could be arrested and silenced. The lawyer they sent was aware that generations of Jews had debated fruitlessly about which law was the most important. Pretending to seek Jesus' opinion, he asked Jesus to choose which of the 613 commands of the Jewish law was the most important.

Jesus silenced them all by saying everything starts and ends with love love of God and love of others. To love God is to love one another. These laws are at the heart of all the other laws. Even the Pharisees couldn't argue

with that. While it is easy to

love God, loving others is more difficult. It means including people when the natural inclination is to exclude or avoid them.

Jesus loved prostitutes, political enemies. True love of neighbor is measured by how we treat the poor, the vulnerable, and our enemies. This is how God loves and He calls us to do the same.

Celebrations

October 7 - Our Lady of the Rosary. Pope Gregory XIII named this feast because it was believed that Christians won a critical victory at the Battle of Lepanto after praying the Rosary.

October 9 - St. John Leonardi (1609). Born in 1543 in Lucca, Italy, St. John spent his priesthood ministering in hospitals and prisons and teaching the Faith. He established the Clerks Regular of the Mother of God, and helped found the Congregation of Christian Doctrine.

October 16 - St. Hedwig (1243).

Born to the Duke of Croatia, St. Hedwig married the Duke Henry of Silesia. They founded a convent, h ospitals, and monasteries. After his death, St. Hedwig became a Cistercian nun, donating her fortune to charity.

October 28 - Sts. Simon and Jude (1st century). St. Simon was a Zealot -Jews who believed the Messiah would free them from political oppression. St. Jude was a fisherman. After being called by Jesus to be apostles, they eventually traveled to Persia where they preached the Gospel until they were martyred.

Q Can Catholics & celebrate A Halloween?

Catholics can celebrate Halloween as a holiday with Christian roots. In 835, Pope Gregory IV moved the commemoration of All Martyrs (later All Saints Day) from May 13 to November 1. The night before became known as All Hallow's Even or "Holy



Evening," and eventually Halloween. Villagers visited local homes to gather contributions for the feast to be held the next day, All Saints Day.

Those who didn't contribute might be subject to a prank or "trick."

Catholics enjoy donning creative costumes and giving out candy, but it's important to avoid glorifying evil, death, and the Devil. Consider using the holiday to learn about a saint you didn't know or collecting food for the poor.

In short, Halloween is a chance to celebrate generosity, friendship, and community. It's the threshold of a time to remember the believers who have gone to Heaven before us and the hope we have of following. We also pray for the Holy Souls in Purgatory to strengthen them during their purification before entering Heaven.
