

TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 5:1-7

This passage about the failure of the Lord's vineyard is a metaphor for the ingratitude of the people of Israel and Judah. In tones of sadness and rebuke, the Lord asks, "What more was there to do for my vineyard?"

Second Reading: Philippians 4:6-9

In a moving appeal to the Philippians, Paul exhorts them to embrace all that is pure, decent, and admirable; then God's peace will be theirs.

Gospel: Matthew 21:33-43

In another rebuke to the chief priests and the elders, Jesus recounts a parable in which the owner of a vineyard leases his vineyard to tenant farmers. When the owner sends his servants and even his son to claim his rightful share of the crops, the tenants kill all of them. With some bitterness, Jesus warns the chief priests that "the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to people that will yield a rich harvest.

Dear Parishioners,

October is the Month of the Holy Rosary and all over the world the children of Mary will be devoutly reciting the rosary both individually and in groups. In fact our parish will have a Public recitation of the Rosary on Saturday, October 10th at noon on the front lawns of the rectory. Please make it a point to attend. We do need all the prayers we can offer to God.

This is a prayer written by Pope Francis: to our Blessed Mother, it may be recited at the end of the rosary.

“We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God”

“In the present tragic situation, when the whole world is prey to suffering and anxiety, we fly to you, Mother of God and our Mother, and seek refuge under your protection.

Virgin Mary, turn your merciful eyes towards us amid this corona virus pandemic. Comfort those who are distraught and mourn their loved ones who have died, and at times are buried in a way that grieves them deeply. Be close to those who are concerned for their loved ones who are sick and who, in order to prevent the spread of the disease, cannot be close to them. Fill with hope those who are troubled by the uncertainty of the future and the consequences for the economy and employment.

Mother of God and our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end and that hope and peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick and the victims be comforted, and their hearts be opened to confidence and trust.

Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers and volunteers who are on the frontline of this emergency, and are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort and grant them strength, generosity and continued health.

Be close to those who assist the sick night and day, and to priests who, in their pastoral concern and fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help and support everyone.

Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus.

Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude and generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

Mary Most Holy, stir our consciences, so that the enormous funds invested in developing and stockpiling arms will instead be spent on promoting effective research on how to prevent similar tragedies from occurring in the future.

Beloved Mother, help us realize that we are all members of one great family and to recognize the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer.

Mary, Consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress and pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand and free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course.

To you, who shine on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope, do we entrust ourselves, O Clement, O Loving, O Sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.”



On Saturday, October 10 at 12:00 noon please join parishioners of Holy Name of Mary in front of the Parish House (in the church if raining) in honor of Our Lady of Fatima and “the miracle of the sun”.

Tony Corda, a parishioner of St. Augustine, will return and give his wonderful talk about his grandmother who was a witness. At the age of 28, Herminia, went with her husband after hearing about the apparitions to the three shepherd children and how a miracle was promised on October 13, 1917. Rains had begun the day before and the roads to the Cova da Iria were covered in mud.

The estimated 70,000 pilgrims were not deterred from making their journey to see the visionaries and the woman who many were saying was the Blessed Mother. Suddenly the sun appeared and started moving toward them. Then it stopped and went back into the sky. The ground was completely dry and everyone’s previously wet and muddy clothing was clean. One eyewitness at Fatima reported, “The sun, whirling, seemed to loosen itself from the firmament and advance threateningly upon the earth as if to crush us with its huge fiery weight. The sensation during those moments was terrible.”—Dr. Almeida Garrett, Professor of Natural Sciences at Coimbra University. And the entire event was covered and reported on by the Portugal newspapers.

“She never stopped talking about it her whole life. My grandparents’ faith grew because of the miracles they saw that day,” said Tony.
