




APRIL 21—"THIS IS THE NIGHT"

The Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday is the most ancient and the most important of the Church's liturgies. As we keep vigil for the resurrection of Christ from death, the liturgy takes us to the heart of what it means to be human. The essentials of life—fire, water, oil, bread, wine—are taken up, transformed and made holy. The Easter Vigil begins with the blessing of fire, which is used to light the paschal or Easter candle, the sign of Christ's resurrection. On the candle, the priest traces a cross, within which he marks the numerals of the current year. This rite is a powerful expression of the Church's faith that Christ's resurrection does not recede in time like other historical events. These mysteries are present among us! That is why the great Easter proclamation, the Exsultet, reminds us again and again that "This is the night!" "This is the joy of the Easter Vigil," as Pope Benedict XVI said. "The Resurrection is not a thing of the past, the Resurrection has reached us and seized us. We grasp hold of it, we grasp hold of the risen Lord, and we know that He holds us firmly even when our hands grow weak." The Scripture readings at the Easter Vigil take us from the creation account in Genesis through the whole story of God's love relationship with humanity. The readings remind us that from the beginning, we were made in the divine image of God. Through all our struggles, wanderings and sins, God has loved us and drawn us toward life in His Son. The readings culminate in the proclamation of the ultimate good news—the Gospel account of Jesus' resurrection. After our 40-day Lenten fast, the "Alleluia" returns-- our Christian song of rejoicing and praise. The Easter Vigil is the time for the initiation of new members into the Church. As we celebrate Easter, it is fitting that we also celebrate Baptism, which is our own entry into the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. Tonight, catechumens who have been preparing for many months receive the sacraments of initiation—Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist—so we welcome Kennedy Montoya of San Ysidro this evening. We do not need to be family members, friends or sponsors to participate and rejoice in this moment. In the baptism of new members, the body of Christ grows; the Resurrection is made visible! After their baptism, the new Christians are sealed with the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of Confirmation. Whether we were baptized as infants or as adults, we renew our baptismal covenant vows, and rejoice in the freely given gifts of God. And then, once again, the altar table is prepared and we celebrate the Eucharist. The risen body of Christ is food for our journey—daily bread. The Easter Vigil is the first and most important of our Easter celebrations, which continue throughout the day on Easter Sunday. Easter is nothing less than an invitation to start fresh. "Clear out the old yeast," says St. Paul in the second reading for Easter Sunday. "Let us celebrate the feast!" (1 Corinthians 5:7-8).

We rejoice with Kennedy Montoya as the Lord receives him into the Catholic Church!

Church History The Age of Enlightenment con't

- 16. Well then, with all the subsequent death and destruction, did the Age of Reason lead man individually or collectively to an "enlightened" period of rationality and virtuous living? No, in spite of his many advances in the arts and sciences, mankind cannot escape the bonds of concupiscence (man's bias toward evil) as defined in the Doctrine of Original
- 17. What is the only solution to man's "tendency to evil"? For always and ever, God is the only solution through the saving graces won for us by His Son, Jesus Christ. On his own, man is doomed to a life of selfishness, darkness and defeat. Without the guiding light of Christ's Spirit, ours is a hopeless existence.
- 18. Who were some of the leading thinkers during the Enlightenment period? There were many but the following help set the tone:
 - 1.Sir Francis Bacon---A scientist who is generally accredited with developing the Scientific Method of empirical inquiry based on inductive reasoning.
 - 2.John locke---Regarded as the "Father of Liberalism", he is considered the most influential Enlightenment thinker with his philosophy of British Empiricism.
 - 3. Thomas Hobbes---Best known for book, "Social Contract" which argues in favor of man relinquishing certain natural rights to government in exchange for political order, protection and prosperity.
 - 4.Montesquieu---His influence derives primarily from his political writing, "Theory of Separation of Powers."
 - 5. Voltaire---Unrelenting critic of the Catholic Church who wrote in defense of religious freedom first above all other rights of man.
 - 6.Adam Smith---Scottish economist noted for his book, "Wealth of Nations" in which he spells out the principles of a free-market economy. In addition, the "invisible hand" theory which gives everyone access to the economic pie. Also, Smith gave us the "Theory of Moral Sentiments" which says a great society must be founded on the virtues of prudence and justice.

Parish Project Updates

Several parish projects, such as the Commemoration Brick Project and the Hendren Hall Kitchen Improvement Project, have been temporarily delayed pending the resolution of issues with the Village of Corrales **Public Works and Planning and Zoning Departments.** These issues are complex in nature, but are primarily related to the ongoing costs associated with the sewer system connection that has been mandated by the Village, and geotechnical engineering standards related to storm water containment. Reconciling these issues has been further complicated by the Village's recent regime change. Please rest assured, however, that the parish has made significant progress in its efforts to resolve these matters with the Village in a timely manner. We are looking forward to a very positive outcome in the near future. It's both interesting and amusing to note, that Archbishop Emeritus Michael Sheehan once said of a similar situation: "God created the world in six days, but he didn't have to deal with the Planning and Zoning Department."


FIESTAS MAY 18-19, 2019
