



AFTERWORD....Fr. Dave Howell

THE FEAST OF THE HOLY CROSS... This last Tuesday. the Church celebrated that feast which is also called the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. During the early years of the Emperor Constantine (the Roman emperor from 306 to 337) his mother, Helena, went on pilgrimage to the Holy Land. She sought to discover the sites of many events mentioned in the Gospel. Calvary & the tomb and the birth place of Jesus were easy to find. Those sites had already been the destination of first century pilgrims. After the Jewish Revolt of 135, the Emperor Hadrian built pagan temples over those sites to keep Christians away. Those temples were torn down and Helena had churches built on those two sites. A legend states that Helena also found the cross of Jesus in a pit near Calvary and its authenticity was proven by miracles. The cross was cut in three with a third being sent to Rome and Constantinople and the last third stayed in Jerusalem. (Eventually all three pieces ended up in Rome.) The Feast of the Holy Cross not only celebrates the finding of the cross, but more importantly it celebrates victory of Christ over death.

JUST IN TIME... for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, a large cross was placed at the Labyrinth created by Matthew Leyes. While the timing was just a coincidence, I can't imagine a better time for the cross to be placed there. In John's Gospel (chapter 3), Jesus said that he would be "lifted up on the cross". The Greek word for lifted up can also be translated raised up or resurrection.

THE SIGNAL OF CHANGE ... On the Liturgical calendar the Feast of the Holy Cross is also a signal that we have entered the third and last phase of Ordinary Time. Gradually, the readings will begin to look toward the end times as we move toward the Feast of Christ the King, which is the last Sunday of the Church Year which is November 21 this year. This is especially true in the week day readings.

TO MASK OR UNMASK ... There has been a lot of controversy lately about masks in schools and else where. Some folks view mask mandates as a limit on or violation of their personal freedom. I can understand and even sympathize with that perspective. But I don't agree. I wear a seat belt when I drive anywhere. Not because it is a law/a mandate, but because seat belts have saved my life in two major accidents (a head on collision with a semi and rear end collision at 60 mph on the expressway). Over 1,000 people dying of Covid each day in our country, most of them unvaccinated and many young people and children, vaccines and masks have been proven as the only reasonable way to save lives and end the pandemic. As you may have noticed both the deacon and I wear a mask when distributing Communion. The reason is not to protect ourselves but to protect others. Masks & vaccines are a practical way to live the Lord's command to love one another.
