FINANCIAL SITUATION of OUR PARISH – We are not in a strong position financially at this moment. Our income is meeting our expenses but we are not generating any surplus income. Through fundraising and extraordinary gifts, we have some money in reserves but we have a number of expensive projects to complete this summer. We recently have encountered some unexpected expenditures that have eliminated almost five weeks of our Sunday collection income. The City imposed a \$3,000 fine for our failure to file an energy efficiency report for the grammar school. We are investigating this but it appears that we will have to pay the fine. The rectory building requires waterproofing work that will cost us \$5,000. And we had to pay an unexpected fee of \$5,000 to register the boiler in the grammar school with the Department of Buildings so that we can finally be in compliance with the regulations of the City. This summer we will be performing work related to our consolidation that will eliminate the fund-raising reserves that we now have. When persons ask why the pastor is always emphasizing fund-raising, please remember that our expenses never diminish but sometimes our income does!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION - A wedding celebrated in the Eastern Church has a form that was fixed a thousand years ago. In the West, our story is more complicated by constant change and variation. As the world's structures tottered in the ninth century, bishops and priests stepped into the void left by collapsing civil structures. For the first time, marriage was referred to as a sacrament, and wedding ceremonies were to be in public (assuring the free consent of the bride) after an investigation of the couple by a priest. The custom of the blessing of the bridal room diminished, and was finally forbidden in 1012 by the Council of Rouen, although it continued for centuries. In the diocese of Perigueux in France, a ritual from 1827 had the parish priest clad in surplice and stole sprinkling the bridal couple as they stood modestly in their pajamas by the wedding bed. Next the bed and all those present were sprinkled, too! That's a tradition that few Americans, either the betrothed or the clergy, are ready to revive!

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"... We walk by faith, not by sight."

What is the significance of these famous words of St. Paul? Are they true of my life? Are they true of your life?

"To walk by faith" is to allow the direction of our lives, the path of our lives, to be determined by our faith in Jesus Christ. Through prayer, reflection on the scriptures, active participation in the sacraments, and the teaching of our Church, we open our minds and hearts to the instruction of Jesus Christ and allow his teaching to shape who we are and how we live. Walking by faith, we see this world through eyes of faith which allow us to see the need for mercy, reconciliation, compassion, generosity and a profound concern for the poor and the powerless. In contrast, "to walk by sight" is focus on what the world teaches us should be the values that form who we are and what we do – instruction that comes to us through advertising, popular pundits, television and film. Walking by sight, we see our world through the eyes of this world. As a result, we see only the need to give our desires priority over the needs of others, we see the need to exact vengeance and retribution for every offense committed against us, and we see the need to ignore the poor, the powerless and the vulnerable.

It would be wonderful if we each of us could say that we have chosen to walk by faith and not by sight. Unfortunately, the sad truth is that we are not always consistent in allowing the teaching of Jesus to shape what we think, what we feel and what we do. Sometimes we simply cannot resist the allure of the values of this world. We see an easy path to our own self-fulfillment, to our own self-gratification, to our own personal happiness. This is why we need a consistent life of prayer to allow Jesus to correct the course of our lives when we have strayed from the path that he has set before us.

Remember, only when we walk by faith can we live in the hope that our final destination will be eternal life with God.
