PARISH MEMBERSHIP

To be considered an active member of Christ the King Parish, each family and single adult must:

- **⇒** BE PROPERLY REGISTERED
- **⇒** ATTEND SUNDAY MASS AT OUR CHURCH
- ⇒ REGULARLY USE OUR WEEKLY ENVELOPES

This is the only way that the parish can issue documents that attest to parish membership and Catholic practice (EG. A SPONSOR CERTIFICATE TO BE A GODPARENT/ CONFIRMATION SPONSOR).

VISITS TO THE SICK & HOMEBOUND

During the coronavirus pandemic, Home Visits can only be arranged in emergency cases (risk of death).

Catholics who are currently in hospitals, nursing homes, etc. will be attended by the assigned chaplain for their location.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

Preliminary arrangements should be made at least one year prior to the proposed date of marriage. One of the parties must be a properly registered member of our parish and speak to a parish priest to enroll in marriage preparatory courses and book the date of their wedding.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Registration for the Sacrament of Baptism takes place by meeting with a priest. The child's Birth Certificate is necessary at the time of registration. Godparents must present a Sponsor Certificate, signed by a priest of the Church they currently attend, stating that they are currently practicing Catholics & meet all Sponsor Requirements:

- ⇒ AGE 16 OR OLDER
- \Rightarrow **CONFIRMED**
- ⇒ MARRIED IN THE CHURCH (if married)
- ⇒ CONSISTENTLY ATTENDING MASS (Sundays/Holydays)

Baptism dates cannot be scheduled until the SPONSOR CERTIFICATES are handed in. Parents and Godparents must attend one instructional class.

Parents must be properly registered parishioners of Christ the King Church.

Cardinal Dolan has emphasized to the faithful that the dispensation for attending Sunday Mass is still in place.

Anyone in a high-risk group for contracting Covid-19, or who feels uncomfortable in a group setting because of the pandemic, should not come to Church right now. Your health & safety is our first priority.



LITTLE SISTERS OF THE POOR AND RELIGIOUS LIBERTY:

Debunking the Myths

As Little Sisters of the Poor we find our joy in sharing our lives with those whom many in our society would prefer to forget – the elderly poor.

Our mission calls us to live far from the spotlight, but in the last seven years we have found ourselves in the public square more times than we could have ever imagined or desired.



Despite three wins at the Supreme Court, an Executive Order and a new rule that protects us and other non-profit religious groups from the unconstitutional HHS contraceptive mandate, our legal saga is not yet completely over. Several states and many politicians have promised not to rest until they succeed in stealing our hard-won exemption from the HHS mandate away from us.

For many of our Sisters, this time in the public eye has been a source of anxiety and a chronic distraction from our mission of caring for the elderly. We are grateful for the many people who have reached out to support us and assure us of their prayers.

However, we have also been subjected to criticism, derision and even death threats. We'd like nothing better than to return to our mission unhindered by the fear of millions of dollars in fines. But our name still appears in the daily news cycle and much of what is said about us is inaccurate.

To clarify the confusion I would like to respond to some of the most common questions and criticisms we face, including the following:

- 1) You shouldn't be involved in politics;
- 2) You seek to impose your religious beliefs on people who do not share your faith;
- 3) You do not care about women who are prescribed hormonal contraceptives for health issues;
- 4) Your religious liberty claims are really nothing more than a cover for discrimination.

First. We are, and always have been, apolitical. We have been very distressed by the politicization of our case. We never wanted this fight and after our victory at the Supreme Court in 2016 we thought it was over.

We were relieved beyond measure to retreat from the limelight and return to our mission of caring for the elderly without the threat of multi-million dollar fines hanging over our heads. But then a number of states sued to take away our hard-earned exemption. Faced with the possibility of huge fines once again, we had no choice but to return to Court.

Second. We are not trying to impose anything on anyone. We feel that others have repeatedly tried to impose their values on us by insisting that we cooperate in the provision of services that are incompatible with our Catholic faith. We wish only to remain faithful to our own deeply held beliefs.

Our employees come from many different religious backgrounds and are free to use contraceptives. These are readily available through many channels, often at no cost, without our involvement.

Third. We understand that many women are prescribed hormonal contraceptives to treat serious health issues. Catholic teaching has always allowed the use of "contraceptives" for legitimate therapeutic purposes. So, our employee health plans have always covered them in this context.

Fourth. The accusations of discrimination have been particularly hurtful to us. Throughout our 181-year history, we Little Sisters of the Poor have cared for needy elderly persons of every race or religion, even in a number of predominantly non-Christian countries.

We employ individuals regardless of race or religion and welcome the collaboration of people from diverse walks of life.

We believe that our willingness to care for and work with anyone is one of the truest ways to live out the religious faith that animates our ministry.

As we near the coming election, religious liberty matters will likely be at the forefront of political discussions. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has released a document entitled Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship:

In the document, the USCCB states:

"As Catholics, we are part of a community with a rich heritage that helps us consider the challenges in public life and contribute to greater justice and peace for all people."

The COVID-19 pandemic has made us all more aware of our interdependence as brothers and sisters in one human family. We pray that this heightened sense of solidarity will foster a stronger sense of civility and mutual respect so that all Americans can freely live according to their sincerely held religious beliefs.



THE OBLIGATION TO ATTEND SUNDAY MASS IS SUSPENDED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

PREVENTION RECOMMENDATIONS



Those who are at a higher risk for COVID-19 (i.e., those who are older than 65 or who have underlying health conditions) are urged not to come to church for Mass.



Those who feel in any way sick or who are worried about attending Mass should not enter the church.



In accordance with current state policy, the faithful (over 2 years old) must wear cloth face coverings when in public, including when they come to church.



Attendees should sanitize their hands at the entrance of the church via sanitizer stations.



All present at Mass should sit 6 feet or more away from others. Families may sit together.

Those who cannot attend Mass may be encouraged to spend time daily reading the Scriptures, praying with their families, watching a broadcast or livestreamed Mass, and making an act of spiritual communion.



PANDEMIC RESPONSE

NEW PROCEDURES FOR ATTENDING MASS



It is a great joy to welcome many of you back to church, having resumed our regular Sunday and Weekday Mass schedule. **The obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days continues to be suspended.** No one is required to attend church in person during this pandemic. Those at high risk and those uncomfortable coming out right now are encouraged to remain at home and view Mass online or on television.

Celebration of Public Mass is now allowed, but under some new procedures that maintain the highest priority on health and safety.

All church doors will remain accessible as exits, but only **one door will be used to enter the building**. A safety team member will be doing a headcount as we are limited in how many people we can admit to each Mass.

Once inside, a **distance of six feet or more must be maintained** between groups and individuals who are not from the same household - this applies in the pews, when coming up for Holy Communion and when leaving after Mass. Thank you for observing the new signs & markings inside the church, and for cooperating with safety team members who will be helping to ensure social distancing.

Everyone attending Mass must wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth while inside the Church. Please consider your ability to wear a mask for the length of time required before coming to Mass. Masks may not be lowered or loosened on one side while inside the Church - if you need to, step outside the building before removing your mask.

Upon entering and leaving the church, please make use of the hand sanitizer provided.

Holy water fonts remain empty.

All shared use materials (i.e. missalettes) have been removed.

There will be no Entrance, Offertory or Recessional processions.

Please do not sing while in Church, as singing has been found to increase the spread of germs.

The collection will not be taken by passing the basket - please drop your contribution in the box in the rear of the Church. Parishioners can also utilize Online Giving at: https://ctkyonkers.weshareonline.org/or send their contributions directly to the Rectory via USPS or the mail slot in the Rectory Office door. For help with on-line giving, contact the church office during the week.

Handshakes are not allowed - please nod or wave during the sign of peace.

Modifications for receiving Holy Communion are as follows...

- ⇒ only one line will be used, maintaining 6' of distance from others
- ⇒ masks will remain on, so communion will be distributed in the hand only, not on the tongue; hold your hands out and open, so the priest may place the host onto your palm
- ⇒ after receiving the host, move several feet to the side (the front of the statue of Christ the King or the Blessed Mother is suggested), and only then lower your mask to consume the host
- ⇒ after placing the host in your mouth, replace your mask before returning to your seat

After each Mass, all surfaces that are regularly touched – door handles, pews, restroom areas, etc. – are cleaned and disinfected prior to the next Mass.

Thank you for your patience and support of these efforts to meet spiritual needs, while still remaining attentive to health and safety priorities.
