

From the Pastor's Desk ...

We have just celebrated and continue to enjoy the beautiful tradition of Thanksgiving, and we continue to thank God and everyone for all the blessings and enriching our life. As we enter in to the new liturgical year and the great season of Advent, let us bring our family to the Eucharistic Lord by actively participating in the Mass every weekend!

On the first Sunday of 2Advent, let us be alert and watchful in the spirit of today's gospel. Every morning when we get up, let us pray, "Lord, show me someone today with whom I may share your love, mercy and forgiveness." Mother Teresa of Calcutta once said, "Whatever you do in your family, for your children, for your husband, for your wife, you do for Jesus." Every night when we go to bed, let us ask ourselves, "Where have I found Christ today?" The answer will be God's Advent gift to us that day. By being alert and watchful we'll be getting an extra gift: Christ himself. There is a saving which goes back to St. Thomas Aquinas: "Without God, I can't. Without me, he won't." Be wakeful and watchful: We are so futureoriented that we frequently forget the present entirely. We spend too much time trying to protect ourselves against future misfortunes. We save for a rainy day, to get married, to buy a home, to send the children to college, to retire in comfort and to protect ourselves against future misfortunes with varieties of insurance. But we need to be more spiritually wakeful and prepare for our eternal life. Let us make this advent season the time of such preparation.

Advent and Christmas wreaths: It's a lovely way to remember and include our beloved departed by placing a memorial wreath in their name by and inside of our Churches. It brings beauty and color to our premise and inside of Our Lady of Lourdes. I pray and wish you all a very good advent and blessed time. See you all in Church and thank you for continuing to be a missionary of Jesus to us all!

ADVENT PRAYER

O, come Emmanuel. Come into our world and bring Your peace. Come into our lives and grant us Your favor. Come into our homes with Your love. Stav with us. Lord Jesus. Throughout these days of Advent. Advent Wreath

One of the most common symbols used during Advent is the Advent wreath, usually made of evergreen branches formed into a circle. It holds four candles: three purple (or dark blue)

and one pink. The purple candles symbolize the time of preparation and are lit at the beginning of the first, second, and fourth Sundays of Advent. The pink candle, lit at the beginning of the third week of Advent, symbolizes our focus on rejoicing during this penitential season. There is a similar Sunday in Lent.

Many families make a small Advent wreath for use at home. Although the candles on the wreath in church are lit only on Sundays, the candles on the family's wreath usually are lit each night of the week, accompanied with a variety of prayers or rituals. Some families place a white or light-colored candle in the middle of the Advent wreath on Christmas Eve to symbolize the coming of the Christ Child. This candle symbolizes the connection between the Old and the New Testaments. Whatever is chosen, prayers and rituals should be appropriate and relevant to all members of the family.



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Being Surprised by Christ

Some people hate surprise parties. There are those who are uncomfortable with a last-minute vacation or even an unexpected travel upgrade. If it wasn't part of the plan, it's a cause for consternation.

There is a temptation to view these folks as curmudgeonly—sticks in the mud, obsessed with predictability. But I think if we're being honest, there's a little bit of the surprise-averse in all of us. Deep within the very heart of the element of surprise is a kernel of shock. And shock, in the moment, can feel similar to trauma. If we reflect on the most traumatic occurrences of our lives—a loss, an accident, a calamity—it is likely that we will say this: "It was the shock more than anything that got to me." Grief or fear, those feelings were overwhelming as well, but they came later. In the first moment, all we knew was we were going about our lives on one path until we were thrust on a different one and then the whole future changed.

This is the natural rhythm of our life here on earth. We never know what is coming — which is to say, in a beautiful way, we always know what is coming. More importantly, we know Who is coming. Like the early riser who sets the "pre-alarm" (the one on which he knows he's going to hit snooze just to take the edge off the disappointment of waking up), we are always being given a heads-up in Scripture. From the earliest prophecies of the Messiah to Jesus' reminders in the Gospel to the very last words of Revelations, God has communicated to His stewards: You know the time. The time is now. We are called to constant vigilance, perpetual renewal, steadfast accountability.

In the end, the coming of Christ may be the only event in history that was a surprise, but not a shock — and so it will only be beautiful, even for those who hate surprise parties.

Each week a parishioner will take the chalice home, put it in a prominent place, and pray daily for vocations.
